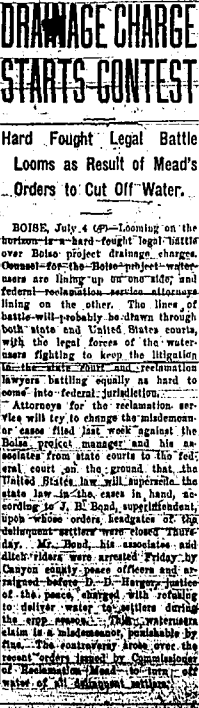

SCOPE TRIAL MAY GO BEFORE FEDERAL COURT

Sudden Shift in Defense Plans Call for Evolution Hearing in U. S. District Court; Constitutionalality questioned.

(By The Associated Press)

CHICAGO, July 4 (AP)—Announcement yesterday of a sudden shift in the plans of the defense brought about the possibility that John T. Scopes, principal in the case to test Tennessee anti-evolution law, may never face trial at Dayton, where it is scheduled for Friday.

The plan announced today by Clarence H. Bowers, associate counsel for Scopes, the case will be tried directly in the federal courts, either at Knoxville or at Chattanooga, through proceedings seeking state enforcement of the law. This action would bring the law a constitutionality before the federal courts, where it is agreed by all parties it must eventually go.

Dr. John H. Neal of Knoxville, general defense counsel, has stated in which to have application for the injunction. Petitions will be filed Monday or Tuesday of next week in a court to be selected by Dr. Neal.

Without the federal court action, injunction the Dayton trial would be blocked pending appeal by the prosecution. And should the injunction be sustained by the United States supreme court on the ground the law is unconstitutional, further prosecution of Scopes would be blocked.

Dr. Neal to avoid the sensational and dramatic potentialities of the Dayton trial influenced the defense attorney if their move. Of equal weight was the desire of a short-cut to the supreme court.

Dr. Neal said Herbert E. Hines, chief prosecutor, is not satisfied with the program the defense has been carrying on.

Dr. Neal said he does not doubt the defense is completely worried and would like to find some way of avoiding the trial at Dayton.

Despite defense plans, attorneys indicated tonight the trial would be carried out. Fifty witnesses will be heard Monday in the Knox county circuit court from whom the Scopes jury would be selected.

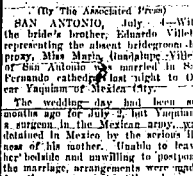

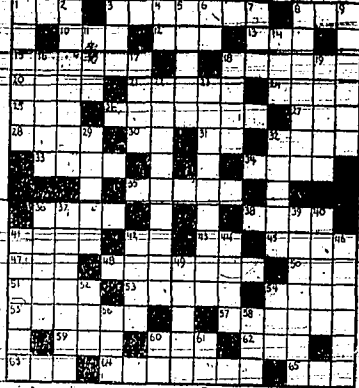

VICE-PRESIDENT DAWES OUTLINES AMERICAN SPIRIT

Right to Hope and Work for Better Days Seen in Flag by True Citizen, Official Declares in Address.

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, July 4.—The true American, however poor and weak he may be, "he himself sees in the flag of his government only the right to work and hope for better days," Vice-President Charles G. Dawes said in an Independence day address broadcast from Chicago last night.

"It behooves us as a people," he said, "to celebrate the anniversary of our government's birth not only as a thought as well as happiness for the blessings which we enjoy under our great government, and as a stimulus to realize how much depends on us and for the world upon the preservation of our American flag."

His address followed that of the anniversary of the birth of our country, we should be satisfied with our lot, in so doing, we are only counting with our triumph, in the light of a selfish and narrow thought of our nation's future.

"We are living in one of the great epochs of the world's history. In the world war an elemental convulsion of humanity occurred which has had a profound and lasting effect upon life on the earth. For a thousand years and more will the events of this world war be remembered and appreciated because of their effect in altering the course of human activities hereafter.

"When, in 1776, the American people framed the constitution by the system of checks and balances they created the best instrument through which the sovereignty of a people can be exercised and maintained, they knew that sovereignty, the American people on this anniversary declare their success in our future.

"While we cannot but admit the existence of wrongs under our government, under all governments except that of the Divine Master, we believe that where wrong exists it is in spite of our government and not because of it. We believe that the opportunity to right these wrongs depends upon the strength of our government and its institutions and not upon their weakness.

"We look upon the flag as that which guarantees to our people the opportunity to right wrongs, to strive after better things, to look upward and to be contented with the fulfillment of God's destiny for our people.

While I have been writing the following story I have felt six distinct tremors. Once the work of writing was postponed for ten minutes, I found that the building in which I was writing would be wrecked, but the place stood up splendidly.

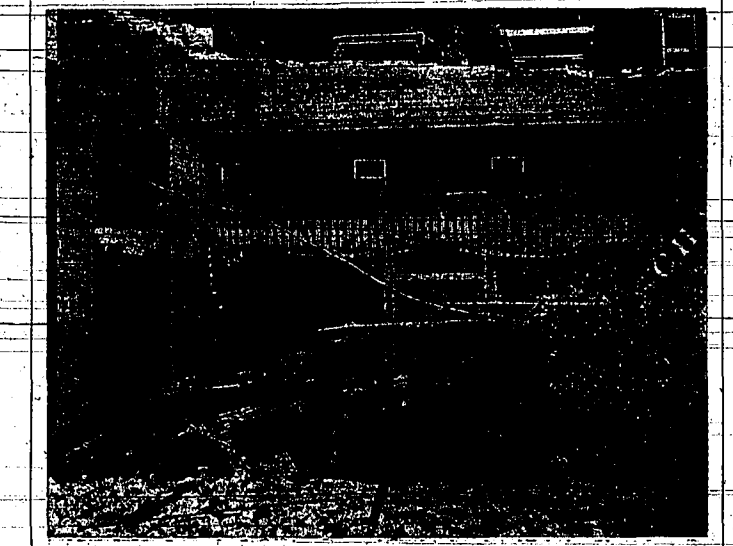
