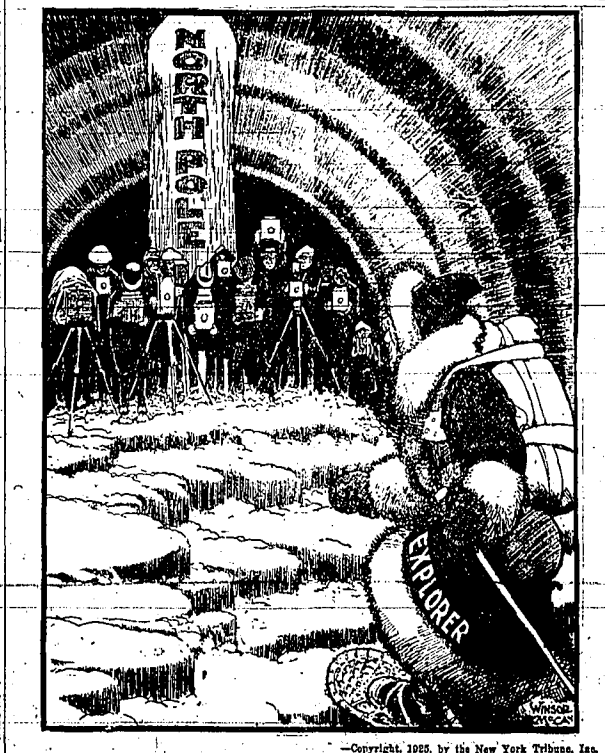

Farm Conditions Steadily Improving Asserts Babson

Agricultural Implement and Fertilizer Companies Are in Stronger Position, Points Out Statistician

HABSON PARK, Mass., May 22.—(Special to The News)—Roger W. Babson, statistician and expert on business conditions, today says that the improving official statement relative to the farm situation, considering the complexity of various reports for analysis, Mr. Babson's opinion on the subject is very optimistic at this time.

The farmer continues to be the principal subject of discussion in the business circles. There is still an opinion that he is a pauper and should be helped no longer. They believe that the only way worth while is the use of credit and demand, and that all other laws are useless and should be wiped off the statute books. There are a few who believe that the farmer is the basis of all prosperity and should be subsidized and protected.

Both of these positions are extreme. Farming is a business. The simple fact is that farming as a business and like any other business, is subject to fundamental economic laws. It should be allowed to take care of itself. The survival of the most efficient the same as in the automobile, textile and steel businesses. Farming is subject to the same temptations and temptations as other lines and the farmer should be willing to suffer or prosper according to their own merits and courage. 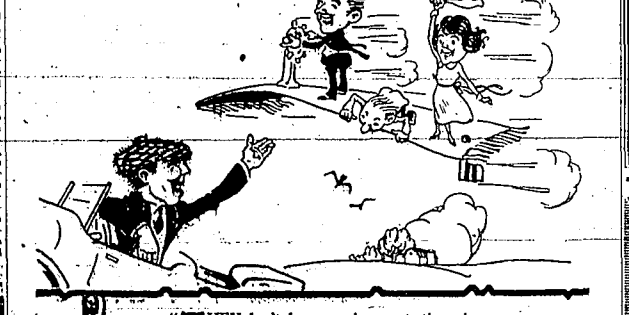

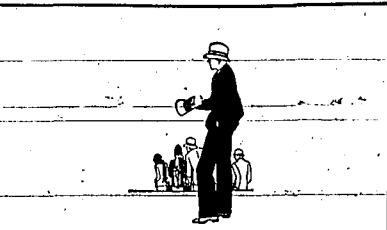
