Man Twice Snatched From Gallows by Legal Maneuvers Attempts to Prove That He Is Unbalanced Mentally.

(By The Associated Press.) CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—Russell Scott, twice snatched from the gallows by dramatic midnight legal maneuvers, had a new lawyer in court today.

Scott is in court by virtue of the prohibition commission. Opening statements were made by Thomas Scott, prosecutor, and Louis W. Allen, attorney for the defendant. Allen is making an attempt to bring the prohibition commission into disrepute from which 12 men will share his fate.

Allen and Scott were in court, both reflecting on the trial. Allen, who is the sharp, keen, alert international lawyer, was snatched from the gallows by dramatic midnight legal maneuvers, had a new lawyer in court today.

NEER'S JERSEY COWS LEAD TEST ASSOCIATION

The three herds making the highest production record for the Pioneer Cows Testing association during July, according to report by A. C. Hicker, inspector in charge, were, first a herd of Jersey cows, owned by E. D. Neer, Twin Falls, that produced an average of 1103.5 pounds of milk and 48.5 pounds of butterfat; second, herd of 17 registered and grade Jersey cows owned by E. D. Neer, Twin Falls, that produced an average of 1220 pounds of milk and 41 pounds of butterfat, and, third, herd of 23 registered Jersey cows owned by E. D. Neer, Twin Falls, that produced an average of 1083 pounds of milk and 40.7 pounds of butterfat. The three cows that made the highest individual production records were, first, Hol, grade Holstein, owned by C. Florsdew, Twin Falls, 2734 pounds of milk and 73.8 pounds of butterfat; second, Vesta, registered Jersey, owned by C. E. McClain, Twin Falls, 1400 pounds of milk and 82.7 pounds of butterfat. Out of 368 cows that made up 22 herds under test during the month 89 produced 40 or more pounds of butterfat, the average production was 772.1 pounds of milk and 31.2 pounds of butterfat.

COURT MAKES AWARD IN SUIT OVER SALMON FARM

Under findings of fact and conclusions of law issued Monday by Judge W. A. Hubrock in District court here, H. D. Neer of Twin Falls is entitled to decree of foreclosure against H. B. La Boshne to gain possession of farm land near Hollister, in which he acquired a year ago the interests of the original owner, A. C. Neer, through purchase of the contract for sale of the property to La Boshne. La Boshne entered into the contract to buy the land from Neer in June, 1918, but has made no payments on the contract since the following November, and once law, according to the court findings, a total of \$3891.05. As an effect, the court holds, La Boshne is entitled to receive from Neer \$1839.20 as rental value of the land during three year period while La Boshne was dissepossed of the land by Neer, litigation involving this dissepossession having been known to Neer at the time he purchased the contract, the court holds.

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ENGINEER WILL MAKE STUDY OF POWER PLANTS

Portion of Vacation Trip to Portland to be Given Over to Visits to Municipal Plants; Vote Deemed Likely.

Study of the municipal power plant on the part of Twin Falls mayor and council will include an investigation to be made by E. V. Berg, city engineer, and to leave Tuesday on a vacation trip to Portland and who will visit four municipal power plants in Oregon and Washington in the course of the trip, members of the council were told by Mayor E. J. Ashton at a regular meeting here Monday evening. The council was requested to authorize an appropriation of \$100 out of municipal funds to cover expenses on this trip.

Berg stated that he expects to visit municipal power plants in Astoria, Eugene and Medford, Oregon, and Tacoma and Centralia, Washington. Some months ago Mr. Berg made for the city an investigation and report on possibilities for the development of four power sites on Snake river, the city's appropriation of \$300 for engineering services last year being used for that purpose. Mayor Ashton also had the engineer that he and Mr. Berg had prepared a questionnaire that would be sent out to 18 of 23 municipalities operating municipally owned power plants and that by this means it was hoped that additional light would be thrown on the question of a municipal power system for Twin Falls.

Anticipates Vote

He indicated to the council his opinion that the council will vote for a municipal power system here and suggested that would be well for the city administration to gain all the information possible on the question.

According to request of the committee's office that set forth different methods of controlling municipal utility, the council Monday evening to appoint one-half mill from the levy for bond interest and sinking fund and make for total city tax levy for the year ending on \$340 on each \$100 of assessed valuation. City Clerk J. L. Mirey indicated his belief that the reduced levy would result in a gain all the way to meet requirements of the fund.

A. J. Myers, city attorney, advised that he was not ready to report on the claim for approximately \$200 presented by the Metropolitan Water company for reimbursement of expense in repair of footings for storage tanks undermined by waters seeping from leaking water mains. Bills of \$400 for state employees' liability insurance and \$300.75 for the auditors' annual report were included in the itemization of the general fund which the council ordered paid.

BOOKKEEPER TO ANSWER CHARGE

J. Lockie, Accused of Embezzlement of \$15,000 From Power Company, Held.

July 3, Lockie, charged with embezzlement of \$15,000 from the Idaho Power company during three years' employment; here as bookkeeper for the company, will stand trial on that charge in district court here, according to a decision rendered by Judge J. L. Hudgin at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing in the case in probate court here Monday.

Lockie was ordered held in the district court under \$500 bond which he had furnished following arraignment in the probate court. The father, George Lockie, of Chicago, said his wife during the hearing Monday had no testimony in his behalf was offered by his attorney, Frank L. Stephan, former prosecuting attorney, and C. A. North.

Checks in Evidence

The testimony introduced at the hearing led to no altogether with incriminating relating to the Wendell Power office. Several checks issued by the state's attorney, which were worked off. They ranged in amount from \$10 to \$200. It was the opinion of the state's attorneys that some of these checks were issued in excess amount. FIRE IN STORE AT ROGERSON MENACES TOWN

Blaze Finds Citizens Unprepared and Calls Forth Strenuous Efforts to Get Control of Flames.

Destruction of the town of Rogerson, 20 miles south of here, was threatened Sunday night by flames that wiped out much of the building and stores of the place, stores occupied by J. H. Langford of Twin Falls, involving a loss estimated at approximately \$250.

Almost unobscured effort put forth by most of the town's residents held the flames inside the walls of the building, which it started at about 8:30 o'clock Sunday evening. Some of the merchandise in the burning building was carried out by Mexicans who wrapped wet towels about their faces and plunged into the smoke and flame for that purpose. Furniture in several of the buildings was carried outside in view of the blaze seemed imminent.

Tinds Town Unprepared

The blaze found Rogerson almost entirely without means for fire fighting. A chemical tank on wheels had been abandoned to become supply and pressure bottles by Mexicans who would not lift a stream to the second floor of a building. The chemical tank was refilled with a hastily mixed solution of soda and water brought from the town.

During the night there were indications that the fire would break out again and call for a new supply of acid was telephoned to T. P. Williams of Twin Falls, who with his family, "arrived" Monday in Rogerson, visiting his father-in-law, E. E. Powell and brother-in-law, Allen Babbel, proprietors of the Duwell Mercantile company store at Rogerson which was in close proximity to the burning store. Mr. Williams assisted for some hours in efforts to gain control of the flames and in removal of furniture from threatened buildings, and about 10 o'clock Sunday night he received the Rogerson fire fighters' call for more acid at 3 o'clock Monday morning and, assuming Willet Hodge out of bed, he arrived about three o'clock of the acid from the supply of the Leland Producers and Refrigerating company of which Mr. Babbel is manager. With the acid working in his car, Mr. Williams set out toward Rogerson to meet Mr. Powell who had started to Twin Falls immediately after leaving the telephone. This acid was transferred to Mr. Hodge's car at a point on the road about 10 miles north of Twin Falls and Mr. Powell carried it back to the scene of the fire.

Starts in Basement

Cause of the blaze, which started in the basement on the rear of the store, had not been determined Monday evening. Chief J. H. Langford left Rogerson some months ago. The store has been in charge of his brother-in-law, given Noble, who took an active part in the fire fighting Monday night.
