COOLIDGE PAYS TRIBUTE TO THE NATION'S DEAD

Address Delivered by President at Arlington Cemetery Appeals for Better Observance of Laws.

WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—With fitting ceremonies, the national capital paid its Memorial day tribute today to the dead of the nation's war.

After his address in the Arlington amphitheater, President Coolidge walked to the nearby tomb of the unknown soldier and reverently placed a large wreath.

Twice during his speech, which was broadcast by radio, Mr. Coolidge was applauded—once when he said, "What we need is not more federal government, but better local government."

"This resolution is inalienable," he said, "and it is the duty of every citizen to react upon public opinion, bearing in mind the fact that the failure of local government has a demoralizing effect."

At every cemetery French troops saluted the heroes and sacrifice of the war, and French priests joined the clergymen in benedictions.

Premier Poincaré, as minister of war, sent a message to the secretary of the American Legion.

General Gouraud, who commanded the Rainbow division, and General Foch, chief of general staff, who had the first American troops in France, were with the American ambassador.

At Romagne, with its tens of thousands of dead, at Senones, in Tilly-sur-Thy, during World War I, French soldiers were buried.

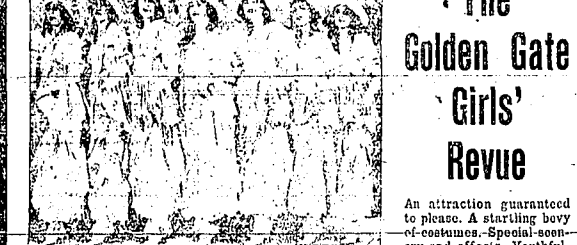

Pioneer Cow Testing Association Report Shows Production Records.

In competition with 23 other herds containing 371 cows, a herd of six cows owned by P. D. Neer of Twin Falls made high herd tests for the Pioneer Cow Testing association during the month of May, according to report of A. C. Holsten, testing charge. The high herd produced an average of 124.5 pounds of milk and 18.99 pounds of butterfat.

A herd of 19 Holsteins owned by J. R. Long of Buhl produced an average of 150 pounds of milk and 20 pounds of butterfat and took second honors for the month. Twenty Holstein and Jersey cows owned by C. E. McCallin of Twin Falls, in third place, produced an average of 143 pounds of milk and 13 pounds of butterfat. Lady, a Holstein cow owned by J. J. Buhl of Buhl, tested second high this best individual production for the month with a production record of 243 pounds of milk and 37.5 pounds of butterfat. C. E. McCallin's Holstein cow, N1, produced 292 pounds of milk and 71.5 pounds of butterfat, and a Jersey cow owned by J. J. Howerton of Twin Falls, produced 232 pounds of milk and 74 pounds of butterfat. Average respective scores and third honors for the month. Ninety-one out of the 371 cows tested by the association during the month produced 10 or more pounds of butterfat. Average production of milk was 79.6 pounds and of butterfat, 32.8 pounds.

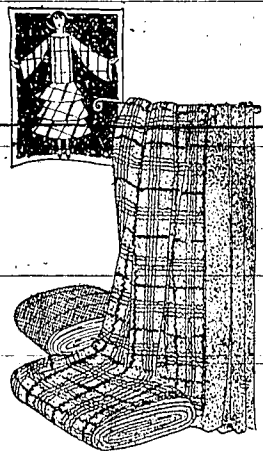

STRANGLER WINS FROM BIG MUNN IN MICHIGAN CITY

Lewis Takes Two Out of Three Falls From Big University Student Before Crowd at Indiana Arena.

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., May 30 (AP)—"Strangler" Lewis, champion of the world's heavyweight championship, defeated the world's heavyweight champion, Edon, in a fight that was a real treat for the spectators.

His great size proved more of a handicap than an advantage in the remaining falls, however. Lewis wore him down by the application of an even series of headlocks and took the second fall in seventeen minutes and twelve seconds. Lewis trotted for the third and deciding fall, while Munn shuffled slowly down the aisle, an indication to the knowing ones that the third fall was to be over very quickly. It was seven headlocks applied in seven minutes and twelve seconds that caused the black mark against Lewis' record, noted by the dispirited Kansas City defeat.

Eliminates Claimant

By winning the match Lewis eliminated one of the three claimants of the championship while the field was being further narrowed at St. Louis in the contest between Hamilton (Ireland) and Joe Stecher. Lewis also took the major portion of a \$20,000 purse and retained ownership of his \$10,000 diamond studded belt, emblematic of the heavyweight championship.

Floyd Fitzsimmons, owner of the skylite arena here, and promoter of the contest said that between 15,000 and 14,000 persons paid admission to the match. The gate netted approximately \$61,000, being one of the few times Fitzsimmons has showed a good profit on his Michigan City sporting

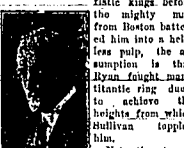

less pulp, the assumption is that Ryan fought many titanic ring duels to achieve the heights from which Sullivan toppled him.

Yet the strange feature of Ryan's career is that he was a world champion only two fistic lifetimes, the first when he won his title, the second when he mingled with Sullivan—and lost it. It is a strange situation, without definite parallel in ringdom.

Too Goss

Along in 1878 Goss then the champion, arrived in Troy to play a theatrical engagement. He was accompanied by Johnny Dwyer, who served him as a sparring partner—and Dwyer was of the sarcastic, sneering type. In some way Dwyer and Ryan became involved in an argument and the result was that Dwyer threatened to "knock the stuffing" out of Ryan.

A little while later the two friends had not halted the affair. The upshot of it all was that Dwyer challenged Ryan to a fight and after Ryan accepted Dwyer stipulated it had to be for a side bet of \$100. Ryan didn't have the money. His friends did. They backed him and the match was made, the condition being that if one of the fighters did not appear at the designated place and at the appointed hour the money was to go to the other man as a forfeit.

Dwyer was a clever ringman with a terrific punch and with ability to take

a beating. Ryan never had fought in his lifetime and had nothing but great courage, strength and sprylike courage to aid him.

Stabbed by Thugs

A few days before the fight was to be staged Ryan was stabbed by thugs in Brooklyn. For a time it was feared his wounds would be fatal. Despite his terrible condition, he tried to escape from the hospital to go to fight Dwyer on the designated day. He was halted. Dwyer was sportman enough not to claim the \$100—and the match was declared off.

Two years later Goss announced that he was going into retirement. He declared "I have liked everybody in America." Ryan, who had seen Goss perform, and had not been greatly impressed, challenged Goss—and the fistic world laughed in derision over the fact that a man who never had battled the world's champion.

But Ryan's friends took him seriously. One of them asked Goss how much the champion would demand as a side bet for such a fight. Goss mentioned \$2000. The offer was accepted, the match was made and the battle took place in Collier's Station, W. Va. on June 3, 1880.

Duel Memorials

The duel is one of the most memorable in prize ring lore. It was fought under London Prize Ring rules, bare knuckles, with every knockdown on full down, counting a round. And for 87 rounds the two giants struck and struggled, wrestled and punched at each other with \$4000 in cash and a world's championship hanging upon the

outcome.

Ryan went into that fight almost barren of fistic knowledge, but with youth and splendid condition and wonderful physical power as his aids. Goss had science and ring cunning, but he was a bit old and not in the best of shape for so hurricane a duel.

Early in that warfare, Goss led by a wide margin on points. But finally as the battle continued, he began to show up and as he did, Ryan, recovering from the earlier beating, began to recuperate and as the fight wore on he swept Goss all around the ring before a hailstorm of blows.

Through in 87th

In the 87th Goss was through—terribly battered, tottering, almost helpless human. And Ryan, fighting the first real battle of his career, was champion of the world.

For nearly two years Ryan held the title without defending it. Then he met John L. Sullivan—and was beaten in the ninth round in Mississippi City, Miss. And Ryan's ring career practically came to its end there for the affair he participated in afterwards were really nothing more than exhibition bouts.
