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### COOLIDGE TALKS OVER LAWMAKING

#### President Discusses Legislative Situation With Senator Deane at Swampscott.

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 31 (AP)—In line with his plan of conferring during his vacation stay here with men identified with governmental affairs in Washington, President Coolidge discussed the legislative situation today with Senator Deane, republican, Illinois. Postoffice Chairman Madden of the house appropriations committee, will arrive at White Court for a conference, and over the weekend Senator Pepper, of Pennsylvania, will be a house guest of President and Mrs. Coolidge.

#### Waterway Plans

On leaving the summer White House, summer vacationing president Coolidge Deane said that a determined effort would be made in the next congress to make legislation designed to bring about development of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence and the Lakes to Gulf waterways. He reported to the president that agricultural and business conditions in the middle-west are good.

Charged with the task of supervising the preparation of the annual supply bill, Representative Madden will discuss with the president the needs of the government for the coming fiscal year and his program for further reductions in appropriations.

Senator Pepper, who will stop off here on the way to his summer home in Maine, is expected to exchange views with Mr. Coolidge particularly with regard to the world bank proposal in which he is interested and give him information regarding the anthracite situation.

### SCIENTISTS NOT TO USE WARSHIP

#### Navy Department Has No Knowledge of San Francisco Statement.

WASHINGTON, July 31 (AP)—While the navy department has afforded facilities to Dr. Edwin R. Scott of San Francisco, for carrying out experiments with an arrangement reported as including a new method for warfare, akin to that similar to the so-called European shells, it was said today that no definite plans had been made permitting Dr. Scott the use of a battleship in his work.

Dispatches from San Francisco have quoted Dr. Scott as saying that such a ship has been ordered into, but if this has been done by naval officers on the line, their decision has not been communicated to Washington.

The navy department, however, is keeping in touch with Dr. Scott's research work, but so far no word has reached here as to whether any success has attended the experiments. A statement by the department which gave a summary of the views of Dr. Scott, previously made public, indicated the department experimenting involved the use of ultra-sonic rays. Dr. Scott was quoted as saying that "the death ray" he has is a misnomer—"it is what Dr. Hertz has declared is the lighting stroke—there is no ray or beam about it."

"This stroke," he added, "can be projected and directed with the same power of anything else, has been able to set fire to wood, set fire to dead trees, burn holes through two inches of steel a mile distant, and there is no doubt at all that this stroke could be sent in any desired direction for twenty miles."

### ADMIRAL VIEWS CEREMONY

SYDNEY, July 31 (AP)—Admiral Robson, commander in chief of the American battle fleet, viewed a naval military "tattoo" at the royal agricultural grounds held last evening in honor of the visiting fleet. Some 80,000 persons saw the spectacle.

The admiral left this morning for Newcastle to attend a three-day snow carnival.

#### Not a Likeable Fellow

LONDON, July 31 (AP)—The Daily Telegraph says the preliminary negotiations for a settlement of the French war debt to Great Britain broke down Friday.

The new French offer, although better than that made last spring, was deemed so inadequate by the British treasury as to warrant serious consideration. From the standpoint of the British government.

Accordingly, says the Daily Telegraph, the French delegation is returning to Paris today to report to Finance Minister Galliani, and unless he is able to make a much more substantial offer, it is probable Great Britain will prefer to await the outcome of the Franco-American funding conversations before resuming the four talks.

### WORKERS IN INDIA BENEFIT BY DRIVE AGAINST LIQUOR

LONDON, July 31 (AP)—Prohibition measures in India have greatly improved the condition of the working classes, in the opinion of C. V. Mehta, a member of the executive council of Bombay, who arrived in England recently on a visit. Mr. Mehta, who was formerly minister in charge of excise, estimated that in Bombay the drinking was about a third less than before the dry campaign began.

During strikes or any serious trouble, Mr. Mehta said, all liquor shops in Bombay are closed. Three years ago dur-

ing the non-cooperation movement, when volunteers picketed liquor shops in Bombay and Poona, there was practically no consumption of alcohol for five months, and the authorities found that the condition of the workers had distinctly improved.

The majority of Indians have virtually been abstainers for sometime, so it was easy for us to work toward prohibition at a quicker rate," said Mr. Mehta. "Restrictive and a half price were able to reduce consumption from 2,800,000 gallons to 1,600,000 and there has been a relative improvement in the condition of the masses as a result."

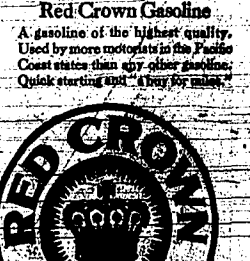

# COOLIDGE HEARS OF PLAN TO CUT FEDERAL TAXES

## Chairman Madden of House Appropriations Committee Explains Scheme to President at Swampscott.

(By The Associated Press)  
SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 31.—A tax plan proposing a reduction of the maximum surtax rates from forty to fifteen per cent, slashes in the normal income rates and abolition of the inheritance, gift and miscellaneous taxes was explained to President Coolidge today by Chairman Madden of the house appropriations committee.

While Mr. Coolidge feels that it is properly his function as chief of the treasury to submit their recommendations to congress, he is determined that before final formulation of a program must be left to the house ways and means committee which has been called to begin work in October.

In addition to statements at White House as to the president's views on taxation, it was authoritatively announced with reference to other governmental problems:

### Chinese Situation

The president, on the basis of information furnished him by the state department, is satisfied that a complete agreement will be reached by the powers shortly on the Chinese situation, paving the way for early action on the extra-territorially question as well as the customs and other problems.

# SUMMERS TELLS OF AMBIGUITY

WASHINGTON, Wash., July 31.—How far from the original spirit for the remainder of the summer, Representative J. W. Summers explained today in regard to the so-called "evolution" in the appropriation bill of two years ago, which was recently made the basis of an "evolution" fight in the senate.

"The amendment was simply designed to prevent teaching of elementary school government, or to the holy bible and to prevent teachers from presenting different problems in their classrooms, excepting them to use their own judgment in the solution thereof," said Mr. Summers, "and believing from the time I recently entered in Washington the amendment, it is getting the desired result."

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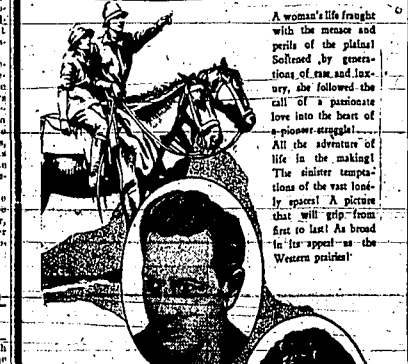

# APPEAL IS MADE FROM OIL SUIT

## Decision in Favor of United States Against Doherty Interests Goes to Higher Court.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—Appeal from the decision of United States District Judge Paul McCormick of Los Angeles in the suit of the government to annul and get leave obtained by the Doherty oil interests on the allegation of fraud and collusion was filed in the circuit court of appeals here today. A hearing is set for October 5.

In the decision given by Judge McCormick, the government's request for annulment of oil and gas leases and a corollary contract for construction of storage facilities at Fort Harter, Montana was granted. The two Doherty companies, the Pan-American Petroleum company and the Pan-American Petroleum and Transport company are the appellants but the guarantee, in a cross appeal, also gives dissatisfaction with the decision and asks that it be modified so that these would be payment by the government of the \$857,000 less than was obligated in Judge McCormick's judgment.

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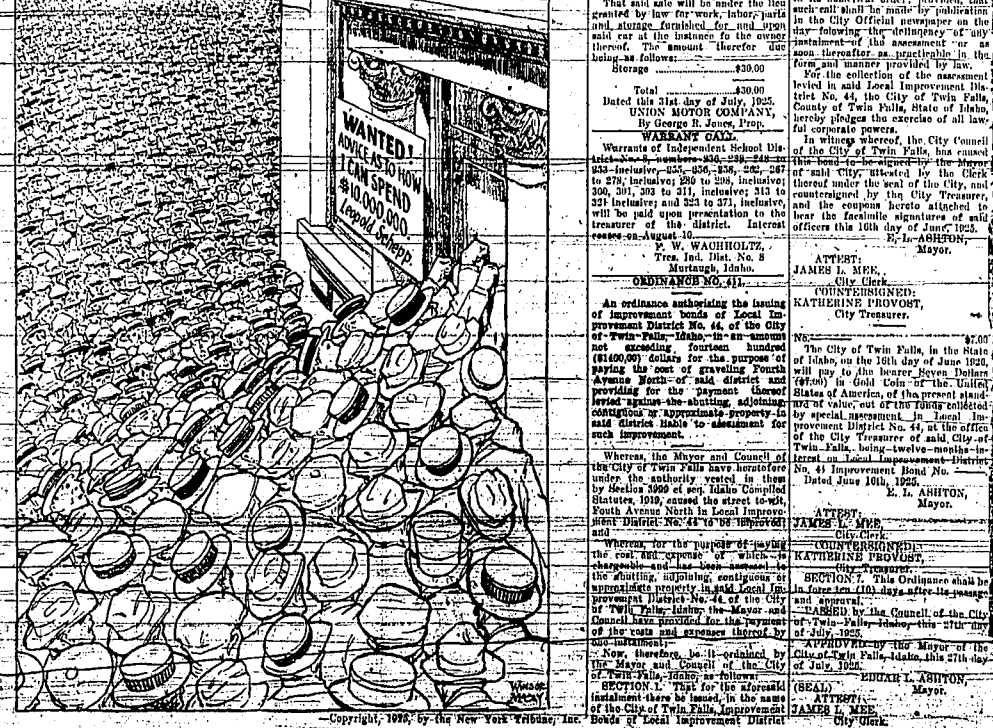
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# Orphan Car Problem to Many Owners of Autos

### Over 600,000 Automobiles Now in Use Are Product of Factories That Are Not Now in Business.

There are more than 600,000 automobiles running in the United States today which are new automobiles that cost their original buyers approximately one billion dollars that are today "orphan" cars; that is, cars whose manufacturers have gone out of business since the vehicles were produced, according to an announcement by C. A. Vane, general manager of the National Automobile Dealers' association including a survey of automobile owners in America.

The figures are taken from official registration statistics in the 48 states and the District of Columbia. The survey indicates above all things, the necessity of the buyers of the automobile looking for his eyes when he is in the motor car market. All these cars were just as well fitted when they were turned out, had just as good tires and the same number of wheels as motor cars built by substantial manufacturers and sold by reputable dealers, but today their value on the open market would not be ten per cent of the value of automobiles of similar age and type built by substantial manufacturers.

Cars Have Many Owners. As all automobiles pass through the hands of from three to five owners on an average before they are finally discarded, the buyer of a new car cannot be too careful in demanding evidences of the financial ability of the company producing the automobile that he contemplates buying.

Most of the automobiles that are now on wheels were sold with an inflated list price or a trading allowance to catch just such buyers.
