FRANCE INSISTS ON SECURITY AT GENEVA MEETING

Nation Through Spokesman at Arms Traffic Conference Announces Stand on Disarmament Problem.

GENEVA, May 6 (AP)—France, through her eloquent parliamentarian, Paul Boncour, who presides over the French commission of national defense, has made her position on the disarmament problem clear. She insists that any security must be the product of disarmament. Addressing the international conference on the control of arms and munitions today, he repeated his great national effort of the last session recently when he defended the Geneva peace protocol. While he pleaded for that reign of mutual confidence and spirit of national assistance among nations which would permit the world to decrease its burden of armaments, M. Boncour contended that the successful issue of the present conference would not be made possible if it were to ignore the present situation of the world. He pointed out that the world is still in a state of arms race, and that the only way to bring about a permanent peace is through disarmament. He announced that France will stand firm on her position, and that she will not be swayed by any other nation's demands.

Outcome of Security

UNION CAMPAIGN MEETS APPROVAL

Legislative Council of American Federation of Labor Plans to Enlist Members.

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP)—The most elaborate campaign for organization of nonunion workers ever undertaken in the United States was approved today at the annual meeting of the legislative council of the American Federation of Labor as a representative of 108 international unions.

The United States and Canada will be divided into five districts to each of which will be assigned a district group, operating under supervision of the Washington headquarters. It is planned that the campaign will be conducted during the summer months, with the campaign which will continue for several months. Expenditures for the organizations interested, about \$125,000 being voluntarily pledged at today's meeting for the preliminary campaign.

SEED GROWERS ADVISED HOW TO GET INSPECTION

BOHEMIA, May 6 (AP)—Producers of grain, Idaho clover, alfalfa and cowpea, will apply for certification before the state seed commission. The commission will accompany their request by a \$2 fee, according to H. A. Mason, state seed commissioner. The request for inspection and the fee must be filed with either the county agent or Mr. Allison before June 1. Mr. Allison says it is a condition of all requests to be in compliance with the numerous field inspections to be made during the season.

Hierarchies for inspections will be made up at that time and only the fields that are listed will be inspected. These requirements apply to growers who have received field inspection certificates on alfalfa acreage in previous years and will not be inspected again, and to those who have big grain and small seed this spring. Growers who have the field inspection certificate need not send in the fee.

Seed produced by growers who have not made requests for inspection this season or who have not received the fee will not be recognized as having seed eligibility for certification.
