COOLIDGE NAMES APART OF 9 IN CONTROVERSY

President Takes First Official Notice of Trouble Stirred Up Over Adequacy of Defenses With Appointments.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—President Coolidge today took official recognition of the controversy stirred up in his first employment over the appointment of American air power by appointing a special board of nine men to conduct a sweeping inquiry into the subject.

TECHNICAL K. O. SPELLS DEFEAT FOR SLATTERY

Berlenbach, Light Heavyweight Champ, Ends Battle in the Eleventh Round of 15-Round Contest.

(By The Associated Press)
 NEW YORK, September 12.—The light heavyweight crowd, which has graced five bouts in the last five years, without the challenge of youthful Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo, under the sturdy defense of Paul Berlenbach, rugged title holder of Australia, N. Y., last night at the New York American league baseball park. Thirty-five thousand saw the fight.

Unable to come back, the Buffalo boy went down in the eleventh round of a scheduled 15-round battle under the terrific punches of the champion who gamely fighting back under grueling, relentless attack. He was floored six times before referee Paddy Healy awarded Berlenbach a technical knockout.

Pressed into the match after illness had stricken two other challengers—Johnnie Johnson of Bridgeport, Conn., and Mike McGuire, former title holder, Slattery was unable to muster the necessary strength to vault from the abyss of a stunning knockout he suffered little more than two months ago at the hands of Dave Shulze, a California welterweight.

Berlenbach went home a crushing left to the head in the eighth. The challenger was groggy again in the ninth, and soon after the start of the tenth he went down for the first time under a savage left. Berlenbach, seeing the end, treated his foe with a volley of lefts and rights from which the fleeing Slattery could find no cover, and twice more he went down, the bell finding him slumped against the ropes at the count of four.

Slattery, fighting the first 15-round bout of his career, was no longer able to protect himself. He sagged to the floor under a terrific left at the start of the eleventh. When he got on his feet Berlenbach floored him again with a left hook for a count of nine. Slattery was barely able to stagger reeled into the ropes near Berlenbach's corner, and the champion smothered him with gloves as he sagged on the ropes. There the fight ended—some nine and 28 seconds after the start of the round.

Berlenbach left the ring with liberal applause, but it was owing to the long question for Slattery, who weighed only 161½ to the champion's 172.

CASSIA COUNTY MINES ACTIVE

Ravenel Macbeth, State Mining Association Secretary, Tells of Mineral Development.

Partner, State Senator Ravenel Macbeth, secretary of the Idaho Mining Association, who has been investigating mining conditions in Cassia county, returned to Boise Friday night, stopping over in Twin Falls while en route.

Mr. Macbeth reported assessment work was performed on 127 mining claims during the period July 7, 1925, to July 1, 1925; and that during the same period 71 new mining claims were located. He stated the records in the office of the recorder at Burley disclosed that a large number of residents of Twin Falls and Minidoka counties were interested in mining claims in Cassia county.

Mr. Macbeth said his company were engaged in active operations in the county, and that the outlook for some of these companies to make a mine was very promising.

The Big Bethel Mining company, financed by California capital and managed by R. E. Hilder, is developing its property in a systematic, progressive manner. The proposition has been completed with a hopper that will run three machine drills, and substantial mine buildings, including a laboratory, have been constructed.

In shallow workings near the surface at about 50 feet in depth, a seven to eight foot ledge was cut which Mr. Macbeth states he was informed ran 810 to 850 in gold and several stanzas carrying gold veins assaying from 75 to 85 per cent lead running off to the schist and quartzite contact were cut.

Owing to the broken up condition in the ground at the 50-foot level, the company has dropped down the hill and is running a drift that will cut this contact at about 500 feet in depth. "Similar geological conditions in other sections of Idaho would result in ore being found when the contact was cut, and it is to be hoped such will be the result when the Big Bethel contact is reached," said Mr. Macbeth.

GIRL OF CALIFORNIA WINS "MISS AMERICA" TITLE IN NEW JERSEY

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 12.—Upon the fair brow of a girl from the Golden West, Miss Faye Langhler of Oakland, Cal., was placed tonight the crown of Miss America in the Atlantic City annual pageant of beauty. Twenty thousand persons witnessed the breaking of the golden apple which contained the names of the two leading contenders for the crown. These were "Miss California" (Miss Langhler) and "Miss Los An-

geles" (Miss Adrienne Dore). The two names were the final decisions under the judging this morning. The fifteen judges then cast a secret ballot for one of the two as "Miss America." When the ballot was opened, tonight the vote was 12 to 3 in favor of Miss Langhler and she was then given the title.

VELVET USED WIDELY IN NEW FALL STYLES

Velvet in colors and also in black, appears in Fashion's "social register" this year. Velvet is shown by the leading shops for afternoon frocks, street

Waistcoats worn with double-breasted coats are single-breasted, a style in which considerable emphasis is laid.

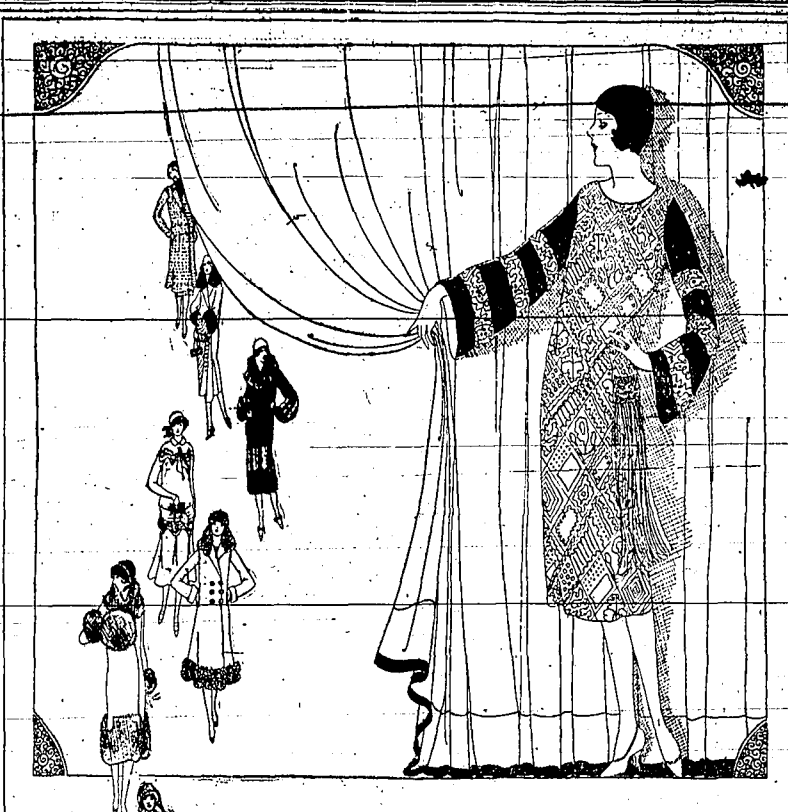

Color Scheme of Room Is Just as Important as the Matter of Milady's Dress

Most women are experts in selecting their clothes, but few are so expert in selecting their room's color scheme. They know what clothes are best suited to bring out their particular style of beauty.

They know, too, whether the tight effect of the Empire costume is most becoming to them from the most flattering of other periods.

American women are most sensitive to the lines of their clothing, that of their skirts up to the other side does not please them.

Too can it be seen that the latest dress of all women is the American dress, which is a simple, straight, unadorned, the simplest rules of decorating their homes for today, from the viewpoint of an expert, American home interiors are most inartistic.

Women should study the color scheme of their rooms in much the same way as they study the colors of their gowns. It is possible to wear white shirt waists and dark skirts. It isn't fashionable, and the same will never be an exact copy of the colors of the room. It is simple; it is bad art, but the attraction which contrast so greatly when used in large areas.

Predominating Color.

It is the same way with one's room, apartment or home. Nowadays they will posted on interior decoration do not have the rug one color, the walls another color and the ceiling a stippled white. What cultivated people desire is harmony in color—the design that there is a keynote, tone, to the room. To illustrate this better assume that the room to be decorated is, for five or six hours of the day, flooded with brilliant sunlight. It would be good art then to use a cool color as the room keynote. Let us assume that green is the color desired upon so, including drapery, wall paper, paint and rug, each should contain shades of green, varying in intensity from the floor right up to the ceiling. In other words, the rug should have worked into their design, here and there, touch of dark green. The window should be tinted with a slightly lighter shade of green, the wall paper a still lighter shade, the ceiling carrying the lightest t of all.

Upon entering a room so colored we find it most pleasing to the eye, and harmony is produced which could not be obtained if different and contrasting colors had been used.

The idea of harmony of color can be carried even to the furniture itself. Nowadays it is possible to purchase furniture ready to be painted—we can let our own colors—experiment with them—and do our own painting if we have the hints, or even the assistance of an artist.

In order to create restfulness in a room, however, it is not necessary to have the furniture in tone with the keynote color of the room. Wholesome harmony or unity of the popular decorative work well in practically all color schemes, though in very small rooms it is inadvisable to use much red furniture, because it bounces out to meet you, while other colors do not impose themselves so forcibly. If we wish to create the idea of great space, yellow and green are the ideal colors.

Starting as we have to create a restful atmosphere, the arrangement of all furniture should be in the same line, but it is not only unattractive, but even more so, if the furniture is placed in any other way except that against the wall. Pieces set in the center of the room are confusing to the eye—they create an awkward focus, because it bounces out to meet you, in a celebrated chair in New York, as well as most celebrated interiors, but it is not only for the first time in his life, but the attraction of his congregation. After months of thought he finally called, in an explicit interior decoration. The expert had already noted the problem when he entered the church. He found conflicting lines in the arrangement of the seats and in the arrangement of the altar, and he found the color scheme contrary to all laws which would produce a peaceful state of mind. The furniture had been rearranged and for the first time in months our celebrated clergyman was able to hold the undivided interest of his congregation.

Every time in a room, no matter whether of furniture, pictures, picture wires, drapery or lighting apparatus, should follow the lines of the room. In other words anything but right angles is bad art. Harmony can only be produced when lines are straight. Apply that principle to hanging your pictures—don't use one nail or one hook and hang your wire over it—use two nails or two hooks, keeping the wires of the picture parallel. Do not let your pictures hang at an angle from the wall—keep either the tops of the pictures or the bottoms an equal distance from the floor. Hang them never the center of a picture should never be above five feet seven inches from the floor. Do not have the sofa placed at an angle of 45 degrees with the wall—keep it and all other pieces parallel with the wall in all cases—put against the wall in preference to all other places.

General Business Improves
Assertion of Roger Babson

Statistician Points to Crop Situation and Other Factors for Statement That Conditions Are on Upgrade

BABSON PARK, Mass., Sept. 12.—Roger Babson, the nation's leading statistician to secure data as to the fall outlook. He finds a small but real improvement in the situation since his last analysis a month ago.

His conclusion is as follows: The crop conditions are on an upgrade.

Usually the United States is very dependent upon the crops. During July the grain crops of the country did not progress very well, but during the month of August conditions have improved.

Although the wheat crop will fall below that of last year, the conditions are on an upgrade. Moreover, the corn crop seems sure to run in excess of the short crop of last season.

Both the export and import of August exceeded those of August 1924. For the eight months of the calendar year we have a balance of trade on the export side, of over three hundred million dollars which is in excess of the first eight months of 1925.

There is a general feeling of optimism, but only that conditions are better throughout the country, but what is very important, that this fact is being generally recognized.

Business is generally on an upgrade. All through the year the volume of business indicated by both bank clearings and ear loadings has been good.

The only clouds in the horizon are the annual rise in the market for wool, the serious condition of the textile industry and the increase of unemployment conditions in certain sections.

There are very few indications of depression. Moreover an analysis of these figures also indicate the increase has been all along the line and is not confined to any one specific item.
