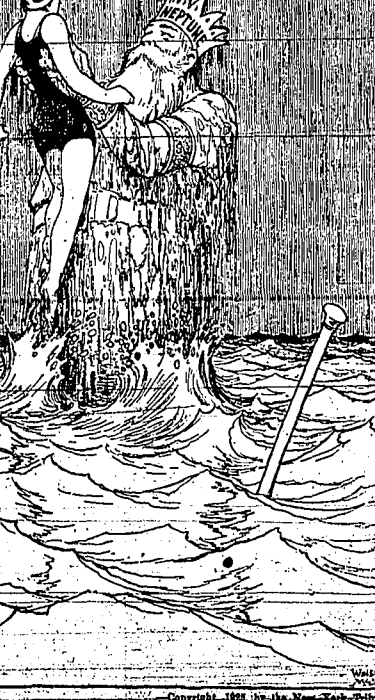

STECK'S GAIN IN VOTES OUT DOWN

Democrat Contesting for Senator Brookhart's Place Loses in Senate-Correction.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The gain of Daniel F. Steck, Democratic Republican, in the Iowa senatorial election, was nullified to a great extent by a correction of the official report of the recount in three counties.

With the vote in two counties being to be checked, Senator Brookhart, on the basis of uncorrected totals, still retained a lead sufficient to give him the office. Nearly 8000 ballots have been challenged, however, and it is in these that the final decision is believed to rest.

The correction of the senate's figures for Washington, Wintlock and North counties added 20 votes from Steck's figures and brought to 52 his loss in these counties.

Final figures on the recount will be announced Monday with the completion of Woodbury and Wright counties. Senator Brookhart entered the recount with a majority of 1385 and Steck, on the figures for the 77 counties completed to date, is 428 votes behind.

The senate's report today credited Brookhart with 30321 uncorrected and 5507 corrected votes, and Steck with 31017 uncorrected and 2065 corrected votes.

In the counties in the state auditor's report, Brookhart received 307, 256 and Steck 3112, showing that 427 more votes were counted there than in the state. Of these Steck received 2607 and Brookhart 129.

FAMOUS CHICAGO MARKET CLOSES

Old South Water Street Exchange Business Ends Today; Buildings to be Razed.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29 (AP)—The old South Water street market which for 152 years has been the center of Chicago's produce exchange, today had its final jam of Saturday vehicles. Sunday the commission merchants will move out in a body. The old alone buildings will then be razed to make way for the new Water drive, a double-block boulevard along the Chicago river.

A new cooperative marketing center covering six blocks was completed last week, and at dawn Monday morning trading will start in the new section of six blocks from the Loop. Trade at the old market started when Indiana landed its first consignment of live hogs, wild grapes and Indian tobacco. In 1830 many commission men traded on the street. Mrs. Arthur J. Peavey, candidate for election to the school board for a three-year term, has been actively interested in education in Idaho for twenty-five years.

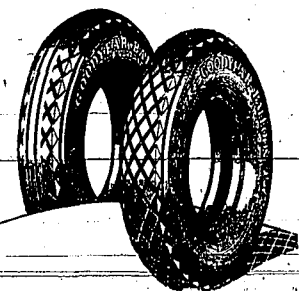

SHARP DECLINE

IN WHEAT MART

Barish Sentiment Prevails on Chicago Board—and Prices Slump as Result.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29 (AP)—Barish sentiment prevailed and prices registered a sharp decline on the wheat market here today. Favorable weather in the American northwest and improved conditions abroad together with steadily increasing movement of grain from the interior, combined to operate against the contract. Closing quotations were 1 1/2 to 3/8 net lower for wheat, September at \$1.33 1/2 to 1.34, and December at \$1.18 1/2 to 1.20 3/4; oats 1/8 up to 1/8, and corn with September at \$2 1/2 up to \$2 5/8; oats 1/8 to 3/8 decline and provisions 2 to 3/8 higher.

Barish sentiment predominated in wheat from both eastern and northern conditions being active sellers on the exchange. Cash interests and shorts bought on the market and the market partially recovered at one time only to see pressure renewed and at the finish values in wheat had reached the low mark for the present movement.

Based on reports from Washington on the wheat crop in 23 countries, it is placed at 60,000,000 bushels in excess of last year. Bullish sentiment seems to have stimulated the market here for the belief that the United States was virtually on a domestic basis this year, but not without the feeling that even though the surplus is small it will be necessary to dispose of considerable of it to keep the prices where they are.

Corn and oats both showed resistance to pressure, although awaiting lower in sympathy with wheat. Dry weather here reported confined to corn from the west and northwest and export deterioration is claimed in parts of North Dakota and Minnesota. The trading here and higher provisions were inactive but somewhat higher.

SCHOOL BOARD REDUCES HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

Lower Charge to Pupils From Outside District Is Made Possible by Increased Enrollment, Trustees Decide.

Because of increased enrollment in Twin Falls high school, the trustees at their meeting last night decided to reduce the tuition charge for the coming year to \$40.25 per month, which is a reduction of 25 cents per month over last year's tuition charge, according to the trustee records. The public independent school district trustees at a special meeting Friday evening at which tuition rates to be paid by pupils coming from outside the district to attend Twin Falls schools this year were fixed.

Because of increased enrollment in schools paid tuition charges last year, the trustees were advised. Most of these were high school students. Tuition charge for the junior high school this year was fixed at \$7 per month and for the elementary grades at \$6 per month. No distinction was made between the junior high school and elementary grade schools in fixing the tuition charge last year, charge of \$6 per month being made for both. Tuition charges have been found to be greater in the junior high school than in the elementary grades because of smaller classes, extra extra training including instruction in penmanship and spelling and physical education that is added in the high school, and the tuition charges have been adjusted this year to meet the situation.
