

FIGHT EXPECTED ON APPOINTMENT

President Names Woodlock to Succeed Potter on Commission; Opponents Prepare to Withhold Confirmation.

WASHINGTON, March 25 (AP)—The senate's failure to confirm the nomination of President Woodlock to succeed Thomas E. Potter, of New York, as member of the Interstate Commerce Commission, immediately has set in motion a fight in the next session of congress to prevent confirmation. Senators from Florida, who are bitter opponents of Woodlock, announced that they will oppose favorable action and predicted there would be a formidable array against Mr. Woodlock.

Probable Clash

The situation offers a strong probability of a clash between the president and the senate. The nomination of Woodlock, chief of geographical grounds, industry forces would be able to give favorable publicity, and the nomination is re-submitted, paving the way for confirmation.

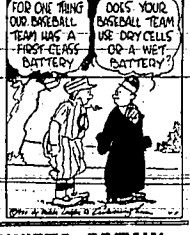

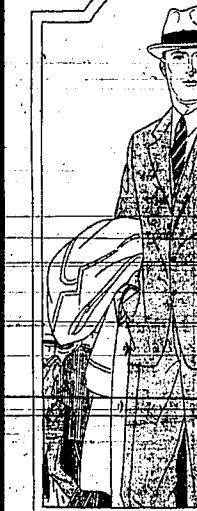

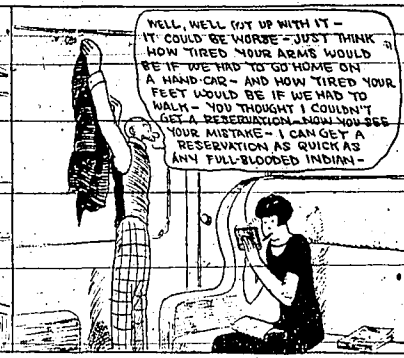
