(Continued from Page 1) Some life with no moral or religious training. This unfortunate mother," he added, "frequently tried in a friendly way to restrain her. The girl acted defiantly and stubbornly. There was no real quarrel between them. The girl's threats were that she would turn her back on her mother."

Mr. Moquin finally said that for some time a week before the fatal shooting Dorothy had been seen to stay away from parties, and had seemed content to be at home. The mother was found in bed, according to the account, without apparent reason, where there was no evidence that she had been disturbed or awakened.

Act of Inmate Person "We will show that this killing was the act of an insane person," declared the lawyer. "The girl was sane at the time she committed the crime. She was sane when she was brought to the hospital, and sane when she was taken to the insane asylum."

Mr. Moquin added that the girl's reported statement in all other respects was to the effect that she had no confidence in her attorney and did not want to be represented in this charge of murder.

Falls of Running Away Earl Ellingson, who is seven years Dorothy's senior, said she would "punish" her when her mother returned here. He told her running away from home. Once, he and his mother heard she was in Turlock, and they went there to get her.

After a policeman had carried her to the hospital, she was taken to the insane asylum.
