NEW PROPOSALS TO BE MADE AT GENEVA PARLEY

American Delegates to International Conference to Receive Several New Suggestions on Arms Control Plans.

GENEVA, May 1 (AP)—Several new suggestions on matters not covered in the draft convention will probably be admitted to the American delegates to the international conference on the control of the trade in arms and munitions after the session goes under way on Monday.

Representative Charles E. Burton and virtually the entire American delegation reached Geneva today and proceeded at once to the preliminary work which the conference necessitates.

Prevention discussions have taken the form of a new basis because the report that the British delegation may not only present a series but go to the limit of offering an entirely new draft convention as a substitute.

Mr. Burton declared today to discuss the nature of the conflict American suggestions or commit himself on the American program in general but the impression here is that the Americans probably will not take the same active part in the arms conference that they did in the opinion conference where representative Sir H. Fortner made a strong fight for the American principle of "deeds" opinion.

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Real Estate Held a Sound Investment by R. W. Babson

Statistician Analyzes Various Types of Real Estate Opportunities to be Had; Gives Reasons for Choices.

BABSON PARK, ass., as 1—(Special to The News)—A record volume of real estate transactions, together with continued building boom, are leading permits were 11 per cent higher for March than the same month last year—has attracted much attention to the real estate market as an opportunity for investment. Roger W. Babson's analysis of the various real estate investment, made public today, is, therefore, of unusual interest.

"Real estate may or may not be a good investment," says the statistician, "depending upon three things: the fundamental situation and prospect for general business, the relative position of real estate in regard to other investments, and the position of the particular real estate investment under consideration."

Fundamental Conditions.

"Fundamental conditions and the general economic situation are of first importance because they control both the price and marketability of property. As an investment, the outlook is sound, real estate values tend to climb and building is active. As we pass a peak and recede toward depression, real estate real estate field tend to freeze rather than actually decline. It is not so much the fact that the market is active, but property actually declines but that it is impossible to sell it because no one is buying. It is just before we enter such a period because you are trying your money away for a few years with little chance for substantial gain, but you see an increase is concerned the latest figures on assessment values and their trend between 1912 and 1924 show an increase of 76.4 per cent for the United States during these ten years, an average gain of about 8 per cent a year. This indicates that real estate has not only held its value but has advanced and is looking for a bright future."

Method of Selection.

Questioned regarding the method of selecting a home as an investment, Mr. Babson gave the following suggestions:

"It is very difficult to lay down blanket rules for buying real estate because the value of the property must be judged on its own merits but the average man I would advise judging his prospective purchase on the following points: First, he should ascertain the direction of the growth of his city and be sure that he is investing property in line with it. There should be analyzed the zoning laws or probable zoning laws and see how they will affect the value of the property. He has in mind, finally, he should remember that the marketability of the property will depend upon the relative frequency of the sale of the house he is buying or building. The house should be in keeping with others in the neighborhood and as a value will be judged on the number of rooms and the size of the land on which it is located. Many people build homes to their own particular fancy and spend much money on little things that will not add to the value of the property materially."

"These cents may be justified as far as the long run is concerned, but from an investment angle, unique features should be avoided. Perhaps the most buyers will not like them and in any event it is impossible to be willing to pay an extra price for a house that will not sell for more than the price paid for it when you are to sell and make an on your investment. It is necessary, of course, that the price you pay be in keeping with other real estate in the neighborhood."

"So far as fundamental conditions are concerned," concluded Mr. Babson, "normal business as reflected by the industrial and the foundation is sound. There is nothing in the business outlook to argue against the purchase of well selected real estate as an investment."

"The average man should not venture in real estate until he has a good understanding of a home. The advantages of home ownership are many and the economic value of the transaction probably less important than several other considerations such as convenience, comfort and safety of mind. Judge carefully, but all should be investigated carefully before they are purchased."

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BEAN GROWERS CLOSE SEASON WITH BANQUET

Dean E. J. Jiddings Speaker at Fellowship Occasion for Producers When Final Payment Is Distributed.

Southern Idaho Bean Growers' association members, at an annual fellowship banquet held in the Hotel Perrine here Friday evening, marked the close of the marketing season, participated in the distribution of \$125,000 on account of their 1924 crops, and bestowed to several addresses on the cooperative marketing movement in general and the work of this association in particular.

The payment made Friday was the last one of a series of payments on account of the 1924 crop, totaling in all to about \$700,000. The price paid for the beans was a fraction less than \$4.00 per hundred pounds. The association's overhead expenses during the year amounted to three and one-half per cent of the total revenue, several expenses being reduced during the past year by itself as compared with those of the preceding year.

Dean Jiddings urged the growers' organization to continue to increase volume and variety of production and marketing conditions at large. He defended business of such reports by the cooperative marketing culture, attacking the objection that operators used these reports to their advantage and desiring that the operators find their own sources of information, while producers had only the department's reports. He traced the history of cooperative marketing which, he declared, is an essential factor for successful agriculture in the new era that has entered, following the close of the world war.

Other speakers were Judge E. A. Walters, who spoke on "The Association from the Banker's Viewpoint"; Arthur B. Swain, who discussed "The Association from the Business Viewpoint"; Dr. L. H. Giffen, president of the association, who discussed "What Cooperation Means to the Association"; and G. F. Buckner of the Idaho Wholesale company, marketing agency for the association, who spoke on "The Great National Bean and Lin. Plan in the Market and Marketing Problems of 1924."

NEER'S JERSEYS SCORE HONORS

Herd of five cows leads Association's List for Production During Past Month.

A herd of five Jersey cows owned by P. D. Neer, Twin Falls, produced during the month of April an average of 1270 pounds of milk and 483 pounds of butterfat, and led the Pioneer Cow Testing association herds for the month, according to report of A. C. Hickey, tester in charge, which was made public Friday.

Best, a Holstein owned by J. B. Long, Haha, scored individual honors for the month with a production of 170 pounds of milk and 74 pounds of butterfat.

Out of 347 cows comprising 21 herds tested during the month, 70 produced more than 1000 pounds of milk. The association's average production of milk was 702 pounds of milk and 21 pounds of butterfat.

A herd of four Jerseys and Holsteins owned by L. W. Champion, Twin Falls, scored second place for the month with average production of 952 pounds of milk and 427 pounds of butterfat. Herd of 17 Jerseys owned by J. B. Long, Haha, was third, with average production of 1100 pounds of milk and 414 pounds of butterfat.

Fatty, a Jersey cow owned by Carl B. Irwin, Twin Falls, was second on the list of individual high cows, with production of 149 pounds of milk and 71 pounds of butterfat. Spot, a Holstein owned by L. J. Tomkins, Twin Falls, was third with production of 2070 pounds of milk and 623 pounds of butterfat.
