WEEVIL STILL MENACE TO ALFALFA CROP HERE

Alfalfa weevils are present in fields in this region in such numbers as to threaten considerable damage this season unless adequate provision is made for control of the pest, according to F. E. Whitehead of Boise, University of Idaho extension division entomologist, who visited Twin Falls and vicinity Wednesday to inquire into prevalence of the weevil and probability of serious damage from this source.

Mr. Whitehead inspected several alfalfa fields in the vicinity and collected a number of weevils. He pronounced an enormous rather prevalent pest that dry weather last summer followed by severe winter had removed danger of great damage from weevils.

He advised growers to place their orders at once for sufficient supply of calcium arsenate to control the pest in their fields, and stated that the supply available here now is inadequate to meet probable demands, while postponement of ordering involves risk that it may not be available at the proper season.
