MEMPHIS FORDS BUILDING TO BUY 400 U. S. SHIPS

Detroit Auto Manufacturer May Purchase Shipping Board Vessels if Price is Right, According to Story.

DETROIT, May 13 (AP)—Henry Ford will purchase the 400 vessels of the United States shipping board if government will fix what can be paid for them, according to a story which was first reported in the Detroit Free Press tomorrow morning.

Mr. Ford is quoted as asking Mr. Ford to take over 200 ships in his original suggestion, the article says. However when Ford informed him that he would only buy the ships to scrap them for junk, Mr. O'Connor suggested that he buy all and as would not scrap them.

Mr. Ford agreed to this saying that he might retain from 10 to 30 of the ships for use by Ford. He said that any ships were put in operation they would be reconditioned and equipped with all necessary machinery.

Despite the tentative agreement, the matter of the sale of the ships to Mr. Ford will not be set for any further action until the next meeting of the shipping board in several months, it is indicated.

The ships were built during the war when they were made by the shipbuilders who were then quoted as saying, "Most of the ships were thrown together in a great hurry. They were made by emergency and consequently many of them were not strongly built and some of the engines had in them were pretty hot."

"We have already purchased three vessels from the shipping board," he added in a statement. "I am going to sell them for scrap and we know their limitations. Two of the boats are of about 1919 vintage, the East Indian, is slightly larger and is being put into shape for service."

MRS. SHEPHERD ABSOLVED FROM MURDER CHARGE

Cook County Grand Jury Does Not Think Wife of Her Had Anything to Do With Death of Millionaire Orphan.

CHICAGO, May 13 (AP)—The county grand jury today absolved Mrs. J. G. Shepherd, a woman and daughter of the late William Daring Shepherd, millionaire orphan, of implication in his death and in the death of his mother, Mrs. Emily Nelson McClinton, who jury voted a "no bill" in each instance.

The grand jury today acted after hearing more than a score of witnesses in less than two hours. Its decision was not unexpected as a leading Chicago, state's attorney, had said the notion of the coroner's jury and the trial of Mrs. Shepherd, due to start next Monday. He had indicated he would not be connected with the case to sustain a charge against Mrs. Shepherd in either death. Some of the witnesses were not connected with the trial.

The principal involved in the investigation had little to say at its conclusion. Shepherd said he was glad his wife had been "indicted" and while Judge Harry Olson, who supervised the investigation leading to the indictment, said he had no comment to offer.

Young McClinton died last December in a hospital fever which the doctor maintained was contracted from germs administered to the youth by Shepherd's mother in an effort to protect the \$100,000 estate; the bulk of which was will be to Shepherd. Mrs. McClinton was not in the hospital, but a large amount of poison was found.

MAZATLAN, Sinaloa, Mexico, May 13 (AP)—A plot said to have been hatched by adherents of the agrarian party, to assassinate Governor de la Vega of the state of Sinaloa was frustrated last week when 400 men were arrested as they entered the city, bearing concealed arms. It was revealed here today by government authorities.

The authorities gained information about the alleged plot and all persons entering the city were searched for arms. The men entered in small groups but all the weapons were discovered. The men probably will be charged with complicity for which the penalty is death.

PROPER TARIFF ONLY NEED OF FARMER, REPORT

Agriculture Will Be Able to Solve Its Own Problems if Protection is Given Delegates Believe.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. May 13 (AP)—Agriculture will be able to solve its own problems if it is given proper tariff protection in the coming session of congress, representatives of 21 farm organizations declared here today in the closing session of a conference called for the purpose of reaching an agreement on measures that would be considered at the session.

The one specific legislative request for which the conference met on Tuesday was the creation of an agricultural corporation. The farmers do not want a government subsidy, the council declared, but the opportunity of working out the problem of representation added by proper legislative proposals.

The council was authorized to bring about joint action of all farm organizations with respect to economic and legislative proposals both general and national.

It was proposed to effect marketing credit facilities, that will guarantee a profit for the farmer and to effect cooperative movements to all branches of the industry.

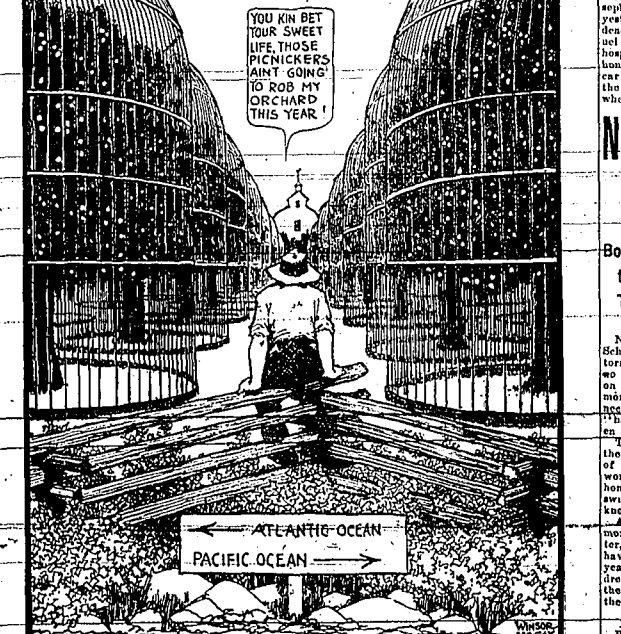
