

DEPARTMENTS TO HELP ARMED INQUIRY BOARD

War and Navy Officials Act to Help President's Committee of Nine in Probing Charges of Incompetence by Mitchell.

(By The Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—The war departments and navy departments are preparing for any assistance that may be required by the president's special aircraft board which will conduct an investigation of the White House.

The war department will be known that Colonel William Mitchell, chief figure in the controversy, would be available at any time as an expert witness should the board desire to summon him, as it is expected that when it takes subjects bearing on charges of incompetence and inefficiency in the air service administration.

Navy Court Named. At the same time, Secretary Wilbur appointed a navy court of inquiry to investigate the "Shenandoah" disaster. His report will be at the disposal of the board if it wishes to use it. The navy secretary announced the department's readiness to cooperate in every possible way with the board, even to the extent of furnishing "secret and confidential information of a military nature if the president authorizes the disclosure."

Statement At Open Hearing. If Colonel Mitchell is called by the board, he will testify before it at an open hearing, as he feels that the numerous charges made against him are a program in the last year.

# WORK PROCEEDS RAPIDLY WITH GIANT PROJECT

Congressman Addison T. Smith Talks on Visit to Reclamation Projects of 3 States. King Hill Needs Attention.

Reclamation progress is being made with construction of the American Falls dam and removal of the town of American Falls and the old basin that will be inundated as a result of the building of American Falls dam. At a recent visit, Congressman Addison T. Smith stated Monday on his return from Idaho and Washington with Washington with Congressman T. C. Crampton of Michigan, chairman of the house subcommittee on appropriations for reclamation work, and Hank Marks and Indian Affairs. Congressman Smith, who is chairman of the house committee on reclamation, joined the congressional party two weeks ago at Postville. Other members of the party were Congressman French of Idaho and Congressman Sisson of Oregon.

"The work," Congressman Smith said, "has an better field in our east than Congressmen Crampton, whose interest in the American Falls project is a genuine one that is perhaps intensified by reason of the fact that, at one stage in the proceedings some two years ago, occupied a position where he could determine whether the project should continue or be abandoned. Congressman Crampton is the only man who has served as head of his committee who has ever made personal visits to western reclamation projects, and this he does several years during recess of congress."

**King Hill in Bad Shape.**  
Next for special legislation at the next session of congress to relieve the condition of the King Hill project in Idaho is indicated, according to Congressman Smith. The project has been made an only about one-half the project area and the per cent of reconstruction costs is considered excessive. Congressman Smith has expressed his opinion that the best reclamation service fund on account of the King Hill project would approximate \$400,000.

Progress in Oregon and Washington, Congressman Smith stated, are in excellent condition. Settlers have produced high crops and are receiving high prices for their products.

# RATES REDUCED RATE ON APPLES

Short Line Agent Says Emergency Rate Cannot be Granted; Gives Reasons.

Objection raised by western apple growers to marketing of bulk marked fruit outside the state where it may be sent unfavorably against established standards for the Idaho crop is an important factor making for the Oregon Short Line's emergency rate on bulk marked apples for which growers and shippers of this region have applied, according to word brought here Monday by Juel Priest of Boise, general agent for the Oregon Short Line in Idaho.

Growers of western Idaho, Mr. Priest said, fear that it would be impossible to place bulk marked apples on the market without consequent injury to the state's reputation for production of high-grade fruit that has been developed and safeguarded by standards of grading and inspection.

Growers and shippers here, who presented their arguments for an emergency rate at a hearing held here last week before Mr. Priest, argued that a reduced transportation rate would be necessary if bulk-marked apples were to be marketed to a price that would be adequate to produce a profit.

The local growers had previously reached an agreement with the state inspectors that would have permitted the marketing of bulk-marked apples under certain regulations.
