The investigation concluded as David J. Govey, a doctor from Gary, was called to the scene.

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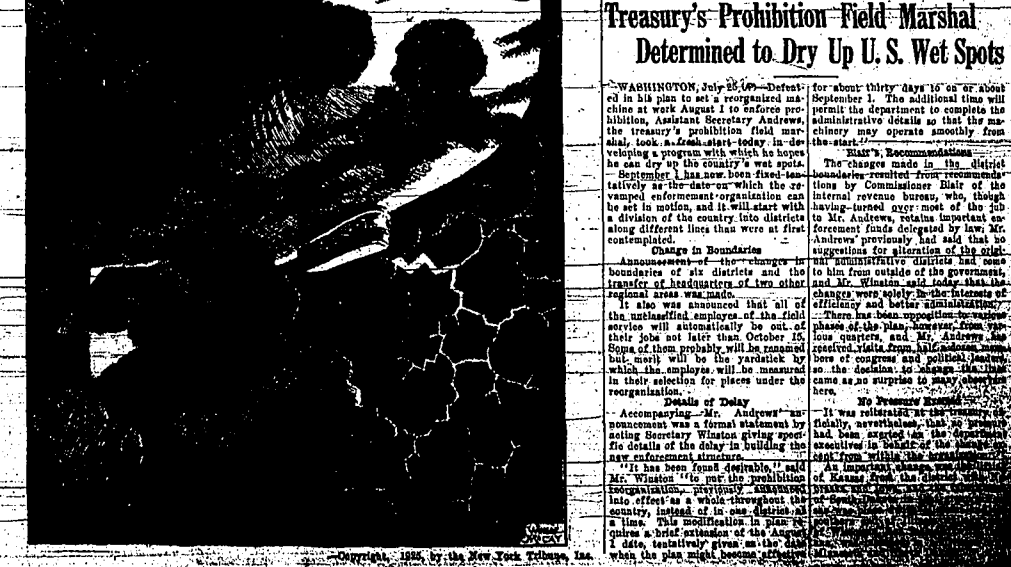
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Treasury's Prohibition Field Marshal Determined to Dry Up U. S. Wet Spots

BELGIAN DEBT COMMISSION TO RETURN TO U.S.

Treasury Advised of Sailing Date for Officials of Nation Who Will Arrange Terms for Paying Money Borrowed.

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 27.—The treasury has been advised officially that the Belgian debt commission will sail for America July 30, and upon receipt of that information today began preparations for the entry of the commission into the country upon their arrival here.

The commission, which is headed by former Premier Thruys, is expected to arrive in New York on the 30th. It is expected to meet at a temporary hall, the location of which will govern the terms which the American commission may be prepared to consider.

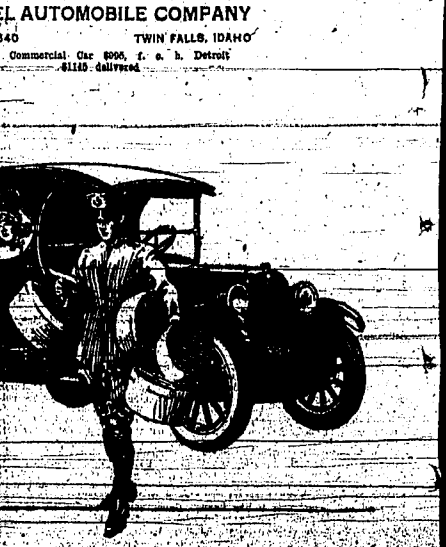

FRENCH IGNORE PEACE TERMS OF RIFFIAN LEADER

No Official Cognizance of Moroccan War Lord's Statement Will Be Given by Government, Decision.

(By The Associated Press.) PARIS, July 25 (AP)—The French government has asserted today that it will take no official cognizance of the alleged peace terms of Abd-el-Krim, the Moroccan war lord, who is negotiating today in a London newspaper and the Paris Committee, organ of the parliamentary majority in the chamber of deputies.

At the foreign office today the content of what was termed "Abd-el-Krim's peace terms" in both London and Paris was that France must not enforce any conditions leading toward a cessation of hostilities in Morocco unless they are transmitted through the proper diplomatic channels; that the Riffian chief was aware what peace propositions France would accept, as he had been officially informed on this point through Spanish channels ten days ago.

Snubbing Shown.

Much suspicion was evoked in French official circles today as to the alleged peace terms published in London and Paris. Several reports of a weakening among Abd-el-Krim's supporters and the reports that the French army in Morocco would be sufficiently strong to start an offensive to crush the rebel cause, the belief in these circles that the Riffian leader might be ready to talk peace. It was asserted that any proposals on the subject must first be stamped with genuineness; that they could not be broadcast through newspapers.

There is a feeling in parliamentary circles that the publication of the peace terms originated with the extreme nationalists and communists of the French parliament with the purpose of playing France in a bad light by refusing to negotiate with the Moors.

It could be noted that Abd-el-Krim's soldiers had lost much of their fighting spirit. The defeats administered by the French troops were said to have made a deep impression on the Riffian warriors of a concentration of the famous French Moroccan division in the region of Taza for the impending offensive were said also to have caused their much misgivings. Also Abd-el-Krim is reported as beginning to feel the effects of the blockade. His ammunition is running low. The battle, which has been in Abd-el-Krim's hands since April, is now said to have passed into the hands of Marshal Lyautey and General Naully.

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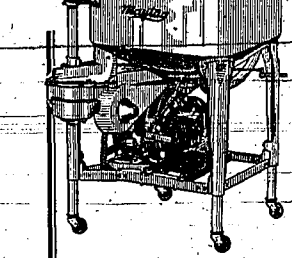

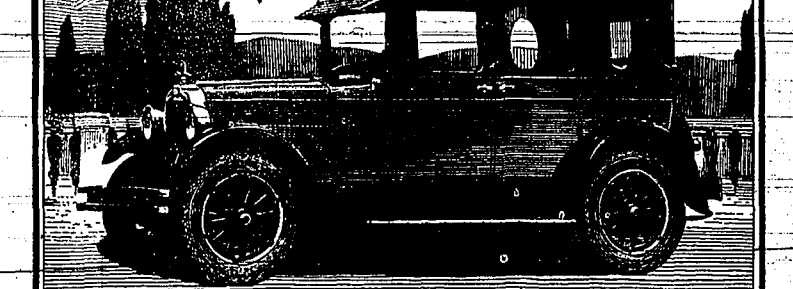

Babson Tells of Insurance Need in American Business

Noted Statistician Comments on Recent Disasters Over Country and Requirements for the Successful Company.

HANSON PARK, Mass., July 25.—When Mr. Roger W. Babson was today interviewed by the press on the subject of insurance, it was found that his mind was focused on the earthquake at Santa Barbara, California, the building collapse in Kansas City and Boston, together with other nationally known disasters which have recently happened. Commenting on the fact, Babson spoke as follows:

"The Santa Barbara earthquake, the building collapses at Kansas City and Boston, together with other unfortunate events should not be passed by without some recognition of their cause of course, however, to be drawn from such affairs which would apply to the various groups affected. These lessons suggest improvements in fire laws, building construction, fire insurance, etc. New legislation of some kind almost always follows such events and all such disasters have resulted in improved conditions in the future. Illustrations, it is much safer to travel on a railroad or steamship line after a wreck; insurance agents do a wonderful business after a conflagration; property owners are more careful of their health after they have been sick. Business men, however, have failed to profit by the fundamental moral lesson which these disasters afford. They refer to the need of always being prepared for unexpected events.

"The business man and investor should not look upon disasters as something to be feared, but rather as a consideration that should be taken into account. This does not mean that we should regard all misfortune possible, but it means that we should not be taken by one eye, so to speak, and expect trouble.

Business Men Should Carry Insurance

"This is a reason I strongly recommend that business men carry insurance of every nature possible, especially business men who are borrowing large sums of money. Certain public utilities have taken up such a step as a matter of course, especially as the cost does not come out of the stockholders. The various State Commissions allow insurance of all kinds to be charged for the service, and are willing to allow rates to be fixed to cover such insurance as well as other expenses. Therefore, the directors of public utilities are the ones to whom the earnings of the company will continue as large as ever, while at the same time the stockholders should happen, there would be no loss to the stockholders.

More Coverage Needed in Business

"A few days ago a great event was celebrated at Cambridge, Massachusetts, the taking command of the Continental Army and ninety years ago by George Washington. President Coolidge honored the celebration with a group of friends. He talked about the conditions surrounding the business man today compared with the business man of Revolutionary Times. It was brought out with what greater security a man could carry insurance today than formerly. One hundred and fifty years ago business was made up almost wholly of risks. There was no great industrial risks, as the failure to whip England in which case England would practically confiscate all business in this country. Then there were constant fear of being wiped out by the Indians who were constantly raiding the outposts for our cities and towns. Shipping, also, was almost wholly a matter of risks; not only were there no navigational risks, but the sea, but the sea was full of pirates. Hence the business man of that day was constantly beset with risks that we do not now have to consider. One hundred and fifty years ago, therefore, a business man insured against risks. There was no such thing as a marine insurance, and the first insurance was just being started. I have in my office an iron safe that the first American fire insurance companies put on the buildings they insured—such houses being treated as great exceptions as compared with all others.

"The constant fear of trouble during the early days of our national existence developed the typical Yankee character of the business man. A prudent American business thrift, courage, and initiative. Although I believe in the elimination of risk by legislation and other means, and the insurance against risks which they cannot be eliminated, yet I feel there is a certain loss in character development by having all risk eliminated. Too much success makes a man soft, careless, indifferent, and soft; whereas strict developments, courage, and watchfulness. Present day conditions probably develop slightness of responsibility and indifference to serious affairs. 10 per cent. of the business men of today would be practically lost if obliged to do business under the conditions of the first century. The conditions, therefore, which underlie our success today, while today if one of those old-time private traders were to come into our country he would be bewildered and unable to do business. Therefore, I wish to make two appeals to the business man first, that you be prepared for any unknown event that may happen. Second, that you be prepared for the inevitable split of a capitalistic disaster. When men get wiped out they remember the words of

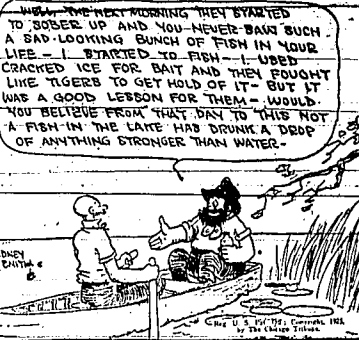
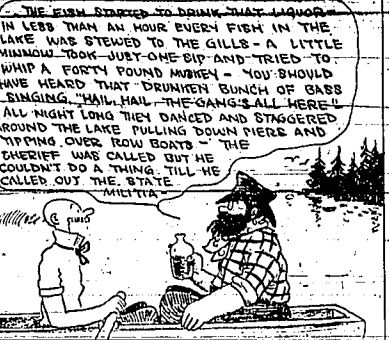
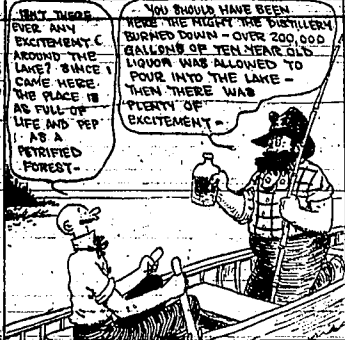
