LIVESTOCK MEN TELL COMMITTEE OF THEIR NEEDS

Stabilization of Industry Through Elimination of Insecurity From Federal Policies Advocated.

(By The Associated Press) SALT LAKE, Aug. 26.—Stabilization of the livestock industry through elimination of the insecurity and uncertainty on the public lands, with some suggestions as to what will and what will not work to this end, was the main theme of the livestock men's conference on the public lands and surveys by speakers for a joint conference of cattle and sheep men representing these interests in eleven states at a hearing before the senate sub-committee here today.

Thousands of Houses In Region Near Tokyo Submerged by Floods

Thirty-Six Hour Rain Forces Inhabitants of Hojo District to Take to Hills. (By The Associated Press) TOKYO, Aug. 26.—The floods yesterday inundated the Hojo district of the city have subsided. It is estimated that 30,000 houses were submerged, the remainder spending the night on the rooftops. The damage is estimated at several million yen. A number of casualties are reported.

A tentative estimate today placed the visible hard coal supply at a figure about 100,000,000 tons.

WAR OF CHINESE TONGS AVERTED

Threatening Country-Wide Strife Between Two Factions Ends With Police Intervening. NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (AP)—The threatening country-wide war of rival Chinese gangs has been averted at least temporarily. After a conference today at police headquarters, leaders of the Hip Sing and the Young Tong, principals in the bloody outbreak yesterday that resulted from a clash to control, were returned to their headquarters in Chinatown with the understanding that there will be no more killings pending a final meeting in the district attorney's office Friday afternoon.

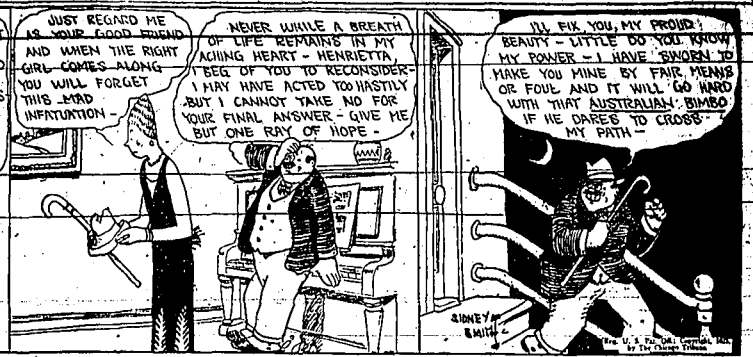
