

ITALIAN DEBT FUNDING TALK ENDS ABRUPTLY

Comptroller's Granted Post-ponement Until After Conference With Rome on Capacity to Pay.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 30.—Negotiations for the funding of Italy's war debt by the United States came to a sudden halt today, and no further conversations on the subject are expected until after August 1.

The delay, it was announced, proceeds from a desire of the American government to obtain additional data from Rome relating to Italy's capacity to pay. Mr. Albert, the technical member of the American delegation, is staying in Italy to expedite preparation of the documents needed.

It became increasingly evident as a result of today's conference between the American and Italian delegations that the Italian will delay making a concrete proposal until her representatives have been detailed every possible financial, economic, demographic, financial and political information. Some progress was made in that direction last week and today, but it is a lengthy task.

DROP CHARGES AGAINST HEAR

All Criminal Complaints on Which Shepherd Was Held Are Quashed in Chicago.

CHICAGO, June 30.—William Darling Shepherd, acquitted last week of the murder by typhoid inoculation of his father-in-law, William Nelson McClintock, today was freed of all criminal charges.

The grand jury voided a "grand inquest" on the charge that he had also slain Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock, young Mr. McClintock's mother. It was found that a physician reported the finding of poison in Mrs. McClintock's body when it was examined 10 years after her death.

Charles C. Fainman, who said he gave Shepherd typhoid germs to administer to McClintock, was released yesterday. He said he never intended to shed blood so that there are now no criminal charges pending against anyone connected with the case.

Tomorrow will be the first trial in the case of the grand jury's charge of illegality to break young McClintock's will, when Shepherd's attorneys attempt to prove it.

The will drawn by Shepherd leaves \$1,000,000 to the Mayflower, Washington, except for a \$600,000 annuity to Miss Isabelle Pope, McClintock's fiancée. The Iowa county of McClintock and Miss Pope are contesting the provision.

CONVICTED BANKER IN PENITENTIARY DIES ON EVE OF HIS RELEASE

Kieker was serving a two-year sentence for violation of the national banking laws. He was received at the prison November 3 last. His wife has been at his bedside constantly.

16 FIRMS ADMIT ICE BOX TRUST

Federal Court Fines Refrigerator Manufacturers Who Plead Guilty to Violation.

CHICAGO, June 30.—The second group of manufacturers to admit operation of a trust in violation of the Sherman antitrust act, today pleaded guilty here to the refrigerator manufacturers' price fixing in violation of Federal Judge Adam C. Cliffe.

A few days ago a group of chair manufacturers also pleaded guilty and were fined a total of \$100,000.

The firms pleading guilty today denied they were cognizant of wrongdoing. While they might have violated the law, they claimed, they did not fix prices, they argued.

The 16 manufacturers entering pleas today were fined from \$2000 to \$2500 each.

The refrigerator manufacturers are the second group to admit in the indictment of 250 members of the alleged "trust" trust. Fifty of 67 persons and firms pleaded guilty in Chicago recently, pleading guilty and were fined a total of \$100,000.

One hundred and seventy manufacturers and two non-manufacturer officials pleaded guilty in the manufacture of bedroom, dining room and living room furniture. They have yet to enter pleas. Two refrigerator manufacturers refused to plead guilty today and may stand trial later.

DRY LEADER WILL SEEK NEW OFFICE

Roy A. Haynes Expected to Resign in Time to Enter the Governorial Race.

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Roy A. Haynes, federal prohibition commissioner for the last four years, is expected to resign in time to enter the race for governor of Ohio next year.

While it is regarded as a possibility that he will enter the campaign for the republican nomination, formal announcement of his candidacy is not expected for some time.

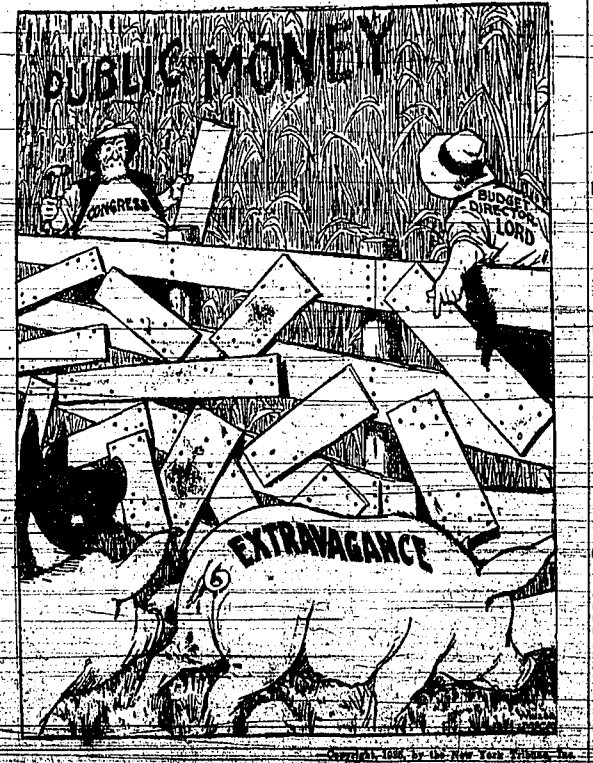
WASHINGTON HOTEL EMPLOYEES ARRESTED ON VOLSTEAD CHARGE

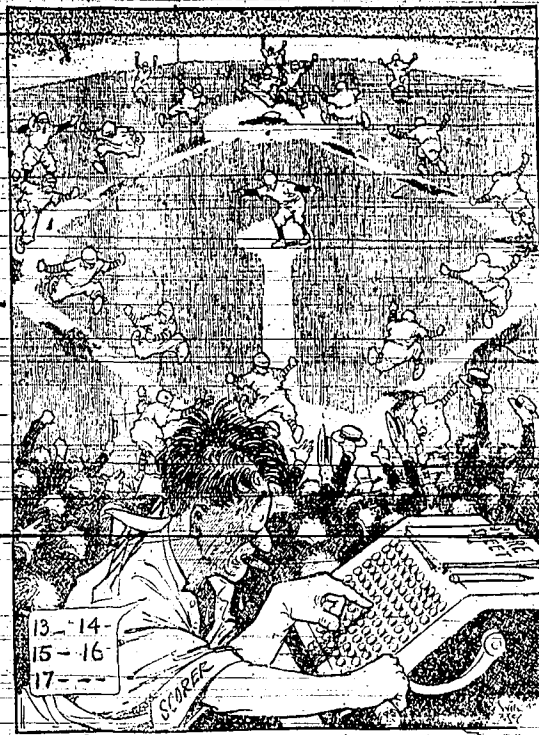

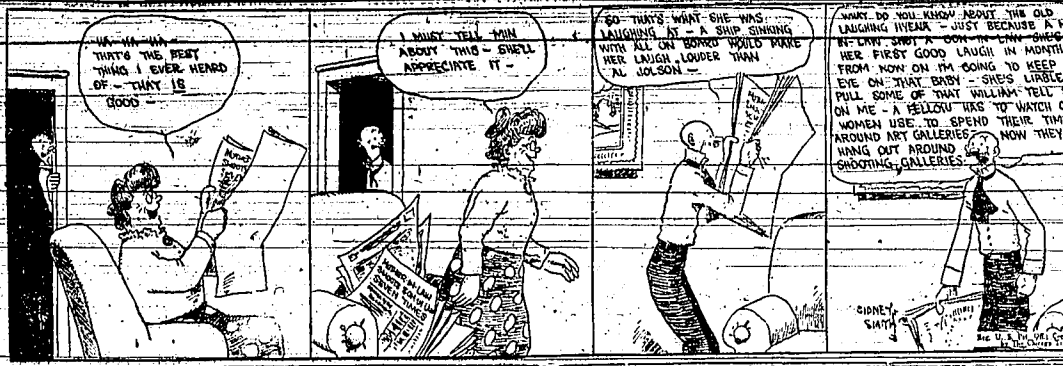
