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BOAHN PROTECTS METHOD USED IN SETTING DEED

Belgian Settlement Almost Universally Criticised, Declares Senator From Idaho; Asks Cause Be Made Public.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Senator Boahn, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, today announced that the Belgian debt settlement is "almost universally criticised" and that it cannot be defended if it is to serve as a precedent for funding other foreign obligations.

Senator Boahn, in reply, emphasized that the Belgian agreement, signed last Tuesday, was not to be construed as a precedent for future settlements and added that he could continue the committee chairman's position.

Boahn's telegram, under date of August 20, and made public here tonight, follows:

"It was my reason peculiar to Belgium why this settlement was made, it should be stated to the public. It should also be stated that there is no precedent for other settlements. I am not in favor of this settlement. It is almost universally criticised and it is to be regretted that it cannot be defended."

The reply of Senator Boahn, who is a member of the American debt commission, read:

"Reasons for special terms of settlement given Belgium were heard by our commission and published in all the eastern papers. Settlement generally approved by press here and in all other parts of the debt settlement is no precedent for other settlements. I am not in favor of this settlement under Belgium's present condition."

# First Mortgage Bonds Have Remarkable Record, Report

## Defaulted Bonds as an Investment and Reorganization Opportunities Discussed by Roger W. Babson.

BABSON PARK, Aug. 25 (Special to The News).—When securities are high, as at present, investors look about for opportunities that would not otherwise appear attractive. Roger W. Babson today suggests that bond issues in the process of reorganization offers offer an opportunity for both safe investment and for good profit. In connection with this he today issues the following statement:

**Reorganizations and Defaults.**

"Several reorganizations which have been under consideration for a long time are now being announced, some officially, others unofficially. Among those which have been announced are the Virginia-Carolina Chemical company, the first mortgage 2 per cent bonds of which defaulted about two years ago, and which are now selling at 20s shortly after the default. The proposed reorganization plan provides for giving these bondholders about 4500 shares, 4500 par preferred stock, and 4500 par common stock, and for paying off the bonds entirely. The result of this is that the bonds are selling now approximately 20s, the high price in their history. It is unusual that bonds which are not depicted will receive from the court par and interest although this is not unusual. Even the bonds of the 20s which sold in the 20s are now selling at 20s.

"Another instance is in the case of the American Writing Paper company, the first mortgage bonds of which sold very low shortly after their default and are now selling again in the 20s. It is understood that the holders of these first mortgage bonds will receive a new first mortgage bond for \$200 and about \$700 in new preferred stock. One of the most interesting new cases is that of the New York & Cuba Mail Steamship company (commonly known as the Ward Line) the first mortgage 5 per cent bonds of which have been in default 2 1/2 years. One year ago the first mortgage holders were told about these bonds after their default, and they sold for about 50 cents on the dollar. \$200 is now bid for defaulted bonds, and the holder of these first mortgage bonds will get par and interest. Of course it will be recognized that in all of these instances I mention the first mortgage bonds are not being sold at 20s. This was very clearly illustrated in the case of the Boardman Paper company reorganization where the first mortgage bondholders received the greater part of par and interest while other security holders received almost nothing, unless they were willing to put up more money.

"The St. Paul Railway reorganization. Among the larger railways which have been in the hands of a receiver for a time is the Denver and Rio Grande. This company was in the hands of a receiver some time before the reorganization plan was announced, and even now the new securities are not yet distributed. Yet during all these years interest has been paid on certain first mortgage bonds while junior bonds have been in default. The reorganization plan which is receiving the greatest interest, at the moment, is that of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway company. Here is a case where, by a peculiar incident, a first mortgage bond issue has received a fair treatment in the minds of many people. I refer to the Puget Sound first mortgage 4 1/2 per cent bonds all outstanding in the hands of the public, so the bondholders

could get together and take over the property, they would be getting their interest at the present time. Unfortunately, a majority of the first mortgage bondholders are in the hands of the St. Paul company, and this is possible for the St. Paul reorganization managers to take advantage of the minority Puget Sound first mortgage bondholders.

"Many of the best banking houses feel that this action by the St. Paul reorganization committee is a little mistake and believe that the plan will be annulled before being declared finally operative. For any banking house to bring a cloud on the first mortgage bond issue, merely through a technicality, is very shortsighted. Moreover, such action in itself harms all first mortgage bond issues of all railroads. Certain St. Paul bankers may temporarily have a little money that comes, but in the end they will lose twice as much.

**Much Depends Upon the Lending House.**

"A study of reorganizations shows that the character and credit of the character, courage, and financial resources of the banking house or houses originally offering the securities. Some people think a bond issue is a very safe investment, but in fact it is not. However, statistics of reorganizations show most conclusively that the character of the house in which the securities are offered is of great importance. Some houses are willing to spend a huge amount of money in seeing that clients through a reorganization, and are willing to give up profits on two or three years to make good on one if necessary. I have in mind one large distributing bond house which has a remarkable reputation for doing this. That is the house which has the best record of other bond issues taking root of the attitude of the broker passing on to the clients the profits if the bond goes up, and assuming no responsibility if the bond goes down. These houses have done much to hurt the standing of first mortgage bonds, and it is too bad that they are willing to forget their trust as some have been doing.

"A study of reorganization committees shows that the best results come when a bond house is interested in the securities. It is especially a first mortgage issue. When a banking house is interested in the bonds, and also the preferred and common stock, it is very difficult for it to devise a plan to get the bonds out of the first mortgage bondholders. This may be the difficulty with the St. Paul reorganization committee. It is as difficult to succeed in getting securities two months before they are two thousand years ago, when that great economist, Jesus of Nazareth, commented on the same general proposition. A wise old Hebrew bank reorganization manager once said to me, 'Babson, if you are ever mixed up in a reorganization sell all the securities you own except your cash, putting all of your money in that one stock, be it bond, preferred stock or common stock. They fight hard for that one group! Of course it is best to have your money in the first mortgage bonds, but the really important thing is to see to it that your money is in, but to have it all in one group and then fight hard for that one group!'

**Opportunities for Profit.**

"Next to buying securities in a panic and holding for two or three years to sell at a profit, when a boom comes, the best way to make a profit is to buy at the right time first mortgage defaulted bonds. Most all of these bonds sell under their value for they are temporarily under a cloud and the market for them is low. If you can sell a bond issue before it is defaulted, well and good, but never sell just after it defaults. That is the time to buy bonds rather than sell bonds. This especially ap-

# WOOL BUSINESS REPORTED QUIET

Volume of Sales Seems to Have Fallen Off, Says Commercial Bulletin in Story.

BOSTON, Aug. 21 (AP).—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "The volume of business in the wool market seems to have fallen off this week although the market has steadied both here and abroad, especially due to the settlement of the Yorkshire textile strike, which caused 50 per cent of the mills in Yorkshire to stand idle. The business done has been chiefly for fine and fine medium wools for the worsted trade, although rather more business has been done in medium wools also and slightly more lambs reported from the woolen mills. This fall situation, especially with respect to worsted, is better. In the west there has been little or nothing to buy, especially recently.

"The big event in the foreign markets has been the settlement of the English textile strike, which has strengthened the Bradford market and has reflected added strength in the Australian wool auction, where the best wools have been against the buyers. Better Britain markets are dull.

"Merino is slow and unchanged. The Commercial Bulletin will publish the following wool quotations: Domestic—Washed 50c to 51c; half-blood combed 52c; 3/8 blood combed 52c. 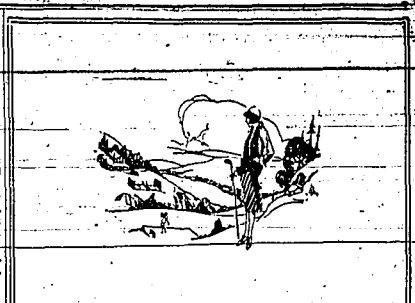

### MACHINE TO FACILITATE ONIONS HARVEST HERE

The first mechanical onion tapping device brought to Idaho will be used in this region to facilitate harvest of large onion crops now maturing in this district.

These of the machine was received here Friday by the Alaska Harbour company from the factory in Alaska to be delivered to H. J. Weaver, on whose farm a field of 200 acres of onions is maturing.

William A. McDonald who is growing an acre of onions, and A. H. Assenberry who will harvest a field of 25 acres of onions.

The machine has a capacity of between 1200 and 1500 bags per day and are said to turn out a product that is cleaner and more free from insects than the hand-tapped crop. It is estimated that the machine will make possible saving of 75 per cent of the expense involved in harvesting of onions by hand, and that the cost with the machine will approximate six cents per bag.

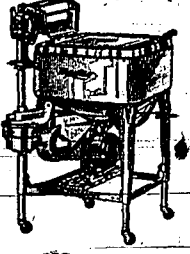
### WOMAN DISMISSES SUIT FOR \$20,000 HEART BALM

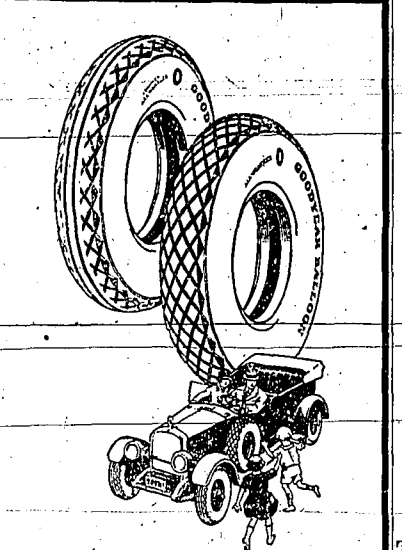
