

BRITISH HOUSE APPROVES SHIP BUILDING PLAN

Great Britain's Cruiser Construction Program Is Sanctioned After Fight Between Liberals and Laborites.

(By the Associated Press.)
LONDON, July 29.—The House of Commons tonight put its stamp of approval on the government's cruiser building program. The vote after the Liberals and Laborites had sought to have the appropriations for new warships reduced. The government there was no actual war in sight and therefore there was no need to burden the already heavily taxed country with additional expenditure of \$3,000,000 pounds.

Henry MacDonald, former laborite, moved a resolution of the ship-building vote, but the House rejected his proposal by a vote of 270 to 140.

The MacDonald amendment was nothing in sight to make war either necessary or inevitable within a dozen years, said the speaker, but that the United States and Japan were possible enemies. So far as France was concerned, he said, he imagined her a possible enemy, the problem was not a naval, but one of the air primarily, or of combination of land, sea and air forces.

Great Britain had 40 cruisers, while Japan the next power in the world had only 18. It seemed to think that the government was not doing its duty. There was no menace in Europe at the present time, he said, but he asked the government to say whether there was a menace through the air.

AVOIDS INJURY IN AUTO CRASH

Rurick House, 11, Brother of Lad Fatally Hurt by Car, Has Narrow Escape.

Struck down by an automobile in front of which, according to several eyewitnesses, he had turned on his bicycle at the corner of Main avenue and Second street at about 6 o'clock Wednesday evening, Rurick House, 11, son of G. E. House, Second avenue south, escaped with only minor injuries according to Dr. E. J. Langhammer, who made a careful examination of the lad immediately after the collision. The lad, who was wearing a light-colored shirt and dark trousers, which is reported to have borne an Oklahoma license plate, was in no manner to blame for the accident, according to eyewitnesses. The boy, carrying papers in an satchel, traveled for some distance at the side of the car, which was moving slowly, they said. At the corner they said, both the car and the bicycle turned right and the boy was struck by the moving and going directly in front of the machine. The bicycle was crushed under the car.

Witnesses said that it appeared to them that the lad turned out from the car as the car passed over the body of the boy. He got to his feet, however, and was carried by bystanders to the office of Dr. Langhammer, who was on duty at the hospital. The physician's examination showed only that the lad had suffered a slight bruise over the left ear and bruise on the right shoulder. The boy was dazed, but did not lose consciousness. He walked to his home where he was taken care of by his mother. The driver finished his examination. The driver of the car waited at the doctor's office until the examination was completed. He was then released from the hospital, it was stated.

A younger brother of Rurick House was fatally injured last winter when he descended from a log of hay in the path of a car on Main avenue east.

TAX REDUCTION HELD POSSIBLE BY SECRETARY

Cut of Federal Normal and Surtaxes on Incomes to a Maximum of 25 Per Cent Can Be Done, Thought.

(By the Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, July 29.—Reduction of the federal normal and surtax on incomes to a maximum of 25 per cent was declared possible for a revenue standpoint, today by acting Secretary William C. Clegg in a letter to a congressional subcommittee. He suggested that a maximum of 20 per cent cut could be made in the normal tax. The acting secretary reiterated the position of the department on the subject of the inheritance tax, but did not comment further regarding these taxes.

Income Graduated Tax

He opposed applying a graduated income tax on corporations and said he hoped legislation for such a plan would be introduced in the near future. "An income on corporations, graduated on the amount of income has no practical basis," Winston wrote. "The theory of a corporation income tax is that it is related to the capacity of the taxpayer to pay. A man with \$100,000 can pay a larger proportion of his income than a man with \$10,000. This reasoning has no relation what soever to corporations."

Opposed by Stock Holders

A large corporation having a large income may be owned by a great many small investors, who would not be able to afford to have their dividends cut down where an income corporation has a large income may be owned entirely by one man who would be able to pay a larger proportion of his income to the government.

"If we had a corporation, each earning \$10,000 a year, they would be taxed at one rate; if they were consolidated into one corporation, they would be taxed at a different rate, a purely arbitrary discrimination." The speaker said that the government would be able to split up large corporations into a great number of small corporations, each earning a few thousand dollars.

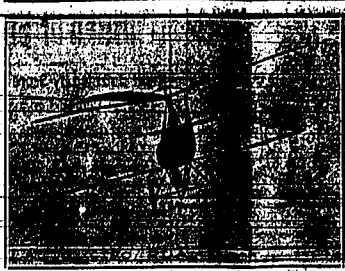

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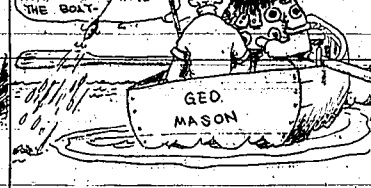
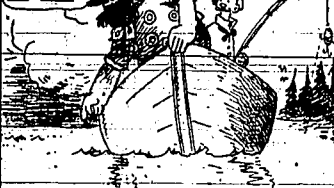

WATER IN CANAL CLAIMS LIFE OF BABY AT CLOVER

Edward Turdy, Two Years Old, Son of Frank Turdy, Meets Death by Drowning in Irrigation Lateral.

In an irrigation lateral west of Clover, extending about four feet of swift running water, Edward Turdy, two years old, son and youngest of four children of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Turdy of Clover, died by drowning late Wednesday afternoon, according to information gained in an investigation made Wednesday evening by "The Evening" reporter.

The body, however, was on the surface of the water as it was found by boys swimming in the lateral at the H. H. Miller farm, between a mile and a half and two miles distant from the Turdy home. It was discovered at about 7:30 o'clock which was about two and a half hours after the child had been missed at the Turdy home and search had been instituted along the banks of the lateral.

Missed From Play. The baby had been playing during the afternoon with two other children in the yard at the Turdy home in front of which the lateral runs. He was missed between 5 and 6 o'clock. The two children with whom he had been playing could tell nothing about the baby when their mother asked where he was, and the search along the lateral banks was begun immediately.

The body was taken to Hotel Tuesday evening. Coroner Grossman agreed that an inquest was deemed necessary under the circumstances.
