STATE MASTER RECITES OBJECTIVES OF GRANGE

W. W. Deal of Nampa, master of the Idaho state grange, at the grange picnic today, July 16, recited the objectives of the organization in America. Next November it will celebrate its 50th anniversary. While many organizations purporting to represent the farmers have sprung up—some to become quiet, nationalistic in their scope and organization, nearly all have either died or are in the process of dying in their work; the grange however has continued to grow in numbers and usefulness until today it is the foremost of farm organizations. It is organized in 35 states, has the strongest national body, and is functioning more effectively. The reason for this seems to be its peculiar plan in the beginning, which plan, the master pointed out, succeeded as a commonplace effort that succeeded.

The grange is an order using a strict degree and with passwords and signs. This however is more for the purpose of making a compact working body for farm betterment than simply a fraternity. The scope covers the widest field—forward-looking, agricultural, business, educational, social, political, and scientific. The grange is not a group of members; being organized extensively in all communities where agriculture prevails—except the national, educational and scientific branches. The organization is being felt in the towns and cities as well as on the farms. Where the grange is the strongest the business and commercial centers are the strongest. The grange is the backbone of a well-organized country body, for where the farmer prospers the town prospers also. The grange makes as its specific objects, co-operation, legislation, education and social and literary work. It has a well rounded program as it has and uses it readily takes the place in the farmer's life which makes for permanence as today "the speaker declared, "the most determined decline of that basic principle of one American life—the home, school, and community—has led to the present and the only citizenship in righteousness, loyalty and patriotism as worthy associates of those who give us the great national on earth."

M. A. THOMETZ Distinguished Idaho Seedgrower and Pioneer Citizen of Twin Falls Answers Call.

Michael Anthony Thometz, director and former president of the Idaho State Seed school, of which he was one of the organizers 46 years ago, died at his home here, following a short illness, at 11:30 a. m. Thursday morning, July 16, 1925. Mr. Thometz made his first visit to Twin Falls in 1888 and returned a year later with his family to make their permanent home here on the Mesa, where he had been engaged for six years in the hardware business. He was born in Livestock, a North Dakota town.

Gains Fame as Farmer. He was the owner of extensive family lands situated in the vicinity of Knappa, Idaho, and was well known for the excellence of seeds and other products of his farm. He served on the board of directors of the Twin Falls Cattle company. Mr. Thometz was born in Chicago October 1, 1852. He is survived by his wife and nine children: five sons—George, Lawrence, Michael and Eugene Thometz, and two daughters—Mrs. Thometz of New Spring, Idaho; Mrs. Thometz of Twin Falls; Mrs. Thometz of Chicago, who is expected to arrive here Saturday. The funeral services will be held at the home of Mrs. Thometz on Saturday at 2 o'clock.

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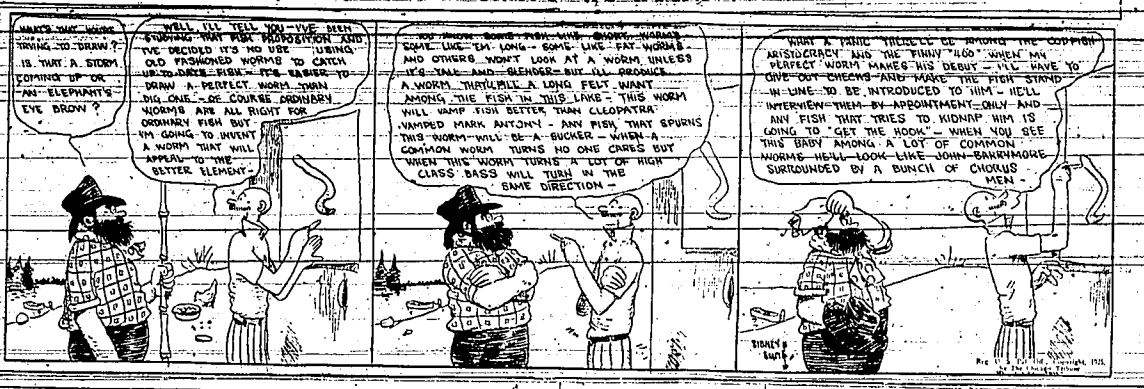

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Warmest Weather in Twin Falls Recorded

Forecast for today—Generally fair with continued high temperatures in the 80s—Thunderstorms in mountains.

High temperature—Thursday at Twin Falls recorded the warmest weather that has been experienced in this region since the establishment of the government weather observer's station at Twin Falls 20 years ago, according to M. J. Anderson, government weather observer here. This degree of temperature has been recorded only three times since the establishment of the station, the first time on July 18, 1905, and again on July 17, 1924. Temperature recorded recently after touching the high mark Thursday, a reading of 80 degrees, and another at 9:30 p. m., showing a decrease.

As compared with Wednesday's high mark at 81 above, Thursday's maximum was an advance of 9 degrees, while Thursday's low at 58 above represented a decline of 10 degrees below the preceding day's minimum.
