

THE EX-GOVERNOR OF WASHINGTON IS FILED IN BRIBE

Louis F. Hart Accused of Soliciting Payment in Connection With Defunct Scandinavian-American Bank.

TAOOMA, Wash., May 29 (AP)—A warrant for the arrest of former Governor Louis F. Hart, filed today, charging him with soliciting a bribe in connection with the filing of a bill in the Legislature of the state of Washington to reorganize the defunct Scandinavian-American bank.

The warrant was issued upon information filed in the superior court by James H. Selden, prosecuting attorney for Pierce county.

Sheriff Tom Deane immediately telephoned Sheriff Charles Jackson of Thurston county, where Hart resides, that he held a warrant for the former governor's arrest, Hart, upon being notified by Jackson, over the telephone, advised that he was in Olympia, stated, went to the sheriff's office and surrendered. He was released upon a surety bond for the amount of \$10,000.

Violating Duty

The information accused Hart of violating his official duty in that the state of Washington is a public body, feloniously and directly act from Guy E. Kelly and Forbes F. Hinkel, Jr., that they may have received some of the money from the assets of the Scandinavian-American bank of Tacoma.

Witnesses Named

The witnesses named in the information are Guy E. Kelly, John P. Duke and J. C. Minshall, former supervisors of banking; H. P. Johnson, former supervisor of banking; John H. Hubner, attorney general; Forbes F. Hinkel, Jr., special deputy bank examiner in charge of the liquidation of the defunct bank; Guy E. Kelly, Thomas MacMahon and Frank H. Dink, former attorneys for the liquidation; and W. E. Berry, deputy county engineer. Mr. Selden declared tonight that this information is based upon the testimony of the defunct bank's officers, which would stand in court.

"It would have been a simple matter to charge Hart with a misdemeanor in the matter but the charge should properly be a felony," he said.

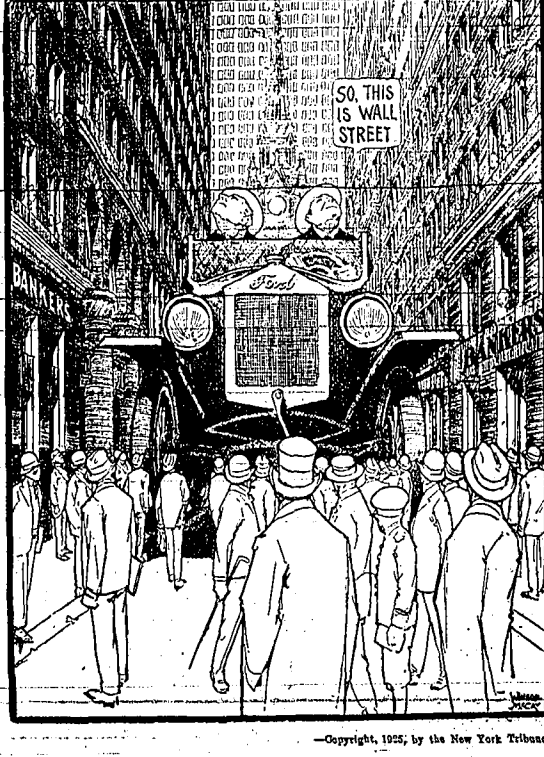
