



# Twin Falls News Files of Twenty Years Ago Recall Interesting Anniversary

### First Railroad Train Reaches This Section on August 7, 1905; Celebration Biggest in Annals of Tract.

Twenty years ago yesterday, on August 7, 1905, the first Oregon Short Line railroad train reached Twin Falls and in commemoration of the event, Twin Falls staged the biggest celebration in her history to that time. It was not the biggest in the entire history of the city.

The Twin Falls News of that date gives an interesting account of the day's activities and presents a splendid picture of the prevailing optimism and good will of the early days of the Twin Falls colony.

Many of those whose names are mentioned are no longer residents of this section, and many more have passed the vast majority and passed to their eternal rest. But a good many of the early day settlers still remain to recall with the greatest interest the stirring events of twenty years ago when Twin Falls was but an infant in its swaddling clothes and the sweet dreams of avarice did not curdle a drop of the one hundred-dollar land some day.

The Twin Falls News had been established in the preceding October and the story of the railroad day celebration was easily the most pretentious newspaper effort of the paper's initial year of existence.

The account follows:

**Major Reed Speaks.**

Major Fred H. Reed opened his address by calling for three cheers for Theodore Roosevelt, the friend of Idahoans and the friend of the west. The cheers were given with a will and a thousand flags waved. The major scratched down and took his seat on the stage, apparently speaking. He knew what they did not accomplish and how they did it. Loud hurrahs followed his honorable retirement on the stage.

Major Reed said his chiefest command. They were the true home-builders, he declared, and it required courage to leave a comfortable home and make another in the rough. All honor to the pioneer women of Twin Falls said the major, and the audience was cheered accordingly.

Major Reed called attention to the fact that the women were subject to friction to maintain friendly relations with each other. "If you digger about water don't throw potatoes or shovels at each other," he advised. "Gossip and your troubles like men, and if you can't agree and act like McPherson." Hours of laughter followed the suggestion of the major and the Twin Falls farmers were fortunate in having a man like Mr. McPherson to lead them. The company executed a master stroke, he asserted, when it engaged Mr. McPherson to help the farmers.

Governor Gooding found at the eleventh hour that it would be impossible for him to attend the celebration. Urgent business demanded his presence at Idaho and he was obliged to send regrets.

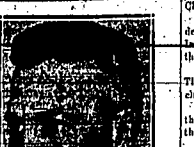
