

AMUNDSEN STILL UNHEARD FROM; WINDSPEED HELD

Zero Hour for Relief of Explorer on Flight to Pole Set at Dawn Today; Friend Prepares for Rescue.

LOS ANGELES, May 25 (AP)—The zero hour for the relief of Inuit Amundsen, explorer, missing since he started his polar flight from Spitzbergen last Thursday will be reached today at dawn.

Small Fuel Supply
The Amundsen party of two men carried gasoline fuel sufficient for a sustained flight to approximately 1000 miles and sufficient for the machines, according to estimates compiled by Hammer on figures received from the expedition.

Amundsen has landed at or near the pole for observation, he has come down to transfer supplies and men in the event the first or second attempt on toward Alaska or one or both planes have lost their way and have been driven to a forced landing for lack of fuel, Hammer said.

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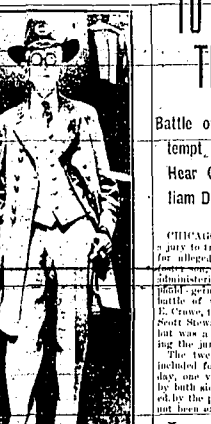
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COUNCIL PLANS REDUCTION FOR LAWN BENEFIT

First Reading of Ordinance Which Would Cut Water Charges Approximately 20 Per Cent.

An ordinance reducing the charge for city water approximately 20 per cent was given its first reading before the city council Monday evening at its regular session and will come up for second reading and discussion at the next regular meeting. The proposed ordinance introduced by Commissioner J. S. Keel places the minimum charge at \$1.11 in place of the minimum now standing at \$1.23.

As provided in the ordinance the charge of \$1.11 would be made for the first 4000 gallons of water, eight cents a hundred gallons over that amount and six cents for each additional thousand gallons over that amount.

Encourages Water Use

Object of the reduction, as announced before the city council, was to encourage citizens of Twin Falls to water lawns around their homes and to prevent the unsightly appearance of so many dead lawns this summer. Last summer it was pointed out that numerous lawns which were not given sufficient water to keep them green, which was caused by refusal to pay for lawn water.

A ten per cent reduction is also provided, as at present, for persons who pay their water bills before the tenth of the month.

The ordinance also carries a service charge. Persons who wish the water turned off so that repairs can be made in family pipes will be required to pay \$1 for this service. The ordinance would also permit the sale of water to residents outside the city limits at the same price charged residents of the city. At present the charge is said to be almost double.

Meter Testing

Provision is also made for meter testing. Where a consumer believes that the meter being used is faulty a test will be made. In the event error to the extent of one per cent or more is found the consumer will be credited with the difference for the preceding three months. Where no error is found

In the sum of \$1522.20 against the general fund of 1924 were allowed and against the current year of \$23.30.

Members of the city council after hearing the first reading of the ordinance discussed the traffic problems confronting the city which councilmen declared are steadily growing more in need of attention. Possibility of a two hour parking limit in the business district, the use of traffic buttons on street intersections and new markets, spreading, corner cutting and other matters were talked over but no action taken.

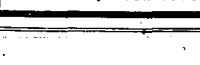
