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COMMITTEE TO WORK OUT PLAN OF CELEBRATION

Chamber of Commerce Invites Four Other Organizations to Name Members of General Committee.

Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce will invite the Twenty-first Century Club, Business and Professional Women's club, Rotary club and Kiwanis club early to name three members to serve with a similar committee of the chamber of commerce to determine the time and manner of celebration of the completion of the new extension of the railroad. According to decision reached by chamber of commerce directors at a meeting Tuesday evening.

The directors at the same time authorized the selection of the committee to appoint the members of the chamber of commerce to serve on this general committee, and R. A. Bond, J. G. Bradley and H. H. Masters were named for this duty.

Advice from H. V. Platt, Oregon Short Line general manager, received by M. Sweeney, chairman of the local railroad committee, and reported to the chamber of commerce are to the effect that physical connection of the new road will be completed early in November.

Contact to Take Part

Citizens will cooperate in plans for celebration of the completion of the railroad, according to a communication from the Central Commercial club that was read at the directors meeting. It conveyed assurance that "we are in hearty accord with these plans and also, if possible, we would like very much to have the visitors spend a few hours, or perhaps a day in contact to visit mining properties of interest."
