COOLIDGE HEARS OF PLAN TO CUT FEDERAL TAXES

Chairman Madden of House Appropriations Committee Explains Scheme to President at Swampscott.

(By The Associated Press)
SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 31.—A tax plan proposing a reduction of the maximum surtax rates from forty to fifteen per cent, slashes in the normal income rates and abolition of the inheritance, gift and miscellaneous taxes was explained to President Coolidge today by Chairman Madden of the house appropriations committee.

While Mr. Coolidge feels that it is properly his function as chief of the treasury to submit their recommendations to congress, he is determined that before final formulation of a program must be left to the house ways and means committee which has been called to begin work in October.

In addition to statements at White House as to the president's views on taxation, it was authoritatively announced with reference to other governmental problems:

Chinese Situation

The president, on the basis of information furnished him by the state department, is satisfied that a complete agreement will be reached by the powers shortly on the Chinese situation, paving the way for early action on the extra-territorially quarantine as well as the customs and other problems.

Had No Thought of Evolution Fight in Clause to Bill, Public Is Told.

SUMMERS TELLS OF AMBIGUITY

WASHINGTON, Wash., July 31.—(By The Associated Press)—Representative J. W. Summers explained today in regard to the so-called "evolution" clause in the appropriation bill of two years ago, which was recently made the basis of an "evolution" fight in the senate.

"The amendment was simply designed to prevent teaching of elementary school children, or in the holy bible and to prevent teachers from presenting different problems before youngsters, excepting those in use in their own schools."
