NORMAL SCHOOL CANDIDATES ARE ACTIVE IN BOISE

State Board of Education to Select Commissioner and President of Lewiston Teaching School.

BOISE, April 23 (AP)—Candidates for the positions of commissioner of education and president of the Lewiston state normal school rounded up all reinforcements today preparing for the final meeting of the state board of education which it opens its meeting in the capital tomorrow morning.

So far as could be learned this afternoon all members of the board will be present as follows:

Board Members: Montington Taylor of Coeur d'Alene, president; Stanley Dutton of Kootenai, J. A. Lippincott of Idaho City; Mrs. J. O. Gray of Boise; Miss Elizabeth Thomas, state superintendent of public instruction and Olney S. Blair of Idaho Falls, the new member of the board. It will be Mr. Blair's first meeting.

Literally hundreds of letters were received and it is reported that there are several hundred candidates for the position of president of the Lewiston school. For the commissioner, P. R. Sherman, mayor of the city and C. H. West, superintendent of schools. Miss Ethel E. Redfield, executive secretary of the state board, has been mentioned by her friends but just how far she is pushing her candidacy for this position is not known.

HOSPITAL SUIT ON FOR HEARING

Validity of Standardization Rule at Issue in Action Assigned for Trial by Court.

Trial before Judge W. A. Dabcock in district court here has been assigned to open today in the suit instituted by Porter M. Lambing against the board of commissioners of Twin Falls county attacking the validity of regulations adopted for standardization of Twin Falls county general hospital.

Validity of a provision of the regulations that has been questioned as excluding chiropractors and osteopaths from practice in the hospital is at issue in the case. J. W. Taylor, county attorney, heretofore has furnished to the county commissioners an opinion setting forth conclusions denying the validity of such exclusion. Plaintiff Lambing is represented by Wolske and Willey, attorneys.

PIONEER GOES TO FINAL REST

P. H. Smith Answers Last Summons Closing Long and Active Career.

P. H. Smith, one of the pioneer citizens of Twin Falls, who was for nearly 30 years actively identified with the development of this region in which he had broad and enduring faith, died early Thursday morning at his home, 409 Seventh avenue north, following an illness of about four months. He was 76 years old.

Business services for Mr. Smith are to be held at 9 o'clock Thursday morning in St. Edward's Catholic church, 208 W. Woodlock, N. W. Neighbor 12, 1851, Mr. Smith engaged in business for 20 years in Boston and for about seven years in Brooklyn from which city he came to Twin Falls in September, 1905. With the enthusiasm over Twin Falls country and its future that was one of his outstanding characteristics throughout the remainder of his life, Mr. Smith, during the first week of his residence here purchased about 800 acres of farm land, and although his previous experience had been largely in real estate, he was referred to as a farmer.

During his first year, Mr. Smith, in association with J. Walter Craven, under the name of the Pioneer Storage and Warehouse company built Twin Falls' first warehouse that was situated on Fourth avenue south.

He handled and circulated the subscription list by means of which funds were raised by Twin Falls pioneer citizens for building of the first Shoshone bank east of the foot of Shoshone that was replaced a few years later by a new structure. It formed an important link for transportation between the territories on each side of the chasm.

One of the most companionable of men, Mr. Smith was native in early day social and fraternal circles and was one of the charter members of Twin Falls lodge of Elks, serving that organization for a number of years in the position of secretary.

Maintaining an active interest in political affairs, Mr. Smith served with former Governor Hawley as delegate to the democratic convention in Baltimore which nominated Woodrow Wilson for the presidency. He introduced William J. Bryan on the occasion of the convention's first visit to Twin Falls.

Mr. Smith was joined here soon after his arrival in Twin Falls by his wife, who was Miss Ella E. Howe, of Paris, N. Y., to whom he was married in 1874. They celebrated their fifteenth wedding anniversary last November.
