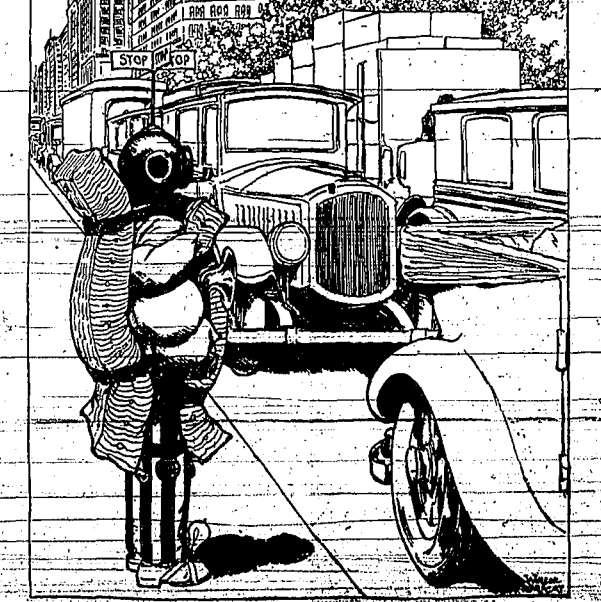

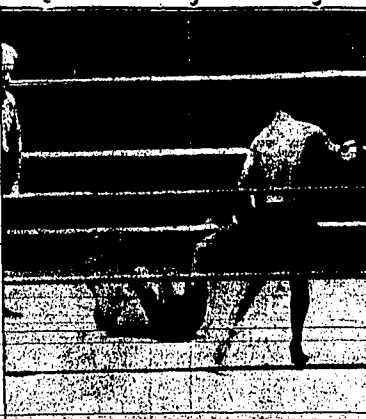

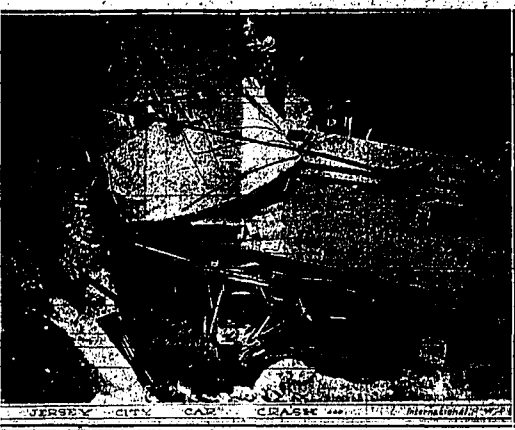

WHEAT ADVANCES ON CHICAGO MART

Grain Goes Up in Price in Sym- pathy With Strength at Win- nipeg; Closes Some Higher.

CHICAGO, Aug. 21 (AP)—Wheat advanced here today in sympathy with strength at Winnipeg, rumors of a concentration of Canadian wheat to be shipped to the market receiving little credence.

Chicago quotations for wheat were the high of the day, 3/16 over last week's close. September selling at \$1.01 1/2, October at \$1.00 1/2, and November at \$1.00 1/2. Corn's close ranged from 1/2 to 1/4 up and provisions the down to 2 1/2 cents.

House with active connections which had been active buyers increased their business just before the close and values shot up fractionally for the wheat. It was held up by an hour passed today that a small gain was realized. Local operations were on both sides of the market. An absence of any reports of low temperatures in the Canadian Northwest received notice, but this seemed to be offset when reports from Saskatchewan were received to the effect that wheat was filling slowly and the yield would not be large owing to rust and drought.

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NO CANDIDATES IN RUNNING FOR SCHOOL BOARD

Only One Out of Three Retiring Members Indicates Disposition to Return; Time for Nominations Short.

Out of three members of Twin Falls Independent school district board of trustees whose terms of office expire this year, only one indicates a conditional disposition to become a candidate for return to membership.

At last meeting on Friday evening, July 18, when the board met for filing of nominations, there were no nominations on file in the office of the district's clerk.

C. K. McCall, chairman, who has served as a member of the board for nearly four years and has been chairman of Twin Fork and former chairman of the board, who is completing his second term of office, in response to inquiries last evening, stated definitely that he did not desire to be considered as a candidate for reelection. E. B. Johnson, who was re-elected last month ago to fill his vacancy caused by resignation of C. K. McCall, stated that he had full intentions that he would be a candidate, provided other candidates could be induced to enter the running.

Women Active.

Mrs. Scott is the first and only woman to be elected a member of the board and her decision against running for another term was highly regretted among Twin Falls women. It is thought to see that women shall not be represented on the board and not participate in the affairs of the district, and that one or perhaps two women candidates shall be entered in the school election of September 1, next.

Mr. McCall gave as the reason for his decision against becoming a candidate for reelection, increased demands of personal business on his time and attention, which he thought would prevent him from being able to do his duty as a member of the board.

Mr. McCall explained that it will be necessary for him to assume work with the operation of his dairy and farm that has been somewhat hampered by the Twin Falls high school and will enter university this fall.

Mrs. Scott stated that she felt that she had served long enough as a member and offered that the school board and that it was time that the work she had discharged in that capacity be assumed by another person.

STORY OF BIG YIELDS TOLD IN CROP REPORTS

A field of 18 acres of wheat grown by David Jinks on the M. E. Finch farm northwest of Twin Falls, yielded 60 bushels of wheat per acre, according to report received here Friday.

W. H. Ratti, on his farm three miles northwest of Twin Falls, produced a yield of 127 1/2 bushels of barley per acre from a field of 4 1/2 acres and an average yield of 12 acres that returned an average yield of 88 bushels of barley per acre.
