Emphasizing the economic benefits he thought would accrue to the world from further reduction of the burden of armaments, he said he felt sure France would take an interest in disarmament conference which would bring about a sounder economic condition of affairs.

Senator Borah, at several conferences recently with President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg, discussed the conference and pledged his support to the undertaking.

WEED FIGHTERS TO TAKE FIELD

Survey to Determine Extent of Menace to be Made in Connection With Educational Work.

War on noxious weeds in Twin Falls county is to be carried into the field today when field inspectors operating under direction of Ed. M. Enzard, director of the county bureau of noxious weed control, in five districts into which the county has been divided for this purpose, are to begin a survey to determine the extent of the pest to be eliminated.

Provisionally in the field survey, the county bureau has obtained through the medium of questionnaires sent out to one hundred holders in each section of land, information relative to the presence of weeds in each locality.

Increased degree of interest on the part of land holders generally in control of noxious weeds has been observed this season, one indication being noted in direction of effort recently toward removal of weeds on country, this work being done this season for greater extent than ever before by the most tedious and costly of the highway.

An exhibit of the five prescribed noxious weeds showing their blossoms, seeds and habit of growth, that has been prepared by the county bureau, is to be placed on display this week at the office, Director Leonard stated Tuesday. It has been for several days on display at the hall.

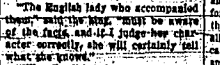

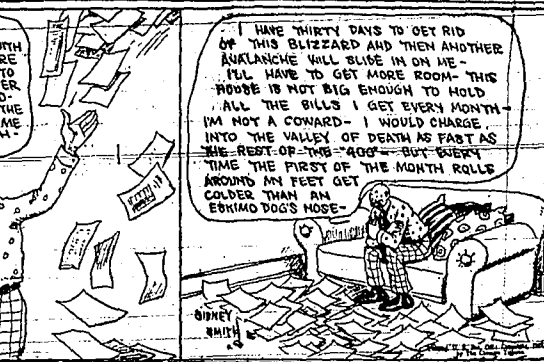
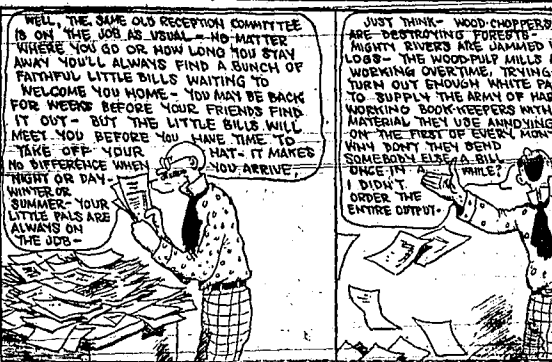
