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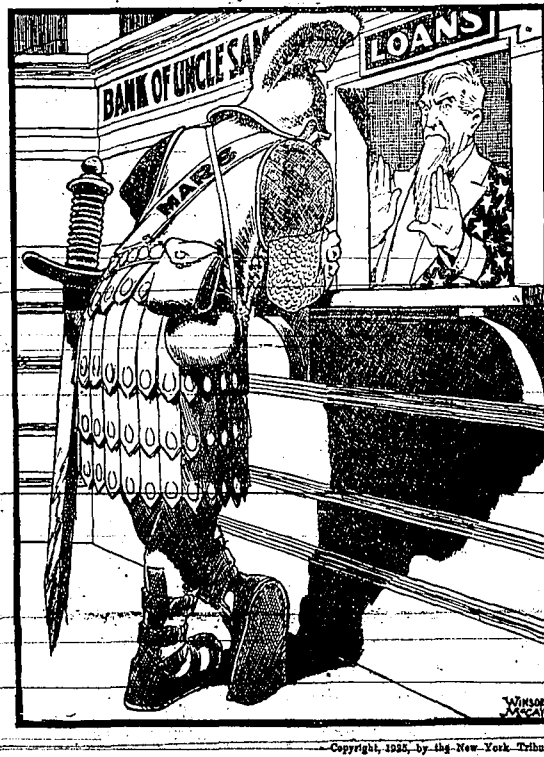
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# OPPORTUNITY LOOMS WITH CELEBRATION

# LITTLE CONCERN OVER WAR DEBTS

### French Accept Rumors of Settlement Plans with Unruffled Equanimity.

PARIS, May 12.—Paris heard in quiet succession first, that the United States government was going to ask France to pay her debts and, second, that the cabinet at Washington denied this report.  
The report and the denial had about an equal effect for the debts here come to be looked upon as part of a Banque's ghost which will not down, and early funding negotiations are regarded as inevitable, if not already an accomplished fact.  
There is even talk of an eventual scaling down of the amount borrowed from the American treasury. The Paris Herald government, it is learned in diplomatic circles, abandoned all claim to eventual reduction, and it is understood that the present government has given no indication that it proposes to dispute the payment of the total sum borrowed, although M. Caillaux, the former finance minister, in public utterances shortly before returning to power, drew upon the treasury in principle that France should pay to the last cent while unable to recover what was owing her from the powers that devoured a section of the country.  
One thing that seems well established is that Mr. Caillaux requires early funding as necessary preliminary to permanent arrangement in French exchange. He is expected to make some move in this direction when the urgent task of raising three billion francs a year more revenue to make the French treasury more secure is accomplished.

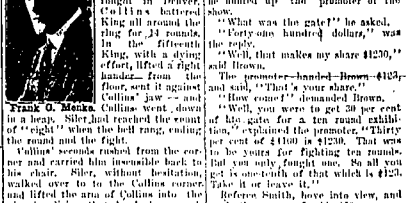

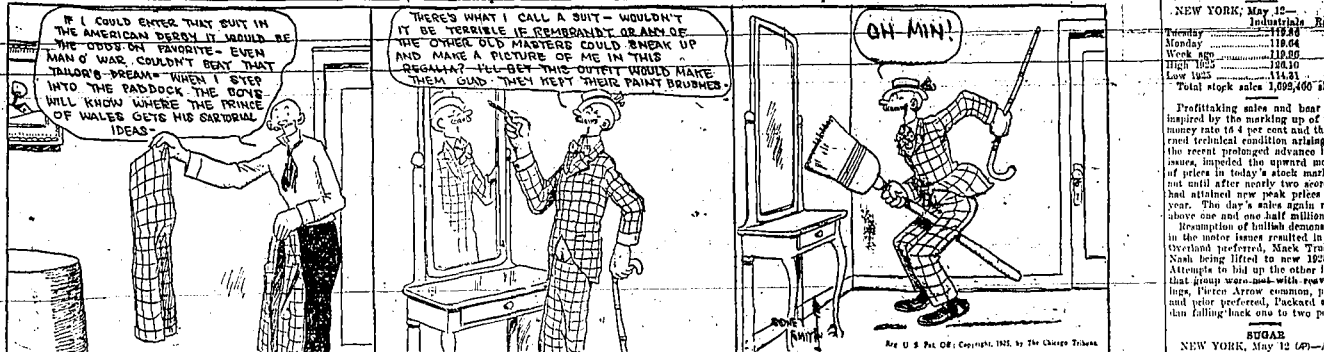
