TORNADO SWEEPS TOWN, DAMAGE IS SET AT \$125,000

Only Two of Imperial Valley City's 20 Buildings Remaining on Their Original Sites After Storm is Over.

(By The Associated Press) TWIN FALLS, Cal., Aug. 10.—Damage estimated at from \$125,000 to \$150,000 resulted from the tornado which late yesterday ripped this little Imperial Valley town off its foundations. A short, violent, but business and casualties revealed tonight that only two of the town's approximately 20 buildings were standing upon their original sites. The other 18 were either blown away or were still under water as the result of the chinook which accompanied the "twisters" and the sky was black with rain as a howling gale brought more trouble to night and kept most residents within call of jumping distance of their injuries and possible death. By taking to the trenches when they saw two funnels of black approaching, those in the path of the wind kept their heads below the line of flying timber. INQUEST WILL BE HELD OVER C. H. SCHWARTZ

Coroner's Jury to Probe Suicide of Man Who Killed Itinerant Laborer in Artificial Silk Plant Explosion.

(By The Associated Press) OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 10 (AP)—An inquest will be held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock on the body of Charles Henry Schwartz, chemist and murderer, who died by his own hand early Sunday morning after he had broken into the artificial silk plant in which he was employed.

Schwartz will be subpoenaed, Coroner Grant D. Miller of Alameda county declared today. Miller is expected to attend if he chooses not to do so. No further investigation with reference to the case is expected by the sheriff. District Attorney A. B. Thibault and Sheriff R. R. Veale of Contra Costa county, declared today. They will not be interested as to the extent of her knowledge of her husband's crime or whether she knew he had broken into the artificial silk plant.

Schwartz bought a railroad ticket to Twin Falls, Id., and checked in his apartment in the hotel in which he was finally found after the explosion in the laboratory. He was accompanied by a woman, the explosion which started the investigation as to the victim's death.

During the days in which he was in hiding at the apartment, he played cards several times in the evening with the family of G. W. Hayward, manager of the hotel, and treated a birthday party for Hayward's 15-year-old daughter. At this party Schwartz led the game of bridge and treated the party with champagne. The woman who had been identified as his wife was found dead in a room in the hotel. She was known as Mrs. Hayward and a number of other men through Hayward for that length of time. He passed as a structural engineer and was among the circle of friends as a thorough gentleman, a great lover of music and a good story teller.

FRENCH OFFICIAL WOULD PRESENT DEBT PROPOSAL

Caillaux Would Like to Visit Washington and Make "Gentleman's Offer" in Settlement of War Loan.

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, Aug. 10.—Finance Minister Caillaux told newspaper reporters today that he desires very much to go to Washington to present what he called a "gentleman's offer" of settlement of war debts which France owes to the United States.

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APPLES TO BE SOLD IN BULK

State Department Approves Growers Proposal for Marketing of Half-Hit Fruit.

Idaho apple growers, with the approval of the state department of agriculture, may market half market fruit this season in bulk, according to agreement reached at a meeting here Monday evening of about 100 fruit growers of this region with Henry Gable, chief inspector, representing the state department.

Gable believed that half market apples may be marketed in bulk to avoid a profit to the grower, since this method will eliminate expense incident to shipment to boxes or baskets.

The only restrictions, which were proposed by the growers themselves, are that the fruit marketed in bulk shall conform to regulations as to quality and shall be marketed as such and designated as to make certain that the buyer knows that he will receive half market fruit and not Idaho standard grade apples.

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TORNADO SWEEPS TOWN DOING MUCH DAMAGE

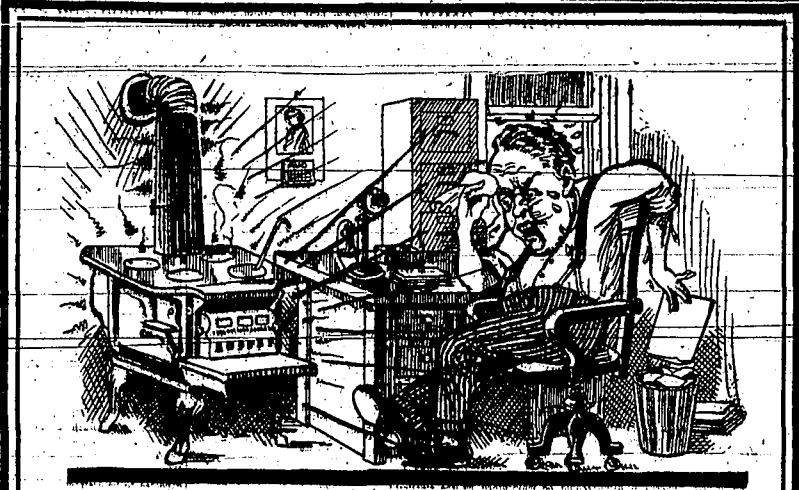

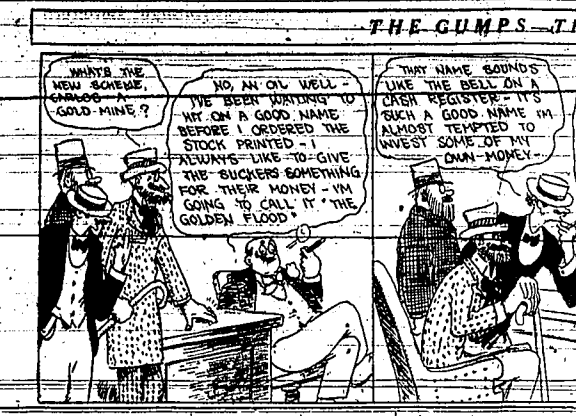

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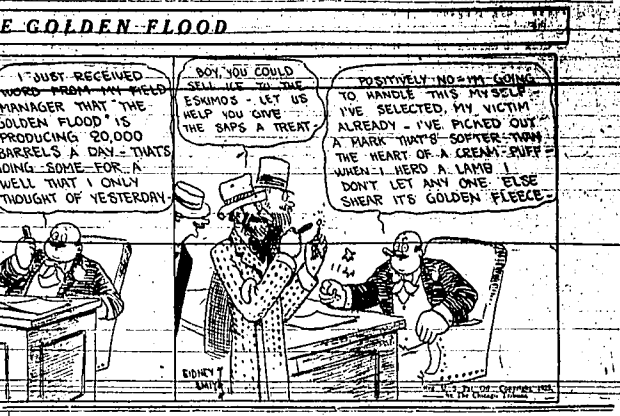
