

GIRL THREATENS HER LAWYER AT SAINT HEARING

17-Year-Old Jazz Maid Orders Counsel Out of Her Sight Before She Chokes Him; Control Breaks.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8 (AP)—(Closing arguments in the assault hearing of Dorothy Ellington, the 17-year-old jazz maid, who was charged with slaying her attorney, began this afternoon after a slurry session during which the girl twice interrupted the address of her attorney and once threatened to choke him "till his neck was as thick as a pig's." Judge Landerback will charge the jury and submit the case to the jury tomorrow morning.

The final straw of the trial brought the defendant herself to the witness stand in the morning. The prosecution, with which she has stood in the present case, called her and the court allowed her to make the strenuous objections of the defense counsel, who contended that it was improper to require a defendant to testify in his own case. Judge Landerback first satisfied himself that the girl wanted to testify and that she understood the nature of an oath.

Calm Replies.

The former "jazz girl" who was tried for the murder of her mother, was suspended last week pending the determination of her sanity, gave calm answers to all the questions put to her by Assistant District Attorney Harrison B. Killian. The interrogation was intended to demonstrate the girl's capacity to understand her legal situation and her surroundings.

Even when Sylvester J. M. Lister, one of her attorneys, put her through a stiff cross examination she retained her composure, responding quietly. She had hoped to be allowed to testify and she came off to her best effect. It was an "ensemble suit" of a new color known as "Mogile," and matched her hat, beneath which wisps of her reddish bobbed hair were visible.

Different Old.

Not in the afternoon she was a different girl. Her eyes were bright and a pitiless closing argument by Mr. Killian, her grip on her neck, she became again in the hysterical girl who had been the defendant in the trial with shrieks and fainting spells. But she did not faint today and she called her attorney Lister.

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GOVERNMENT EXPENSE REDUCTION-NECESSARY TO REDUCE U. S. TAXES

Director of Budget Sees No Hope for Cutting Down Levy Without Eliminating Costs in Department.

PHILADELPHIA, April 8 (AP)—(Big, older General H. M. Trow, director of the government budget, told members of the Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce today no further reductions in income taxes would be possible unless a greater reduction in government expenditures was effected within the next two years. He said if expenditures continued in the same ratio with revenue as at present, there was no hope of a cut.

He estimated that a surplus of \$100,000,000 at the end of this year and of \$300,000,000 at the end of the next year would be necessary to make a tax reduction possible.

PACKER TRUST IS IMPOSSIBLE

JARDINE HEARS

Counsel for Armour and Company Defends Purchase of Morris Firm Before Secretary of Agriculture.

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—(Monopolistic control of the packing industry is impossible, A. R. Austrian, special counsel for Armour and company, declared today in his closing argument before Secretary Jardine, who is to determine if that company's absorption of the business of Morris and company constitutes a violation of the packers and stock yards act.

"On all the livestock markets in the United States, he said, the smaller packers are able to buy livestock at the same price the larger packers pay and he argued that unless a "concentration" of the price of raw material in the industry, it cannot create a monopoly.

Close Arguments Thursday.

Secretary Jardine announced that he would close the arguments tomorrow and take the case under advisement. He has prepared arguments on both sides of the controversy throughout the week and plans to give his decision at a later date, either re-opening the two firms of any violation of the act or sending the question to the courts for settlement.

Mr. Austrian declared that it was impossible for Armour or any other packer to control quotations of any market in the United States.

Reaction Apparent.

"The reaction of a market to any attempted manipulation," he asserted, "would be almost instantaneous, because of the multitude of interests that are watching market trends hour by hour. If the market goes down, or up, or sideways, all the markets immediately execute buying orders, sending the market back up, and if the market goes up out of line with the other markets, livestock is at once taken from other points and the market goes down."

SHIPPING BOARD FLEET SALES TO BE PUSHED, PLAN

Chairman Announces Desire to Get Rid of Ships to Americans at Earliest Possible Time; Merchant Marine Need

NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—(Rates of the United States shipping board merchant fleet to private owners who are American citizens and competent to meet the competition of foreign shipping will go forward as rapidly as possible, T. V. O'Connor, chairman of the board, said in an address tonight.

Mr. O'Connor was one of the four majority members of the shipping board to vote in favor of the sale of the five "President" class liners now operated by the Pacific Mail Steamship company on the California-Orient line, to the Dollar Steamship company. This sale is held up by injunction proceedings of the Pacific Mail which bid the board to sell the liners.

Must Make Money.

"If the American merchant marine is to be kept on the ocean for all time under private ownership, the only guarantee of such permanency is the ability of the owners to make money," Mr. O'Connor said. "I like to see the American flag carried across the oceans by private operators, but I don't want to start an operator on a trip that he cannot finish. I don't want American shipping men to become 'Little Red Riding Hoods' and be swallowed up by the wolves."

"If not enough American ship owners are willing to go on sea under the American flag," he said, "we will go to sea together. Where private profit is not possible, all of us will cheerfully divide the cost. The American flag is going to stay on the sea."

DAVIS SEES CHANGE IN LABOR VIEWPOINT IN NEXT FEW YEARS

Secretary Predicts Disappearance of Strikes and Coming of Arbitration as Means of Settling All Disputes.

PITTSBURGH, April 8 (AP)—(The day when employer and employee will think it just as desirable to fight for strikes or lockouts, as it would be for a board of directors to transact business by peeling off their coats and going at each other in a battle royal, was just decided tonight by Secretary of Labor Davis.

WAGES TO BE REDUCED.

LAWRENCE, Mass., April 8 (AP)—(The Monahan Spinning company, manufacturers of cotton yarn, announced tonight a wage reduction of approximately 10 per cent effective next Monday. The factory normally employs about 900 workers.

NEW YORK FIRM TO SELL STOCK IN CAR COMPANY

Largest Single Piece of Industrial Financing in American Banking History Proposed in Offering of Dodge Securities.

NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—(The largest single piece of industrial financing in American banking history—the sale of 100,000 shares of Dodge Brothers, Inc. stock, by the Dodge Brothers, Inc., the third largest manufacturer of automobiles in the world—will be financed tomorrow.

Dillon, Read and company, bankers, who were previously named in the prospectus from the heirs of its founders, announced tonight that the first step in the huge financing program would be inaugurated with the public offering of \$25,000,000 preferred and class A common stock. This will be followed early next week by the sale of \$75,000,000 of common stock.

Huge Offer Given.

Within a few days, as soon as title to the property has been transferred, a single check for approximately \$100,000,000 representing the net purchase price, will be drawn by the bankers to the account of the trustee of the Dodge estate. This, it is believed, will be the largest check which has ever passed in a commercial transaction.

On the basis of the net purchase price, which was recited for the first time tonight by Clarence Dillon, head of the banking firm of Dillon, Read and company, will clear an estimated profit of more than \$10,000,000 on the transaction and still retain control of the company.

The Dillon family owns approximately 500,000 shares of class B common stock in which sole voting power is vested. The indicated profit of \$10,000,000, representing the difference between the price paid for the property and the aggregate amount of securities to be sold, will be reduced several million dollars by the cost of floating the big stock and bond issue.

Interest is Large.

Public interest in the project, Mr. Dillon said, had been unprecedented for this type of transaction. Since the sale of the property was first announced, thousands of cable messages, telegrams and letters have poured in upon the bankers from prospective investors in Europe and the United States, seeking to buy securities of the stock and bond issue.

The stock and bond issue was said to be issued by the trust of application already received.

PREMIER SHOWS ITALIAN POWER

Mussolini for Second Time Assumes Personal Control of Italy's Affairs With Success.

ROME, April 8 (AP)—(Benito Mussolini, premier of Italy for the second time within a week, showed, in the opinion of political observers, that he more than any European statesman ever since Louis XIV of France, could say "I am the state."

But in both cases of his assumption of personal control of Italy's affairs, the premier's single-handed handling of the situation has marked a setback for fascism. On the heels of the settlement of military problems, Tuesday night by taking over temporarily the portfolio of minister of war, Mussolini later in the evening and this morning, indicated the knotty stock exchange situation which seemed fraught with danger to the nation's financial life.

Peace of Europe Is Menaced by Head of Hungarian Republic

First President of Hungary Breaks Long Political Silence With Denunciation of Present Chief.

MONTREAL, Quebec, April 8 (AP)—(Count Michael Karolyi, who is first president of the Hungarian republic, was marked by efforts to have the state department release him from a pledge not to discuss political affairs, broke his silence today soon after his arrival in Canada.

His comments involved almost present government of Admiral Horthy in Hungary, his reorganization and appeal to democracy in this region, he said, that not only is the safety of Hungary menaced but also the peace of Europe.

Defractions from Criticism.

He refrained from criticizing the action of the United States state department in holding him to his pledge which he admitted was taking so that his passport might be granted to permit him to visit his wife, then ill in a New York hospital.

He did criticize S. Stanswood Mackay, former president of the National Security league, who made an effort to have Countess Karolyi excluded from the United States when she arrived here for a lecture tour. It was "unjust to attack a lone woman," Count Karolyi said.

He thought she would endanger the welfare of the United States, "if a woman, not yet 30," he said.

Borist Should Be Recognized.

Count Karolyi said he thought it would be the best if soviet Russia were recognized by all the nations.

"I am not content with what has been announced that he had been approached by the emissaries of the 'Red' league, he said, but he has been brought here to Montreal, who requested that he give his word of honor not to say anything of value to the United States while on Canadian soil. Whether or not he will do so is uncertain."

NAVY OFFICIALS DISCUSS NEEDS

Three Admirals Tell of Changes in 30 Years and Talk of Aircraft Situation of Today.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8 (AP)—(The aviation controversy, the need for a naval base in San Francisco bay, and changes that have taken place in the navy in the past 30 years were discussed by three admirals of the United States fleet at a luncheon given today to senior officers by the chamber of commerce and the commercial club.

A toast was drunk to the president of the United States.

The salient points of the aviation problems were outlined by Rear Admiral W. V. Pratt, commander of battleship division four of the battle fleet. He said that the situation of the United States differs from that of European countries, where "Germany, Japan, France and to the south is Italy, with the boundaries more lines of demarcation. But our friends on the Atlantic are removed from us by 3,000 miles of water, and our nearest friends, the British, are 5,000 miles away. The problem of the Atlantic ocean is, in my opinion, the continental countries, to which it means to the continental countries."

Warning Not Obscure.

Regarding the alleged absence of the battleship he said that the moment the report of the special naval board reached the president, the entire fleet was ordered to be ready to sail at a moment's notice.

INVISIBLE RAYS OF LIGHT TO OPEN NEW FIELD IN WARFARE

Scientist Announces Discovery of Method of Secret Signaling and of Detecting Optical Frauds and Forgery.

BALTIMORE, Md., April 8 (AP)—(Invisible light rays are opening a new field in warfare, and for the detection of chemical frauds and forgeries, Dr. Robert W. Wood, professor of experimental physics at Johns Hopkins university, said tonight at a meeting of the American Chemical Society.

Infrared rays, the long light waves which ordinarily produce no color sensation on the eye, can be employed, he explained, for flashing signals which can be seen only through field glasses equipped with a special screen.

Signals can be transmitted in this manner in full sunlight from five to eight miles, he said.

Cause, Marked Change.

"It has been found that there is cause for marked change in the character of optical rays, and that, for instance, could be patented with a special screen, which however would not be readily recognized by most people," he said.

NEW YORK, April 8 (AP)—(I believe the next twenty years will see the greatest expansion and the greatest accomplishment American industry has ever known," the chairman of the board of the Bethlehem Steel corporation, in a speech before the annual meeting of the New York Building Congress today.

"It is to this end," the steel master continued, "that God has endowed this country with the vastness of natural resources and a people of the most alert inventiveness, the bravest spirit and the finest intellects."

"If I had my choice to be born again I believe I would choose to be a young man today, in the steel industry, in a building and working man attempting the meeting."

Co-operation Essential.

Co-operation between competitors in industry and domestic relations between employer and working men were the keynote of the speaker's speech. He praised himself for his long career, in which he had handled hundreds of thousands of working men, he had never had a strike.

"I believe," he said, "that among the working men of America there is more real, sound morality; more real decent living than among many of those who are called the higher class."

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FRENCH CABINET DECIDES NOT TO QUIT FOR WHILE

Financial Crisis Leads Government Heads to Consider Resigning; Change Minds Following Long Conference.

PARIS, April 9 (AP)—Holly where by so onslaught of the opposition on the senate on a minor issue yesterday the Herriot ministry virtually decided to resign, but yielding to the remonstrances of the leaders of the group making up the majority and after lengthy discussion at a cabinet meeting which lasted until an early hour this morning the government decided to remain in office.

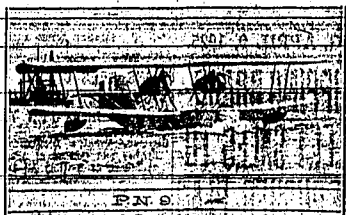
The cabinet decided to remain in office to the extent that the circumstances of the vote in the senate did not call for the government's resignation. In this vote the government received only a majority of two. In addition the cabinet decided to give up the ministerial office to the extent that the cabinet members came to the conclusion that it was their duty to defend the government's financial bill before parliament to the very end.

Announcement Made.—At the adjournment of the cabinet council a communique was issued by M. Chautemps, minister of the interior. It made no reference to the subject of the resignation of the ministry, but dealt with perfunctory matters which had come up for discussion. It stated that M. de Monzie, the finance minister, had made known to his colleagues the conditions in which the execution of the financial bill was being pursued before the chamber. The cabinet deliberated on this bill and on the necessity of bringing to the attention of the legislature the government's position on the rights of war cripples and invalids who suffered property damage during the war.

The remainder of the communique dealt with the Franco-German commercial negotiations, the early completion of which, it said, might be expected and the situation of the wheat market.

The financial bill will come up before the chamber Friday evening.

INVISIBLE RAYS OF LIGHT DISCOVERED

themselves were invisible. He told how he had utilized this principle to devise an invisible light for night use on warships and aircraft. They would not be seen by enemy submarines, although observers on other vessels of the friendly fleet could observe the lights by use of phosphorescent telescopes.

"The same principles are now used," he said, "in detecting forgeries and detecting alterations of documents. The elements used in such tests can be detected when they are illuminated by ultraviolet or infrared rays."

Measurement of Rays.—Professor Wood also explained that the invisible light waves of the spectrum had been applied in astronomical experiments which had made possible the first measurements of the distances of the planet Mars. The infrared rays had also made possible much clearer pictures of the surface markings of the planet, he said.

Professor Wood declared that the use of invisible light opened up a new field for medical research and that it might prove of value in detecting the presence of cancer and other abnormal tissues in cases where such conditions were not evident under ordinary light.

In addition to the evangelizing work the Army program includes industrial schools for malice boys and girls, homes for lepers and tuberculars, hospitals, shelters, food depots, prison work, and other social service activities.
