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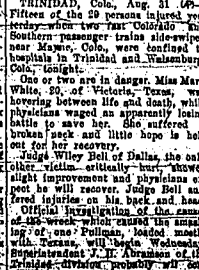

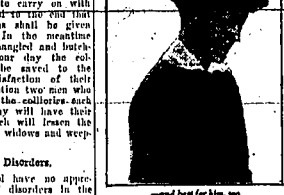

COUNCIL CALLS FOR COMMITTEE TO POWER ISSUE

Approves Mayor's Suggestion That Initiative in Municipal System for Twin Falls be Taken by Citizens.

Twin Falls city council, on motion of Mayor E. L. Ashton, at a regular meeting Monday evening, decided to delegate to a committee of five members the task of working out a concrete proposal looking toward establishment of a municipal power system for Twin Falls.

The committee will be composed of five men all of whom were known to the directors of a municipal power system in Twin Falls, because, he said, the board rested upon them to present a feasible proposition to be submitted to the voters.

It was the mayor's belief that the committee's report should be accepted by the council as an advisory recommendation and that the council should itself assume the responsibility of the proposition for submission to the voters.

J. S. Kroll, commissioner of finance, an avowed opponent of the proposition, stated that he would be entirely willing that the people should decide for or against the proposition and that he would abide by the result.

The council's action toward being the municipal power issue to a focus came after E. V. Borg, city engineer, had submitted at this meeting his report on the results of his recent study of municipal power systems in several cities in Washington Territory.

The report contained detailed reference to municipal power systems in Baker, Eugene and McNamille, Oregon, and Centralia, Tacoma and Seattle, Washington, all of which the engineer reported, "are rapidly being operated satisfactorily and at a profit."

Compare Rates - Power requirements of all these cities except Tacoma and Seattle, the report stated, are less than those of Twin Falls because of the absence of air heating and comparatively small use of current for water.

The report contained detailed comparisons of rates charged in several cities, which, it stated, indicated that "except for light, the Idaho Power company rates are lower than those of any of the cities under consideration except Tacoma."

In answer to Commissioner Kroll's question as to whether a municipal plant in Twin Falls could furnish power at the present rates, pay interest on bonds and depreciation charges and show a profit, Mr. Borg stated that the municipal plant could do so.

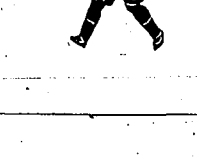
A trace of precipitation was recorded Monday afternoon. Heavy rain fell Monday afternoon at Castelford and in the territory to the south of that point, according to reports received here.
