SENATOR URGES CUT IN TAXES

Member of Senate Finance Committee Advocates Huge Reduction Through Act of Congress.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 1.—The reduction of \$500,000,000 at the next session of congress was urged by Senator Joseph P. Chamberlain, a member of the senate finance committee.

Such a reduction would be possible, he held, if the federal debt payments, appropriaing \$1,000,000,000 were applied to the sinking fund to take the place of a like amount annually appropriated for the bonded indebtedness.

Reduction of the corporation taxes on a graduated rate basis also was urged by Mr. Chamberlain, together with reduction of the federal estate tax.

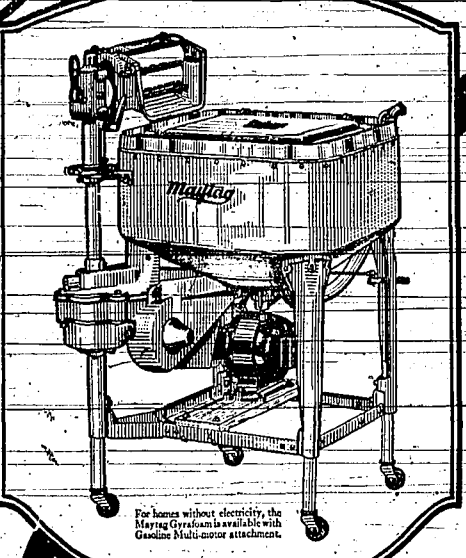
