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CHURCH ISSUE CAUSES SPLIT AT CONVENTION

Entire Modernist-Fundamentalist Controversy Among Presbyterians Brought to Climax at Assembly Meeting.

CHICAGO, May 26 (AP)—The entire controversy between the modernist and fundamentalist branches of the U. S. A. came to a climax and the split in the denomination was made public at the annual general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Chicago today.

The assembly held the determination of the virgin birth and other biblical infallible as necessary qualifications for entry into ministry.

Deists Right. The modernist issued statements asserting that the preachers stood in the sole agent in determining qualifications of ministers and declaring it would continue to stand on its constitutional rights.

In the face of an apparent split of opinion among the liberals in the gathering, Dr. Charles H. Brown, moderator of the assembly, offered a resolution providing for the appointment of a commission of five members to the entire issue and report back to the next general assembly.

Resolution adopted. It was adopted by an overwhelming vote. This postponing for another year final settlement of the issue involved. The assembly also accepted the report to the judicial commission which demanded a committee of a minority of the New York presbytery that the body was in contempt of a mandate issued by the first presbytery.

DEMOCRATIC CHAIRMAN PREPARING TO RESIGN SAY CAPITAL REPORTS

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Reports were current here today that the Democratic chairmanship of the House is being prepared to resign as chairman of the Democratic national committee and that Representative William A. Dill of Arkansas had been agreed upon as his successor.

Information that a compromise had been reached on the Democratic chairmanship, leaked out coincident with announcement by Mr. Dill of preliminary plans for the 1926 congressional floor.

Mr. Shaver was said to have informed committee members several months ago he would not retire until a majority candidate had been found.

It was reported that the committee might be found exchanging party lines between representatives of Mr. Shaver, Mr. Dill and Mr. Clegg.

SHEPHERD TRIAL GETS SET-BACK

One of Four Jurors Sworn in Last Friday Disqualified; Germ Case Slow Starting.

CHICAGO, May 26 (AP)—The murder trial of Albert J. Shepherd, charged with killing his foster son, Wm. Nelson McHenry, at Indianapolis today found itself set back a week by a disqualification of one of the four jurors sworn in last Friday.

Shepherd's attorneys, one spokesman, tentatively stated by both sides, one questioned briefly by the state and seven who had not been examined, occupied the jury box at adjournment today.

Three events in the court room and an equal number outside kept interest from flagging.

Harold Miller, the "baby" of the four young jurors sworn in last Friday, discovered over night that he was his uncle against the state, had an opinion, and was prejudiced against capital punishment.

MAN TO ACT PART OF FARMER IN FEDERAL FILM IS SOUGHT FOR

Department of Agriculture Falls to Find One in 5000 Employees Who Can Take Role Properly.

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—The motion picture section of the department of agriculture has sought in vain among the 5,000 employees of the department in Washington for a man who knows how to act the part of an ordinary farmer in educational films.

Several candidates were tried out but their antics ruled the picture. The officials went back to the farm and hired a regular farmer.

Finally the director engaged a professional actor who has never worked a day on the farm and he played the part perfectly.

UPPER RIVER PROJECTS TO BUY STORAGE

Reservoir of Larger Capacity Now Assured at American Falls With Action of Committee, Director Asserts.

BOISE, May 26 (Special to The News)—Guy Plummer, managing director of the Idaho Reclamation association, was advised today that the committee representing upper basin irrigation districts desiring water from the American Falls reservoir, and which did not come into the original program, have approved the offer of the Union Trust company of \$900,000 bonds, the proceeds of which will be used to buy storage water.

The bonds will bear 7 1/2 per cent interest. This means that the American Falls reservoir will be built to one million seven hundred thousand acre feet capacity in the first construction, said Mr. Plummer.

SHENANDOAH NOT IN RESCUE PLAN

Secretary Thinks Chances Are Remote for Using Dirigible For Finding Lost Explorers

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—Secretary Willibrod Weber today declared that the Shenandoah expedition to the Arctic in search of the Amundsen party is not included in the rescue plan.

Two years ago, he recalled, the navy decided against sending a lighter than air craft into the Arctic because the project was "either a waste of money or the question of expense entered into this decision, he added, and there was no question of using dirigibles upon expeditions in going into new and untried conditions in the Arctic.

TWO PLANES TO SEARCH FOR IN RAPID EXPLORER

Work of Organizing Rescue Party to Go to the Relief of Roald Amundsen Is Well Under Way; Start Probably to Be Made Not Later Than July First.

LOS ANGELES, May 26 (AP)—Plans for a seaplane expedition to search for Roald Amundsen, Arctic explorer, which was organized forward here and in San Diego, were outlined tonight by Hunkin H. Hamner, former associate of Amundsen, who is organizing the proposed dash by air into the Polar regions.

Two planes, equipped with pontoons for landing in water and capable of a cruising radius of 25 to 30 hours, Hamner said he already had asked an European airplane factory to build two such craft at Rotterdam, Holland by June 10.

He pointed out that while in all likelihood Amundsen's two flying boats were damaged in landing on the rough ice of the Arctic north, the relief expedition would have a "new" crew, since by the end of June or early in July, the summer thaw would have opened wide stretches of water in the vicinity of the pole.

Start About July 1. If the planes can be loaded at Rotterdam by sufficient supplies to last them about a week, Hamner said he would start about a week later, while the hulls of the two flying boats would provide the party of six with shelter.

Hammer plans to follow the probable direction taken by Amundsen after leaving King Bay, proceeding to the ice lander and searching all territory en route.

Little Chance on Skills. He thinks that the Amundsen party would attempt a march to Greenland if the flying boats have been damaged, since the only feasible means of travel over the ice field would be on skis and two members of the expedition, Ellsworth, the American, and the German mercenary are not ski runners.

Hammer also doubts the practicability of relief by dirigible, since practical assistance for the Amundsen party could be established only by landing and dirigible could not land without a mooring mast manned by a competent crew.

AMERICAN FALLS, Ida., May 26.—The directors of the American Falls district, the central element of which is the great American Falls Dam and reservoir, meeting here tonight, have decided by President Grant, that the Union Pacific that the system be held by the state.

MANILA, May 26 (AP)—Governor General Leonard Wood today received a dispatch from Major Johnson, governor of Linao province, announcing the successful result of the fortress from which Sultan Rajah and other Moros have been defying the authorities for some months.

After a preliminary shelling with field guns and mortars the fortress was stormed by the constabulary. Several Moros are known to have been killed. Some captured. The constabulary suffered no casualties.

GATHERED IN APRIL. The Moros gathered in the fortress early in April announcing their intention to seek vengeance for the killing of a constabulary officer and a number of his relatives during an uprising. Yearlong funds were adopted by the constabulary officers to induce the Moros to leave their fortress but they decided to listen to any overtures.

ITALIAN DEBT IS DISCUSSED BY AMBASSADOR

Question of Loan Brought to Fore With Move of Official Toward Opening Negotiations; Pleasing Washington.

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—The question of Italy's debt to the United States, was brought to the attention of President Wilson by the ambassador of Baron Di Martino, the Italian ambassador, who talked over the subject with Secretary of State and President Wilson.

While the conference was devoid of concrete results, it marked the first step by Italy with respect to her debt and initiated conversations which treasury officials hope will proceed into actual negotiations of financing terms. The ambassador conferred an hour, and a half, with Secretary of State and President Wilson, chairman and secretary, respectively, of the American debt commission.

Baron De Martino's mission was understood to have been largely to discuss the Italian debt and there was a frank discussion of the problems faced by Italy and the American position with respect to the American obligation of \$2,255,000,000.

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NATION-WIDE BOYS' PRESS ORGANIZATION SOON TO ORGANIZE

ROAD MILES FIGURES PUBLISHED BY U. S. DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—The United States department of commerce today announced that the total road mileage in the United States for April, amounting to 1,141,275 was 4,600,000 more than for the same month last year.

PARIS, May 26 (AP)—The policy of the United States respecting war debts and an attitude of the United States senate toward the guarantee pact signed by President Wilson in 1919, received a acute discussion in the French senate today.

An attack by Senator George on certain American politicians who he said threatened France with their cannon while they left her without the security of President Wilson's aid, drew from Mr. Briand, the foreign minister, the statement that there was no ground for questioning the president of the United States senate's stand on the guarantee treaty. He recalled that the senate could not be expected to ratify such a document.

AGAIN INTERVIEWED. M. Briand again intervened in the debate to approve the results of General Taufflieb, of Alsace, who said that France was not ready to pay the debt of Great Britain and had its debt to the United States without delay and had been suggested by President Wilson and have already begun.

General Taufflieb regretted the weakness of France in the matter of troops in America. It was extremely interesting to note that the propaganda made it appear that France wanted to dodge her obligations, and that the United States was not ready to pay the debt.

THERE'S A LIMIT TO DEMOCRACY



Production in Basic Industries in United States Show Little Change For Period of Three Months, Report

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—The decline in basic industries throughout the United States continued at the same level in March and April and in early May, the federal reserve board tonight found in its monthly business summary, although the aggregate payroll showed a slight decline.

The output of the basic industries decreased in iron and steel, flour and copper but a notable increase was reported in mill consumption of wood and the production of news print and petroleum.

Automobile production hit the highest mark in April, the summary revealed, and the production continued at the extraordinary high rate as established in March.

Wholesale trade was smaller in all lines except hardware, the survey disclosed, but there were indications that the May level would be higher than either March or April. Compared with a year ago, sales of groceries and shoes were less but sales of meats, dry goods and drugs were greater.

Stocks were larger.

Next Prevailing Level. At the close of the summary contained, "total loans and investments of member banks in leading cities near the level which has prevailed, with only minor fluctuations, since the first of the year.

Total national outstanding bonds increased considerably while half of March, have declined—some where slight increase, but demand deposits increased considerably from a low point at the end of March but were down \$100,000,000 less than the middle of January.

Decline in Borrowing. At the reserve banks there was a marked decline in the volume of member banks borrowing after the first week in May and total saving assets of the reserve banks on May 23 were less than \$1,000,000,000 for the first time since January.

THE SPORTS OF A DAY

MAKE PLANS TO SEND TWO BOYS EAST TO EVENT

Timn and Alvord Show Possibility of Being Able to Win National Athletic Contests Held at Chicago.

Experienced timing and starting have been mentioned as the principal factors in making the two records credited to Alvord and Timn. This, perhaps, is true, but the boys in the state of Idaho in the high and low hurdles, the 220 yard race, the 440 yard race and 220 yard relay.

It is of little importance whether Timn can be credited with the 220 yard record of the state meet or whether he can win it in the national meet next year. The point is that Timn is faster than anyone else in high school in Idaho and he should have a chance to compete against other leading athletes.

Anyone inclined to be skeptical in regarding Timn's speed in the 220 yard race should reflect that three watches caught him last Friday in the same time made in the Chicago meet last year, although he was timed from hips to ankles and afraid to start. With two fall starts in which to compare Timn will be in perfect condition at the Chicago meet.

Three Watches Used.

Among other things, the three watches in 22.1 in the 220 on a curved track, this in spite of the fact that he had been trained in the event except in the relay. He holds the new state record in the 220 hurdles, 29.4 seconds, better than the record established last year by Mitchell of Parma. Perhaps the timers were wrong again, but the fact remains that he led the field of the 220 yard hurdles in the state by 20 yards at the faith in the state meet. Twenty-five points garnered in competition against Nott and Piter of West High, both of whom are being sent to the Chicago meet, or first five places out of six seats in Al Alvord's record in the meet last Friday.

Again when invited to be skeptical about Alvord's speed the reader need only remind that Nott and Piter placed first and second at the Utah state meet just before making our territory.

If all means get the boys to Chicago, were the last words of Coach Homer Christensen as he left for Salt Lake.

A comparison of the time made by Alvord and Timn in the events in which they are entered at Chicago and that made in the Rocky mountain college conference would show them both winning their respective events in college competition, but since it is possible that they have been timed fast perhaps the comparison should be made.
