TWIN FALLS MAN WINS PLACE IN LEWISTON GUN CLUB CONTEST

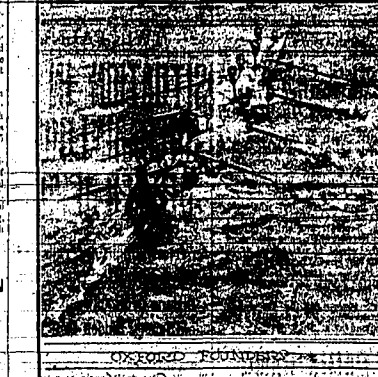

CHAIN OF MONUMENTS TO BRITISH HEROES ENIRCLE THE GLOBE

LONDON, April 25 (Special to the News).—A chain of monuments to the British heroes of the world is being planned by the Imperial War Graves Commission. The beginning of the chain is in the graveyards on the Channel shores of France and Belgium, extending in an almost unbroken line to the Congo, continues in Switzerland and on through Italy to Macedonia, the Balkans, Gallipoli and Smyrna to Syria and Palestine to cross the Head of Olive.

The chain breaks there into two sections, one passing through Egypt to East Africa and the other going eastward to Mesopotamia, India and China before crossing Australia and New Zealand on the way to Canada and Great Britain and Ireland.

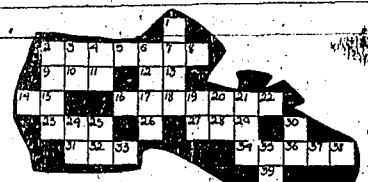

Quebec of Today

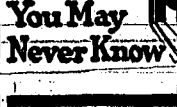
No city in the New world has a more romantic history than famous old Quebec founded by Samuel de Champlain in 1608. Its site marked the beginning of the history of Canada, its capture by Wolfe the end of the French regime. Here are buildings dating from Champlain's time. The houses which once 4,000 people were begun in 1647. Finished in 1695 one of the most touching works of faith in our whole history—considering the number of deaths that the history. It is still an old French town in many respects, although in other respects a bustling Canadian city.

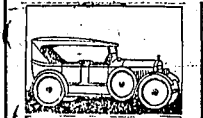
This is the ruling: Assuming that the competitor's ball lay within 20 yards of the hole when he played the stroke, he must be held to have struck the person standing at the hole (Stroke Rule 13, article 1), and an incurred a penalty of two strokes. The caddy should have an official that the flag stick should come flying before allowing his master to play.

Here are more puzzling matters that arise in the noble game of snuck-the-globe-and-the-chessal-together with the answers made by the committee.

Match Play.

A and B, whose handicaps had not been touched for years, start in match play competition. Under the handicap B receives one hole. At sixteenth hole B is in dummy (reworking 2 up and 1) the hole received on his handicap having exceeded his money. A won and two holes and match was decided.

Answer-It was D's duty to see that the hole which he was conceded was counted. As he did not do so, the original match was halved and D's protest can not be entertained. If the conditions of the tournament state that halved matches shall be replayed and the stipulated course was 18 holes, the match committee was certainly right to make A and B play 18 holes.

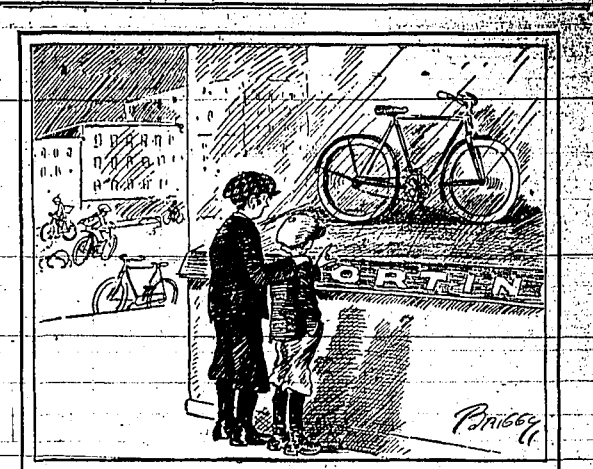

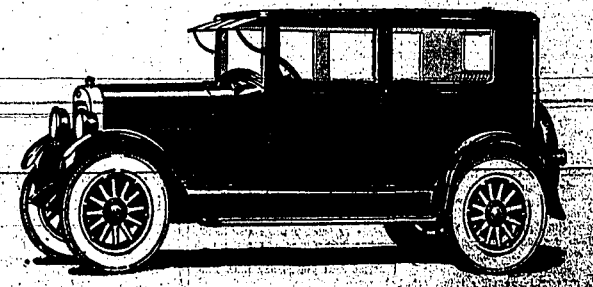
