There is very little of the clever on the track, just a small field now and then. One field of Indian chess is naturally but the average is not large. The Roseworth ranch cattle have been sent to the hills with the Joe Brackett herd, and according to "Mike" are doing fine, although the hill range has been preoccupied by the extremely sultry weather up there. Grazing is said to be a frequent visitor with them and not a natural grazing is scarce. Joe Brackett, the pioneer ranch of the Bracketts, has nearly a thousand head of cattle on the range. A large part of these cattle are grazing in Shoshone basin at present. Fishing is fine at Cedar Dam, the source of the settlers water supply on the track.

Peter Vanderput, the general broker, has been seen in the hills, looking over the range and bringing in groceries and necessities, and everything connected with this little track across the Salmon watershed of prosperity. What looks good and there is quite an acreage devoted to this crop. A small amount of corn has been planted but this crop is never in the amount at Roseworth as the crops here are doing nicely in the region.

CROPS THRIVING AT ROSEWORTH

Seed Growers Experimenting With Divers Methods of Cultivation; Grimm Acreage Low

ROSEWORTH, June 19 (AP)—Roseworth settlers are employing divers methods of seed cultivation. Practically no two farmers utilize the same procedure in seed land preparation. The original Roseworth ranch, which is fortunate in having Mike Gifford as its foreman, will grow Grimm under two distinct methods of cultivation. A part of the fields were plowed up that is to say, they were cut and covered. Plows with dull shares were used and as a consequence only half a stand was left. This was followed by the spring tooth harrow to level up the matted soil. Then the harrow plowed its part in the seedbed, and the crop now awaits the coming of the water which has been deliberately withheld up to this point and even the plant stalk and roots are lying when water is finally allowed to drop. Many farmers over the entire tract are using the same method with minor alterations. As a contrast, there are many fields which have been watered naturally, causing the hay growth to be large. A large proportion of this acreage will be run to seed.

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P. A. Ring, living one half mile west of Roseworth on the state highway, recently sold his land—about 35 acres—about 35 pounds and brought twelve cents.


