WHEELER TELLS JURY STORY OF OIL LAND DEAL

Montanan Relates Business Connection With Operator and Leaves Matter Up to 12 Men in Box.

GREAT FALLS, April 26 (AP)—Telling the entire story of his connection with the Bunker Canyon oil deal, operator, in the hands of the jury that will decide whether or not he wrongfully used his influence before a government department, Senator George H. Wheeler, on the witness stand in his own behalf, admitted today that he was threatened with a fine of \$10,000 by the department of the interior.

Not an Appearance. It is admitted that he took up on himself the burden of the case, and Edwin S. Booth, then department solicitor, testified that his action did not constitute an appearance, and that it was something he would have done for any Montana citizen on request. The accused senator was on the stand for four hours and the district attorney did not conduct his cross-examination when court adjourned for the night.

When Senator Wheeler leaves the stand the question of adjourning ceased the arrival of other witnesses for the case will be decided. The other witnesses were called by the prosecution in an attempt to controvert the testimony of George P. Hayes, New York attorney, who deposed that he had wheeled in New York in March, 1923, and was asked to appear before the interior committee in Washington in behalf of Campbell, with the promise of a large fee.

Dennis Hayes' Story. The second accuser, already deposed Hayes, testified that he was introduced to the attorney by the chief of the office, Senator Thomas Walsh. "I met George P. Hayes in New York," he said emphatically, "I never heard of him until he appeared before the Daugherty committee in Washington in March, 1923."

Senator Wheeler declared that he was introduced to the committee by Attorney General Clegg, who was then in charge of the Daugherty committee. He previously testified to the receipt of the two million dollar check from the Daugherty committee, but showed no indication of ever having seen it before.

"I questioned Hayes sharply before the committee in regard to a case in which he was appearing," said Senator Wheeler, "but I never saw the man before that. I certainly never saw him in New York."

Attorney Brings Action Against Paper Owned by Manufacturer for Story Printed.

Detroit, Mich., April 26 (AP)—Damages to the amount of \$1,000,000 were asked in a suit filed in the United States district court here today against the Detroit Free Press and the Dearborn Publishing company, which has owned the paper since it was founded by Henry Ford, an attorney, who has been connected personally with co-operative marketing and distribution of farm and fruit products throughout the country. The suit charged that certain articles published in the Dearborn Free Press, which were published by Ford, have injured him as an attorney and deprived him of "dividend, gain, reward and compensation" which he otherwise might have obtained.

Eastern Colorado in Need of Irrigation Water, reports Say

DENVER, April 26 (AP)—Many portions of eastern Colorado are in need of irrigation water, reports say. The supply of water for irrigation purposes has been restricted sharply at Golden, Loveland, Longmont and Fort Collins. The supply of water imported from the west has only a four months' supply of water imported and laws sprinkling has been curtailed to a great extent.

NEW IMMIGRANT PLAN DISCUSSED

Detailed Study Ordered by Secretary for Examination of Arrivals in U. S.

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—Detailed study of a proposal by Secretary Davis for examination of immigrants at points of entry in the United States, with a view of making the plan effective as soon as possible, was begun today at the conference of representatives of the immigration service, the public health service and the department of justice. The plan is designed eventually to eliminate immigration stations at ports of entry in this country, including Ellis Island, and to have the examination of immigrants retained at points of entry in the United States, in the belief that they would be admitted.

Liquid Vanishes at Treasury Building; Probe to be Started

BAN FRANCISCO, April 26 (AP)—Seven hundred gallons of alcohol liquor have disappeared from the United States sub-treasury building and the customs house, it was reported today by Marshall Frederick Poole, who held a hearing on the matter today at the sub-treasury building and was prepared to destroy it. What became of the liquor is still a mystery. The government buildings which it was stored, made the subject of a searching investigation tomorrow.

SALT LAKE GUTTED BY FIRE; DAMAGE WILL RUN HIGH

Famous Salt Lake Resort Almost Entirely Destroyed by Flames Fanned by 25-Mile Wind; Loss Set \$600,000.

SALT LAKE CITY, April 26 (AP)—The nationally famous Salt Lake resort on the shore of the Great Salt Lake 20 miles west of here was gutted by fire today and damage is estimated at upward of \$600,000. The flames were fanned by a 25-mile wind and spread rapidly. Salt Lake was built in 1893 by the Mormon church and each year was visited by thousands of tourists especially during the winter in the busy season of the lake, it being impossible for a human to stay.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26 (AP)—Ludell Bell, fruit broker of this city and St. Louis, was sentenced to a total of 330 years in the federal penitentiary today following his conviction on charges of violating the Interstate Commerce act. He was given five years on each of 186 counts. However, all but three of the terms are to run concurrently, that he will only have to serve 16 years in prison. In addition, he was fined a total of \$25,000.

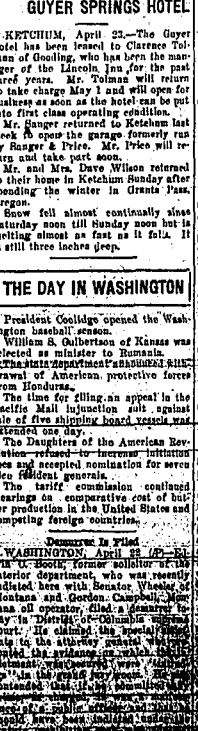

ACCOMMODATION ARRANGED FOR AUTO TOURISTS

Chamber of Commerce Arranges to Open Old Park while Permitting Growth of Grass and Trees on New.

Twin Falls new tourist park at the end of Main avenue west is not to be opened this season, but lawn grass, trees and shrubs that have been planted on the site are to be permitted to grow undisturbed during the next few months, according to an agreement between the park committee and the chamber of commerce, which has charge of the improvement of the new park.

The new park grounds, as well as being planted with lawn grass and white clover have been sown 400 bent trees and shrubs, and a tower near have been set out and a few weeks will witness a transformation in the appearance of the premises.

Accommodations Arranged
Arrangements for the accommodation of Twin Falls tourist guests this season have been completed, it was stated Wednesday through agreement between the park committee and H. F. Hoover, proprietor of a private camp ground on Blue Lakes boulevard south grounds on Locust street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues east that have been used heretofore as Twin Falls tourist park, later here again, and as soon as the volume of tourist travel requires it, these premises will be made available to the public. The D. S. church will convene here Saturday and Sunday, April 25 and 26. There will be in attendance members of the general church authorities from Salt Lake. During the period in which a physical valuation of all of the railroads in the United States was taken, under the La Follette act, he had charge of a large part of this work in California, Arizona, New Mexico and Nevada. He plans to go to Georgia to see the maintenance engineer, who, while in the partnership of South Dakota. He has worked also in Montana, having had charge of highway construction there for the United States bureau of public roads.
