Fire boats from Plymouth responded to the call. Flames lit the sky for many miles around. The exploding hand grenades were thought to have been those returned from Germany at the close of the war, and stored in a large warehouse pier.

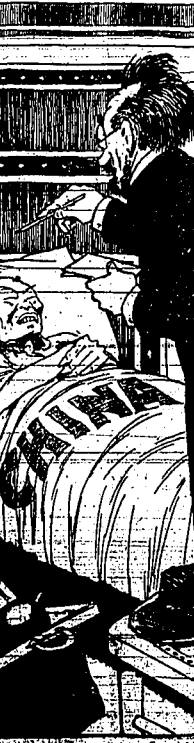

JURY NAMED TO TRY GIRL

Six Men and Like Number of Women to Hear Evidence at Second Ellingson Trial.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 11 (AP)—A jury composed of six men and six women was selected today by Dorothy Ellingson, 23-year-old matchmaker on a charge of murder. The girl confessed to shooting her mother to death on the morning of January 13, but later repudiated the written statement she gave the police.

Ellingson was held in the San Francisco Jail with her father, Joseph Ellingson, and her brother, Earl, Dorothy said quietly through the opening day's proceedings. There was no recurrence of the hysterical outbursts and fainting spells which characterized her earlier trial, which was interrupted by the calling of a jury commission which selected the jury.

The tax bills were framed to provide a revenue of about seven billion marks (about \$1,750,000,000) completing the most thorough tax reforms undertaken by Germany since the war, passed last night.
