SCOOPES CASE IN FEDERAL COURT ON LEGAL POINT

Further Enforcement of Tennessee Anti-Evolution Law Opposed Through Petition Filed by Teacher.

(By The Associated Press) CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Aug. 4.—With the failure of the state supreme court to grant a writ of habeas corpus in the Scoopes case, the anti-evolution law has descended here today into a simple determination of the constitutional questions involved.

Even as this brief formally gave voice to a plea from the youthful Scoopes, all other similar suits were held in abeyance. The bill filed by the state supreme court was delayed until after affidavits could be received from the state officials.

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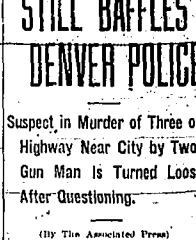

FASCISTS AND VATICAN GROW MORE FRIENDLY

ROME, Aug. 4 (AP)—The growing friendliness of the Fascist government with the Vatican is causing an amicable competition between church and state in commemorations of important events. The Fascist, always quick to take opportunities to call attention to the grandeur of ancient and medieval Italy, now are doing as much for the church in pursuance of their idea that the power of the church is closely linked with the strength of the nation and hence should be celebrated as much as possible.

The most important church commemoration this year is the 18th centennial of the Council of Nicaea, at which the Aryan Schism broke the church in two, laying for some jurisdiction over the spiritual affairs of the eastern world. This important centennial will also be celebrated in Athens by the hierarchy of the Orthodox Greek Catholic Church.

Another important religious event will be that of St. Francis, Assisi, general preparations for which are being made this summer. The most interesting this year will be that of Vicigli on September 20.

BOARD AGREES TO SHIP SALE

Henry Ford's Bid for 200 U. S. Vessels for Scrapping Accepted at Washington.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—Sale of the 200 vessels for scrapping was awarded to Henry Ford today by the shipping board. His bid was \$1,760,000. The vote was four to one with Commissioner Benson who has opposed sale of the ships for scrapping, casting the negative ballot. Mr. Ford's intention was understood by the shipping board, to convert a few of the ships to direct engine propulsion for use in transporting his own products and to retain some of the engines and other equipment of the vessels to be scrapped for use in his manufacturing plants.

That will be permitted under the advertisement calling for bids. The rest of the vessels and equipment are to be broken up for junk.

AMERICA'S LEADING JOCKEY WILL RETURN TO HIS IDAHO HOME

CINCINNATI, Aug. 4 (AP)—Jockey Ivan S. Parker of one time American leading rider of thoroughbred races here today was here today, when Parker announced he was returning to his home at Declo, Idaho, where he has purchased a ranch.

The little rider, who for two years led all jockeys in this country in the number of winners ridden, came here today from Baraga and announced he was going to spruak the middle. Increasing weight was given as the reason for this decision.

ELECTS TO SERVE TERM

Simon Hibdon, arrested Monday evening by deputy sheriffs in a Mexican resort on Second avenue south, pleaded guilty in probate court here today to charge of illegal possession of a gallon of liquor that was seized by the officers when he was arrested. He was sentenced by Judge J. L. Hoaglin to pay \$400 fine, and three months in jail, to serve 25 days in the county jail.

THREE DEAD IN STORE COLLAPSE

Several Also Injured When Walls of Two-Story Ruin Gave in at Kansas City.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 4 (AP)—At least three persons were killed and several injured in the ruins of a two-story brick store and apartment building which collapsed here late today. Besides the three whose bodies were recovered, three others were missing to fight and believed to be in the debris.

The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Holliday, 70 and 70 years old respectively, and William Banks, a negro, were taken from the ruins tonight.

The building fell when workmen who had been making repairs on the first floor sawed away a support.

W. H. Fisher, foreman of the repair work was rushed to a hospital and four hours later, was injured.

OPERATORS AND MINERS DEADLOCKED ON WAGE

AT least a second weekling, the operators finally reject the proposal that all matters in dispute be submitted to impartial arbitration and conditions adjustment for at least six months. COULD NOT TO INTERFERE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (AP)—President Coolidge does not believe that the time has come for him to take a hand in the anthracite situation. Despite the break in negotiations at Atlantic City between operators and miners over a new wage scale, he is still hoping that an agreement will be reached in time to avert suspension of operation of the mines.

THREE DEAD IN STORE COLLAPSE

What the policy of the government would be in the event of a shutdown of the mines has not been disclosed. Mr. Coolidge is keeping in touch with the situation but it is believed he has not determined on any course of action. It is probable that within the day he will confer with Secretary Hoover and it is probable that the administration policy will be shaped up at that conference.

FINDERS SHOW INTEREST

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Aug. 4 (AP)—When Governor Pritchard was informed by the anthracite operators' conference that the anthracite wage negotiations at Atlantic City he indicated he would not get directly involved in the matter, but he declined to state what action, if any, he would take in the matter.

New York Commission Says Any Boxer Who Meets the Champion Before Negro Will Also be Suspended.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The lack of intelligibility, lowered against Jack Dempsey for his alleged dilatory tactics in signing for a title match with Harry Wills were reinforced by an added barrier today. The New York state athletic commission ruled it would suspend any boxer who meets Dempsey before the champion signs articles of agreement and puts a suitable forfeit for a match with Wills.

Wills issue Chairman James A. Farley said the commission would "wash its hands of the whole situation until such a time as the champion or his legitimate manager binds a match with Wills with a certified check."

"We cannot suspend Dempsey," declared Chairman Farley, "as he holds no license with this commission. We cannot declare the title vacant because we have not the power, but we will remain so until he signs for the Wills match. If we could declare the title vacant we would."

"We received his letter by airplane this morning but will ignore it. We will answer neither the letter nor his latest wire. We are not concerned with his personal affairs but he agreed to fight Wills and will he takes some steps to bind this match, his state will be forever the same, namely, ineligible."

"However, we have taken an additional step to bring Dempsey to terms."

Any boxer who fights Dempsey before the champion definitely binds himself to a match with Wills, will be promptly suspended or declared ineligible by this commission.

The ruling likely will be effective in states where a working agreement exists with local Massachusetts.

Connected and Pennsylvania, all have a working agreement with us.

Tex Rickard, Madison Square Garden promoter, told the commission he had received a letter from Dempsey to the effect that the champion will personally give into the ring against Harry Wills about July 4, 1925, but the commission refused to rescind its action, against Dempsey until he himself, personally met with the commission.

Harry Wills, said the commission had suggested to him that he prepare a set of articles and forward them to Dempsey for his signature but Mullins frowned on the suggestion.

TINY DICK KERR IS BACK WITH CHICAGO AFTER YEARS' OUTLAW

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—Big help was minute to the Chicago white Sox today in the form of Tiny Dick Kerr.

Reinstated in organized baseball today upon expiration of a year's outlawing Kerr had returned from playing with illegals, the little left hander left St. Louis late today and will arrive in Chicago at 7:30 p.m. Thursday.

He is in good physical condition, and baseball followers here expect Eddie Collins, the White Sox manager, to make immediate use of Kerr, at least for relief hurling.

In obtaining reinstatement after a suspension since 1922, for violating the reserve clause of the contract, Kerr applied to R. B. Johnson, American League president who immediately forwarded the appeal to K. M. Landis, baseball commissioner.

Mr. Johnson expressed pleasure at Kerr's return to the organized field.
