THE "TALK OF EDUCATION"

The manager of the New York Times, one of the wealthiest newspapers in the world, complains to a congressional committee on behalf of the New York publishers regarding the present postal rates and subscription rates.

"The fact is this system constitutes a 'tax on education' which is burdensome, equally on the publishers and the public. He complains especially that it is 'impossible for any metropolitan newspaper to maintain a nation-wide subscription list under present rates.'"

"Most of the argument is probably pure expediency. It may be true to impose any rates of postage tending to hinder the wide circulation of reading matter. Yet the specific complaint of the argument made by the New York publishers may not sound un-benign to Congress, or to the public."

"Why," it may be asked, "is it necessary for metropolitan newspapers to maintain a nation-wide subscription list when they regard the whole country as their natural and proper field of circulation, and base claims on that assumption?"

"The answer is, that the country without a lead press competent to provide newspaper information and education."

Every time Jimmy Johnson talks to sports editors and reporters he talks about that still dead-end years ago, betwixt George "Beery" Hebel and Jack Willard.

"It was a time when I outkicked the big Kansas star," said Johnson, who has managed a gang of warriors through the years, has won many fights for his men through strategy, but never did the job that he is now doing."

Johnson picked up the fight along in 1912 and tried to make a better out of him. But it was long before he came to realize that Hebel never would amount to much. So there was nothing for Johnson to do but to toss Hebel into the ring with any man who would meet him and fight for Johnson by getting a share of Hebel's earnings in that fight, could be partially repaid for the time and expense of trying to develop Hebel.

"After I made the match and figured out what my share would be of the trifling amount Hebel was to get, I decided that he really had to get back my money," relates Johnson.

"I began to do some thinking and I thought out a plan which, if it worked, meant two fights for Hebel against the great Tom Kansas. The plan was slated for Milwaukee in 1913. It marked Willard's first appearance in the ring since the "Buff" Young affair. In that fight Willard had knocked him out. Young did a short time later, but a jury pronounced Jess from any connection with Young's death for blood and on the "Buff's" brain he got the fight being.

"Just the same Willard was so upset over it that he had made up his mind to quit fighting. It was only the powerful influencing of his managers that caused him to don the gloves again for the fight with Rogers."

When I reached his eye, I slapped him and he went to the ground. Rogers, who had been in the ring for some time, established Hebel in a gentle chair, and he needed to me that he understood. And for the rest of the 45-round fight Hebel was very gentle and the crowd was the only danger.

"Of course, I promptly called around for a return match. Jess was willing, he wanted to redeem himself and to get revenge because it wasn't long before he learned that I had tricked him about Hebel's work heart. So a new match was made at bigger money than Hebel ever had received in his lifetime—and the boys went to it."

"Hebel had a fight that battle on his own merits—the second time the body met—and Hebel lasted."
