



# BUHL COUNTRY'S CROPS FLOURISH

## Corn and Wheat Making Good Stands; Small Acreage in Beans; Big Fruit Harvest.

BUHL, May 20.—(Special to The News).—Crops in the vicinity of Buhl are exceptionally good. There was some corn planted the latter part of April and this planting is showing up well, while some farmers are only just starting the seed bed for the expected crop of "cushions." Most farmers think that the middle of May planting of the corn crop is equally as good as the earlier planting.

Wheat in the section are enthusiastic for their advance. While there still are a few few bushels of wheat, they find there is a noticeable decrease in acreage. Wheat looks good and yields a number of bushels. Beans are planted in short run of water over the crop. The earlier plantings of wheat are by this time finishing an excellent season of untroubled growth to ground to prevent under-planting of the seed.

Another excellent season has been had in the fruit section. The early loads are especially heavy and bid fair to net the owner a good profit. The peach crop in this section are optimistically certain of a bumper fruit crop. Prunes are also showing a good crop. The peach crop is heavily laden with the luscious fruit. This is one of the largest years in the history of the section. A large acreage of land is being planted in peach orchards in the vicinity of Buhl.

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# Portland Junk Firm Ready to Buy Boats Owned by Uncle Sam

## Oregon House Will Give Fair Price for Vessels Shipping Board Sees Fit to Sell.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—(The News).—The local auxiliary and junk firm of M. Harle and Sons, Inc., has written to Commissioner Thompson of the shipping board, informing him that it stands ready to purchase any or all ships the board may desire to scrap. Harle and Sons' letter explains that the firm will give not less than \$12,500 a ship and stand ready to put up \$100,000 in cash. The letter says in part:

O'Connor to sell some 100 of the government warships to Henry Ford, you will please permit our taking up a moment to explain that the outstanding figure that is attempting to prevent the sale of ships at the present figures, that we stand ready and willing to offer a fair price for one or more ships, of all, of the ships in the government yard, that is a scrap.

# Two Killed in Gun Fight Over School Election Question

## Qualifications of Voter in West Virginia Starts Troubles Three Are Declared Seriously Wounded.

WILLIAMSON, W. Va., May 20.—(The News).—Two men were killed and three others seriously injured in a gun fight yesterday at Kanawha, West Virginia, when a school election was being held.

The dead are Sherman Passley, 34, and John Kirk, 37, principal of the district high school of Kanawha. The wounded are Ben Chapman, 34, and John Chaplin, both deputy sheriffs.

Only a few details of the shooting had been received here, but it is said to have been preceded by a quarrel over the qualifications of those voting in an election which was the question of an independent school district. The question has been under consideration for three or four years.

It is reported that between 100 and 200 shots were fired during the fight. The shooting and state police hurried to the scene with all available deputies and special officers.

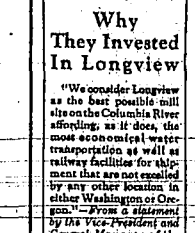
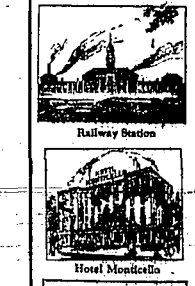

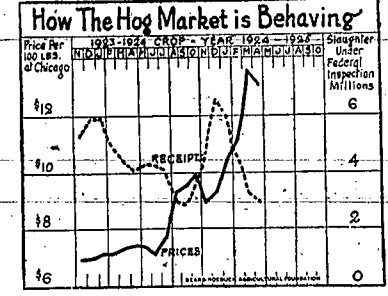

# NEW DRIVE FOR BIBLE TEACHING IN MAKING HERE

Defeat of Part Time Religious Education Bill in Idaho Claims Attention of State Sunday School Workers.

Death of the hands of the last session of the Idaho legislature of the bill that would have provided for religious education in connection with the public schools was likely to come in for a generous measure of attention from the Idaho council of religious education that opened Sunday school convention that spanned three days sessions in the Methodist Episcopal church here Wednesday.

Jasper of Salem, Oregon, superintendent of the Sunday school work of the Methodist Episcopal church in Oregon, on "The Young People and the Educational Program."
