EVOLUTION TEST SUIT IS FILED IN WASHINGTON

Question May Throw Teaching of Scientific Theory Into Federal Courts Through Action of Capital Taxpayer.

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, July 22.—An action which will test the constitutionality of the federal courts for jurisdiction to determine as to whether the teaching of the scientific theory of evolution is in violation of the federal income tax law was today filed by Loren H. Wittner, a government employee.

Wittner, a government employee, filed a suit in the District of Columbia against the U. S. Department of the Interior, which provides that "no part of this act (the public schools) shall be available for the salary of any superintendent who teaches the teaching of any scientific theory which is in violation of the federal income tax law."

Injunction Proceeding. The action is in the nature of an injunction proceeding directed at the Interior, and is designed to prevent the U. S. United States Fleet in Australia Waters for Battle Maneuver. Forces of America Given High Honors on Visit; Extensive Celebrations in Two Cities Follow Arrival.

A threatened attack of three air craft was averted today by the moderate winds which were blowing from the north. The fleet was anchored in the harbor.
