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# Organized Labor Outlook Outlined by Statistician

## Next Ten Years Will Be Poor for Unions Roger W. Babson Declares and Gives Reasons for His Opinion.

WASHINGTON, March 26, April 10.—There have been less strikes and labor troubles in the past few years than in the corresponding period during any of the past ten years according to the figures compiled in a report issued by Roger W. Babson, statistician and business authority.

"The fact that we are singularly free from labor troubles is no more a credit," says the statistician, "than it is a credit to a certain number of conditions that are bound to affect the trend of trade unions during the next ten years. When I have stood for or against organized labor, economic laws that are not to be trifled with have been my guide."

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# NAVY PLANS TO SEND MANNING IN POLE FLIGHT

## Ninth Expedition to Arctic Zone by Famous Explorer to Get Naval Co-operation; Will Use Airplanes.

CHICAGO, April 10 (AP)—Navy plans for co-operation in the ninth expedition into the Arctic zone of Donald H. MacMillan next June have been completed except for action by the entire government, according to Eugene F. McDonald Jr. of Chicago, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, who returned today from Washington, where he represented MacMillan. The explorer will be honored for a conference with Mr. McDonald.

The expedition will leave Boston, said Mr. McDonald, with an advance base at the northern tip of Axel Heiberg land, or if the ice permits, even farther to the north. The expedition will last for 100 days more than previously has been expected, only through months of arctic toil.

Map Taking Complete. Each of the three airplanes will be equipped with map taking cameras for taking maps of the entire area. The width of the expedition is expected that new lands will be discovered. 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# HUN CHEMISTRY THREATENS BIG U. S. INDUSTRY

## Germany Making Synthetic Wood Alcohol in Direct Competition With Manufacturers of This Country.

BALTIMORE, April 10 (AP)—American chemists are alarmed that the United States is threatened with extinction by German chemistry, it was declared at the meeting of the American Chemical Society here.

Germany are making synthetic methanol, formerly known as wood alcohol, from water gas and are absorbing the American production of methanol from hardwood which will wipe out.

Another forward step of German scientists was described by Franz Fisher, director of the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute at Muelheim, who said that a process clearly related to that by which synthetic methanol is reduced is being employed to manufacture liquid motor fuels from water gas.

## TRUCK REPLACES HORSE FOR EXPRESS DELIVERY

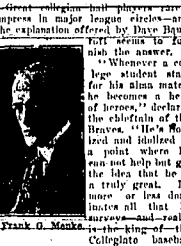

Ruth's temperature was 100 today, one degree less than yesterday. He spent the day quietly in St. Vincent's hospital, eating no more except his wife and small daughter, Dorothy, with whom he joked about his illness. He also felt able to read the newspaper, which printed columns about his condition.

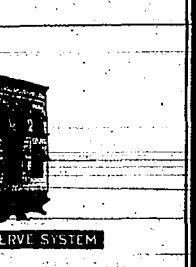
