FEDERAL JUDGE FINDS AGAINST DOHERTY LEASES

Los Angeles Court Orders Contracts Cancelled on Naval Reserve at Elk Hills and for Construction of Tanks.

LOS ANGELES, May 28 (AP)—The District Court here today rendered the judgment by Federal Judge Paul J. McCormick were ordered to give up the oil leases in the Elk Hills in the naval oil reserve.

McCormick ordered a settlement for all oil taken by the Federal Government and a credit to them for storage facilities at Pearl Harbor.

The decision, covering 92 points, declared the leases void as to the first, owing to the "fraud upon the United States," favored by the Doherly's payment of \$100 to Albert H. Fall, then secretary of the Interior, and, second, because of the "fraudulent and arbitrary" exercise of his power as president.

Settlement Ordered. Judge McCormick ordered a settlement for all oil taken by the Federal Government and a credit to them for storage facilities at Pearl Harbor.

That the payment of \$100,000 by Edward L. Doherty to Albert H. Fall under the circumstances under which that payment was made, this case was contrary to public policy and against public policy.

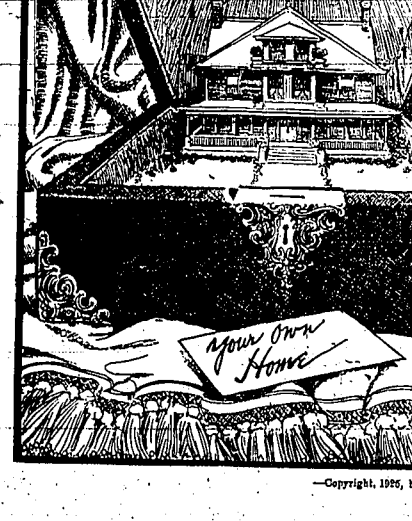

DEBTOR NATIONS WILL BE URGED TO PAY AMERICA

Officials Convinced That Italy Intends to Settle and Steps Taken to Bring Other Powers to Same Basis.

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—With officials convinced that Italy is making serious attempt to accomplish a refunding agreement with the United States, methods of exerting more pressure on other governments having unfunded obligations were given consideration today in government circles. It was revealed by employing an administrative official in the department of loans in America by those governments which have taken no definite steps to reach a funding agreement. While it was explained that the federal government cannot prohibit such loans, its moral influence, if through agents in the hands of any nation or unappreciated, would be expected by officials to pressure and urge scale disposal of securities.

No Deter to Methods

The administration, however, has no desire to resort to such methods of pressure, unless there are threats of repudiation. The suggested use of the leverage of an administration from on foreign bonds developed since before and it was disclosed that the president was ready if necessary to make use of that repudiation of the debt by any foreign nation was threatened.

While Official Gossip

While official gossip bubbled over the news in events with respect to the other powers, it was disclosed that the treasury was expecting another visit from Ambassador de Martino of Italy, who has days ago notified the Italian debt to face at a conference with the secretary, who is head of the debt fund, the commission. The ambassador has called his government for more information, mainly statistics on the nation's finances and upon receipt of the details asked will confer again with Secretary Mellon.

Capacity of Pay

The secretary was represented today as believing that the chief factor to be dealt with in any funding negotiations would be the capacity of the nation's capacity to pay. The facts for which Ambassador de Martino has called therefore, are of a permanent importance to the nations of the talks between the two officials.

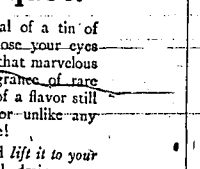
