

WORK PROCEEDS RAPIDLY WITH GIANT PROJECT

Congressman Addison T. Smith
Talks on Visit to Reclamation
Projects of 3 States, King
Hill Needs Attention.

Rapid progress is being made with construction of the American Falls dam and removal of the town of American Falls on the old trail which will be inundated as a result of the building of the American Falls reservoir. Congressman Addison T. Smith stated Monday on his return here from a seven-day trip through south Idaho and eastern Oregon, including Washington with Congressmen L. C. Chapman of Michigan, chairman of the house sub-committee on appropriations for reclamation service, man-made parks and Indian affairs. Congressman Smith, who is chairman of the reclamation committee, reported that the congressional party, two weeks ago at Pocatello. Other members of the party were Congressmen French of Idaho and Congressman Smith of Oregon.

"The west," Congressman Smith said, "has no better friend in Congress than Congressman Chapman, who is a giant in his field. His project is a giant one; it is far more intensified by reason of the fact that he, at one stage in the proceedings some two years ago, occupied a position where he could determine whether the project should continue or be abandoned. Congressman Chapman is the only man who has served as both a member of the reclamation committee and visited western reclamation projects, and this he has done for several years during recess of Congress."

King Hill in Bad Shape.

For special legislation at the next session of Congress to relieve the condition of settlers on the King Hill project in Idaho is indicated, according to Congressman Smith. Settlement has been made on only about one-half the project area and the per capita of construction costs is considered excessive. Congressman Smith indicated that the amount of money available for reclamation service fund on account of the King Hill project would approach \$1,000,000.

In projects in Oregon and Washington, Congressman Smith stated, are in excellent condition. Settlers have produced big crops and are receiving high prices for their products.
