CHURCH ISSUE  
CAUSES SPLIT  
AT CONVENTIONEntire Modernist-Fundamentalist  
Controversy Among Presbyterians Brought to Climax  
at Assembly Meeting.ENTIRE PICTURE, May 26, 1925.—The  
entire controversy over the modernist-fundamentalist  
split in the Presbyterian church in the U.S.A. came to a sudden and dramatic climax in the denominational general assembly at Philadelphia yesterday.

The assembly held its final session.

It was agreed that the virgin birth

and other Biblical miracles as a necessary qualification

the center of the denomination.

ment.

vote of 1,200 to 1,000, and the final

A CHILDREN'S STATE.

Governor Moore of Idaho, addressing a national welfare conference, wants to open the doors of this state to the lonely and destitute children of America.

"I would like to have Idaho," he says, "become a clearing house for homeless children of all the other states, especially the congested east. Nothing would please me more than to have not only children from in abiding but from where the parents because of poverty are contemplating sending their children to institutions."

At the same time he pleads for stricter immigration laws. Idaho wants more people but it wants native Americans not aliens.

Suppose a suggestion like this could be carried out literally, suppose all of the fathers, mothers, less and poverty-stricken, uneducated little boys and girls of the whole nation could be transported to Idaho and brought up by the generous people of that state. Homeless children need not be sent out to perish.

By states and cities supposedly civilized, Idaho would rather mother all of them and call for more.

Surely it would be the finest philanthropy ever devised by man. Idaho would have loyal sons and daughters when those kiddies grew up.

TRUE BUSINESS BAROMETERS.

Business sentiment, as the bulletin of a big trust company remarks, "largely manufactured in New York City." Big banks there are in touch with their financial branches in other cities. Newspapers there publish business and financial news that is circulated nationally. And all of the New York observers are affected naturally, but indirectly, by the state of the stock market. They take it up and down for fluctuations of an hourly basis.

Thus from November to March, while a "halt" movement was under way in stock prices, the business news sent up rays cheerful. Then during March, when stock prices fell, business sentiment grew pessimistic. There was talk everywhere, inspired by New York feeling, of less production, less consumption, lower prices, bad weather and a generally unfavorable outlook.

In April and May there has been a gradation in stock prices, so the business reports turn more of an optimistic again.

What have the facts been? "The business has been improving rather steadily, and with fair regularity, ever since last summer... industrial production has risen to well above normal levels... employment has greatly increased, the volume of transactions through bank checks is at the highest level ever attained, and railroad traffic is very heavy."

These fundamental charts show respectively a very large volume of building contracts, record high automobile production and the highest purchasing power the farmer has had for three years.

The stock market, no doubt, reflects business conditions generally and slowly, in the long run. But at any particular item it is no to be "trusted" index; it is in harmony with more dependable business barometers like the three referred to.



## IDAHO CONGRESSMAN HAS FAITH AND VISION.

(Spokane Review)

Congressman Addison T. Smith of Twin Falls, Idaho, chairman of the house committee on irrigation, spoke with vision and understanding Tuesday before the Spokane Chamber of Commerce. Chairman Smith is not to be daunted by obstacles of the moment. The United States reclamation service has made some mistakes that have discredited reclamation in general. "We are also combating some people from our own west who point out that there is a surplus of food stuffs now and insist that no new money be spent," said Chairman Smith; but he keeps his eye upon an important and controlling fact—that population is increasing 1,900,000 a year and we must look ahead.

Of state and regional interest and of national necessity we must look ahead. Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington have large areas of arid land and to irrigation of these areas they must look for substantial increase of agricultural products.

But the national interest transcends all that. The nation is growing prodigiously, and the public domain is approaching the vanishing point.

Absurdity of woman farms is an impressive fact in every part of the Union; and soil impairment goes on continuously, even on the richer lands.

The policy of national reclamation adopted when Theodore Roosevelt was president 23 years ago and with his cordial and far-reaching approval, will not be abandoned.


