AMERICA TAKES STEPS TO GET MONEY BACK

After More Than Three Years, Washington Government Initiates Measures to Obtain Settlement from Debtors.

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—After more than three years of waiting, the United States has initiated steps to obtain foreign governments' settlement of their war debts.

All Awaits of Approval. The other principal debtors, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Latvia and Greece, are also aware of Washington's view, and it was not until their fight whether American diplomatic officials in those countries have been asked to convey settlement suggestions.

France has been informed by Ambassador Herrick that the American government would be pleased if a French commission would be sent to discuss a funding proposal, inasmuch as France is now the largest debtor, this plan of the general debtors was regarded as not without some significance.

No Distinction. Simultaneously with the disclosure of the move to develop action on the part of the foreign governments, an expression emanated from official sources that the American government could not permit a distinction between loans for prosecution of the world war, those for post war relief or unpaid bills on the sale of surplus supplies.

FEW RUM SHIPS STILL HANG ON AFTER BLOCKADE

Only Twelve Boats Laden With Liquor Now Remain Off Atlantic Coast Where 80 Were Formerly at Anchor.

NEW YORK, May 16 (AP)—Only twelve ships, manned by dejected crews, remain of more than eighty rum row floating liquor westward after two days of the coast guard's blockade of the Atlantic coast.

The figure is official. The rum runners were checked up in an inspection cruise of a dispatch carrier and representatives of press associations which was concluded today. For four days, Lieutenant Commander Stephen Venable, in command of the coast guard's command, Rear Admiral Hilliard and who is known as the "Black Cat" of the Atlantic coast, kept a close watch on the rum rowers from the north to the Atlantic City on the south with the news paper observers aboard the coast guard cutter Pequot.

Comprehensive Cruise The inspection cruise, probably the most comprehensive ever made of the mid-Atlantic rum area which Commander Venable termed a "black cat" cruise, revealed that little if any, contraband liquor is getting ashore through New York, along inland, New England or New Jersey channels. Through these channels, up to May 15, the day the coast guard began to get under way, flowed the greatest flood of liquor that the government has had to contend against, the coast guard officials admitted.

DARROW PLANS TO AID TEACHER

Noted Chicago Lawyer Will Defend Educator Accused of Teaching Evolution.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., May 16 (AP)—Offer of Clarence Darrow of Chicago and Dudley Field Malone of New York, nationally known lawyers, to aid in the defense of J. T. Hoopes, teacher in the Dayton, Tenn., public school who is charged with violating the law forbidding the teaching of evolution was accepted today by John B. Neal, counsel for the defendant.

Mrs. Neal's telegram of acceptance says: "Your telegram proffering your services in the anti-evolution trial case just received. The question is not whether evolution is true or untrue, but whether the freedom of teaching, or what is more important, the freedom of learning. As we see it, the great question is whether the Tennessee legislature has the power to prohibit the teaching of evolution from knowing the thoughts of the world's greatest scientists and thus prevent them from forming their own judgment in regard to questions of life and science. We regard it as equally un-American and therefore unconstitutional whether it is largely or wholly un-American to attempt to limit the human mind in its inquiries for truth. I am sure Professor Hoopes will welcome your assistance in his defense."

(Continued from Page 1) and a fellow of the foundation who studied the results of the Tokio disaster of 1923 on the ground, estimated that at least 75 per cent of the loss could be eliminated by foresight and decision such as is embodied in the foundation's program. The foundation proposes to have earthquake maps prepared for each city of the northeastern area and to stimulate seismological research. Its staff also is working with such problems as how transportation could be carried on in an earthquake emergency when subways and elevated roads may be put out of business; what buildings are safe under conditions of shock and how new buildings should be put up; the whole relation of all stores to earthquake hazard; the best ways to prevent panic and check it; the functions of the army, navy and police in such an emergency; how fire-alarms might be checked and food and shelter brought to a stricken population.

(Continued from Page 1) negotiating funding settlements and that only five nations stand availed themselves of the privilege thereby extended. The treasury holds demand notes of all debtor nations save Great Britain, Finland, Poland, Hungary, and Lithuania, to whom it gave financial assistance. A billion and a half dollars in interest has accrued on the demand notes.

Official comment on the steps initiated by the state department upon suggestions from treasury and debt commission officials was rare, but it was indicated the American government was sincerely anxious to reduce the debt questions to a purely business basis. In other words, the official view was that the notes held should be converted into definite term obligations with fixed dates and payments, however small the latter might be.

TRIAL OF HEIR OPENS SOON IN CHICAGO COURT

William D. Shepherd, Accused of Murdering Millionaire Orphan, to Begin Fight for His Life Monday.

CHICAGO, May 16 (AP)—With both prosecution and defense practicing with difficulty in selecting a jury and choosing of other preliminaries, William D. Shepherd will go to trial for his life before Judge Thomas J. Lynch Monday on a charge of murdering his foster son, William Nelson McMillan, to obtain his fortune, estimated at more than \$1,000,000.

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URGES BIBLE STUDY CREDITS

Rev. W. A. Squires of Philadelphia; Speaker at Sunday School Convention.

A 300 per cent increase in the last eight years in the practice of granting high school credit for Bible study is reported by Rev. W. A. Squires of the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education, Philadelphia, Penn., who is to be one of the speakers at the Sunday School convention to be held at Twin Falls, May 20 to 22.

This survey by Mrs. Squires shows that 10 states now officially recognize the plan of giving credit in high school for study of the Bible done either in the high school building or in churches. In addition, 10 other states follow the same plan without official sanction of the state authorities. There are only 19 states in which high school credit is not offered for Bible study.

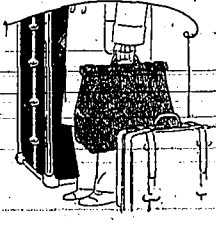

Metric and rhyme are among the chief pleasures of the child, and in the history of literature, poetry precedes prose. The adjective superstitious is derived from the Latin noun, superstitionem, which means a superstitious belief and is less contempt as by an elevation of the eyebrow, denoting indignity proud, arrogant, conceited.

States' Quarrel Adjusted

In 1907 a suit was brought by the state of Virginia against the state of West Virginia in the United States Supreme court to compel the latter state to assume its proportion of the state debt created prior to 1861, when West Virginia separated from the other states. The suit was pending in the Supreme court until June, 1915, when that body handed down a decision holding that West Virginia should pay Virginia \$12,000,000 as its net share of the debt. In addition West Virginia was required to pay \$3,750,000 in interest. The court held, however, that West Virginia was entitled to a share of the assets arising from the original principal debt, and that that amount is \$2,000,000.

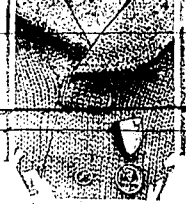

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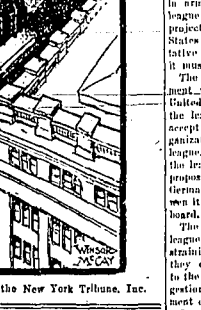
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AMUNDSEN WAITS AN OPPORTUNITY

Safeguard from Influenza.



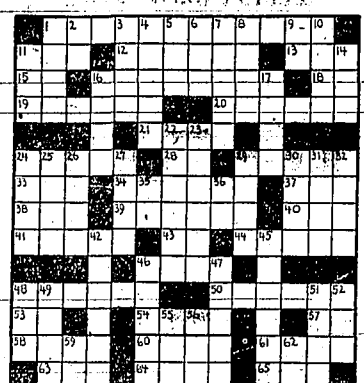

EXONERATE MOTORISTS JEROME-CHILD'S DEATH

Henry Hancock, five year old, son of Heber C. Hancock, who suffered fatal injuries when he was struck by an automobile on the road near the family residence four miles west of Jerome, wife the victim of an unavoidable accident, according to Sheriff Stanton and Coroner Ferrage of Jerome county. The authorities' verdict was given after they had interviewed G. H. Reynolds of Ontario, Oregon, a former resident of Hovey, whose wife and son were in the car that struck the child.

Mr. Reynolds went to Jerome to tell his story to the authorities after reading published accounts of the tragic occurrence. Mr. Reynolds, he said, was on the way to Boise to enter a hospital to undergo an operation. Immediately following the accident, he said, the Reynolds party stopped and picked up the child and carried him to the Hancock home, stating what had happened. They offered to take the child, who was unconscious, and apparently seriously hurt, to Jerome, but Mr. Reynolds said the parents were afraid that the child would be hurt and that a doctor be called.

The authorities' explanation of the accident, as published in the North Idaho Statesman, is as follows: "The Hancock child of five was being driven across the road as the Reynolds party approached. All had gone across except one of the auto drivers, and seeing the way clear and deciding it best to get by before the stock might turn and cross back again as happens sometimes, the car was wheeled up, first at that instant, and in attempting to drop the other auto, the Hancock child was run into the path of the car and was struck before the accident could be prevented."

Old Ceremony Kept Up.
