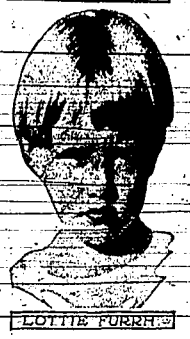
Constant application of scientific laws and theories is necessary to complete the task of preparing such a report, and it is believed that the trial will be closed in less than a week.

KOREA CAPITAL IS FLOODED BY RISING RIVER

Wireless Reports from Stricken Area Describe Conditions as Extremely Serious; Embankments Giva Way.

(By The Associated Press)
 TOKYO, July 19.—A few wireless reports received from Korea convey the impression that the situation is, in fact, very serious, especially in the south, where the Han river in its swollen state is overflowing its banks owing to the failure of the embankments after the river had risen more than 35 feet.

"Telegraphic communication with the stricken area is practically completely severed and it is not yet possible to ascertain accurate details of the conditions and damage. The Japanese newspapers report that hundreds of their lives and thousands were rendered homeless and are in distress owing to the lack of food. The newspapers also report that food is being distributed to the stricken area. There is no sign of the weather clearing up. It is reported that the city of Seoul is inundated with water and that the government officials are in the city but that they have been unable to get away from there for fear of the river.

The difficulties adopted by the committee in the treaty are not to be regarded as a victory for the Chinese. The committee has adopted the method by which the revenue will be provided by which a strong central government might be set up and maintained.
