ROAD BUILDERS MEET TONIGHT STATE HIGHWAY

Directors Authorize Work Agreed Upon in Placing Twin Falls on California to Parks Route.

Under terms of an agreement with the state highway department placing Twin Falls on the route of the north and south highway from California to Yellowstone and Glacier parks, the state highway department directors, at a regular meeting here Sunday night, authorized A. A. Sholter, district director of highways, to grade and gravel by force account a half mile of road running north from a point a half mile north of Gidwin to a part of a branch of the north and south highway that will connect with the Old Oregon Trail a mile west of Carey.

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POISON FOUND IN BODIES OF TWO EXHUMED

Chicago Paper Publishes Story Declaring Examination in Shepherd Case Shows Deadly Mercury Used.

CHICAGO, April 4 (AP)—The Herald and Examiner tonight printed a story saying that Coroner and Chief Chemist William B. McNally had reported to Chief Justice Harry Olson that he had found poison in the bodies of Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock, mother of William McClintock, and Dr. Oscar Olson, brother of the jurist. William D. Shepherd is under indictment on a charge of killing young McClintock with typhoid germs to obtain his fortune.

The poison, said to have been found in the bodies of McClintock's mother and Dr. Olson, is supposed to be mercury, the story says. The bodies were exhumed recently at the suggestion of Judge Olson, who had ascertained he feared that they might have died unnatural deaths.

Effort to Secrecy

The story continues: Although every effort was made to keep the poison report secret, the Herald and Examiner learned of it tonight from an unimpeachable source. Dr. McNally, chief judge Olson, had had the McClintock case investigated, early today and a day of feverish activity followed. Investigations of the bodies of detectives began an investigation in a drug store where prescriptions for Mrs. McClintock and Dr. Olson had been filled. The purpose of this was to ascertain whether any of the prescriptions ordered by attending physicians had contained mercury in sufficient quantities to leave traces after the lapse of years since the deaths of the two. Whether traces of any other poisons had been found could not be learned tonight.

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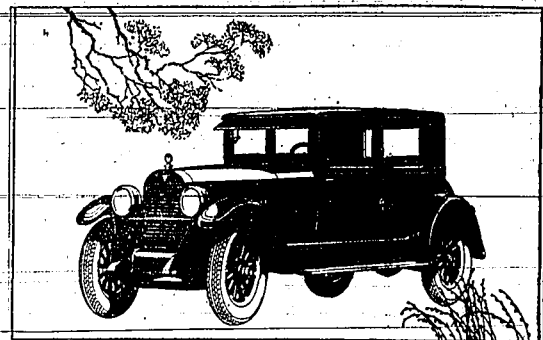
church, lodge or group to dominate the Twin Falls City Council or any other municipal or political body. Any such action contravenes the first principle of popular government.
 Any movement which depends for success upon the preference of any one body of citizens is fundamentally un-American and any political ticket which is representative of any single group to a greater extent than it is representative of any one of the groups is not deserving of success.
 The News has no quarrel with the men who compose the Klan or with those of any belief who do not agree with The News on current public questions, just as long as their activities are kept clear of matters of purely public policy. But when any institution or any group would seek to take into itself the conduct of the municipal government of Twin Falls, it would seem that public attention should be directed to the fact.
 It is not at all likely that the election of a Klan city ticket from start to finish would result in any great detriment to this City, but such election would be wrong in principle, opposed to the best public interests, and in direct contravention of the principle upon which rests the whole proposition of popular government.
 It is not the intent of this newspaper to bring about a widely voted election-hour election campaign in Twin Falls. It is far better that there should be nothing of the kind, but insofar as public interest demands expression, The News takes pleasure in setting forth its views.

THE CITY ELECTION

This coming Tuesday Twin Falls residents will be called upon to elect a Mayor and two City Commissioners.
 Two sets of candidates are in the field, each composed of men of ability, high personal integrity and sound general reputation. Ordinarily such a situation would call for little in the way of comment as between candidates.
 Such an election would ordinarily develop into a fair contest as between men with an implied slogan of "let the best men win."
 But it is not possible to regard the forthcoming election as that sort of a contest. Whether we like it or not we may as well face the facts.
 The addition to the composition of the list of candidates for Mayor and R. W. All and R. B. Smith for Commissioners, appears to be what is usually regarded as a "non-independent" ticket. Apparently it does not have the backing, real or implied, of any one lodge, club, church or any other similar institution.
 So such cannot be said of the ticket headed by Mr. Finch, and composed of E. J. Finch for Mayor, and E. A. Moon and T. J. Douglas for Commissioners.
 It is with regret that The News calls public attention to a situation which never ought to exist in towns such as Twin Falls. No City Election ticket has any right to take the field as representative of any one school of reasoning on a religious question. In the interest of a proper and impartial representation of the people of Twin Falls as a whole, there should be no such thing as a special representation for any element of the people.
 No announcement has been made as to the position of the Ku Klux Klan with the Finch ticket, and possibly in a purely technical sense no connection exists, but it is significant that both the candidates and the signers upon their petitions for nomination are for the most part the same men who have become associated in the public mind with the Ku Klux Klan.
 and for all practical purposes, it would seem that no very fine distinctions need be drawn.

THE KU KLUX KLAN

As an institution makes its appeal to the prejudice in the hearts of those persons who are willing to regard certain forms of religion as inimical to the safety of America. Its advocates will explain that they have no quarrel with the individual of any religious faith but that their efforts are directed, and properly should be directed, against what they are pleased to call "heterodoxy" which constitutes the religious organizations objected to. They would seem that many organizations among adherents of any religious faith is not only bad but is actually an ever present menace—and then they would proceed to expose it by the formation of a group of their own.
 In the latest of Klan members and Klan sympathizers to elect three men to public office in Twin Falls is to be found the identical group upon which the Klan bases its strongest objection to those institutions which it opposes.
 No Kluksman or no citizen of Twin Falls but who would be rightfully indignant at any attempt on the part of the Catholic church or any other

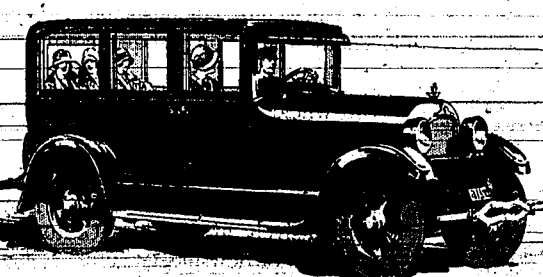

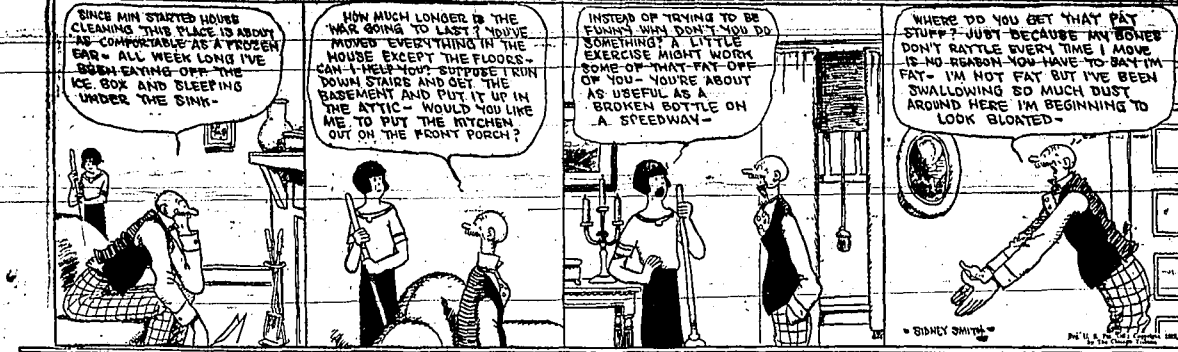

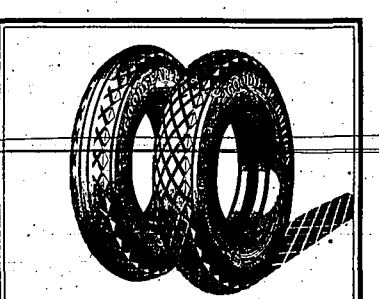
