CRASHED UNDER WHEELS OF BUS

Wilford Fainner, 9 Years Old, Suffers Severe Injury in Fall Under School Bus.

As a result of being a public school bus while in motion Friday afternoon at the school, Wilford Fainner, 9 years old, son of Edward Fainner, fell under the rear wheel of the bus, which was carrying over 20 children, and fracturing the bone of the knee and mauling the head. The injured boy is in a critical condition at the hospital. Dr. J. H. Morgan, in attendance of the hospital, Friday evening, says that without prompt medical attention the boy's condition is grave. The physician and hospital attendants are confident that the boy will recover.

Pupils Witness Accident.

The accident was witnessed by a number of the pupils of the school who were waiting on the return of the bus that was to make a return trip carrying pupils to their homes in order to get home. Witnesses saw to agree that the bus was at the point of stopping when Wilford attempted to climb aboard. One of the witnesses identified a warning that came too late for the boy to heed and fall under the rear wheel.

The injured boy was taken first to the office of Mrs. Ethel Gray, principal of the school, where the physician was summoned. Later, he was removed to the hospital.

Mrs. Gray stated Friday evening that she did not see the doctor of the boy, a high school student named Larson, to blame for the accident. She has been advised by the physician to attempt to get on one of the buses before they are brought to a complete stop, when it is necessary to get on the bus.

A similar statement was made by Edna D. Thom, superintendent of Twin Falls schools, who was in charge of the accident had been seen.

The home of the injured boy is about a mile south of town.

NE MOROCCAN MOVE PLANNED

French Launch Offensive on Large 'Scale' Against 'Riff' Rebels; Reach Objectives.

French Morocco, Sept. 25 (AP)—A French offensive on a large scale was launched today on the eastern side of the Moroccan front, with the advance of strong elements of French troops from Kifane toward Ajdir, which lies 40 miles due north. The French troops reached all their objectives, occupying Djebel Kroumou, Djebel Rouman, northeast of Kifane.

The attack and tempo of the offensive, whether it is designed to effect a junction of the French troops with the Spaniards who are moving down from Albuera Bay toward Ajdir, the capture of the Moroccan coast, or to relieve the Rifian pressure on France's allies, has not yet been officially announced by the high command.

The 40 miles which separate Kifane from Ajdir stretch over a wild, mountainous country, and special preparations were necessary this morning before the French infantry began to move. The French report says that the enemy appeared completely unprepared by the suddenness of the attack, and abandoned two cannon and a quantity of ammunition to the advancing French troops.

The success of the Spanish troops, which attacked at Albuera Bay and the ultimate outcome of the operations they have carried on during the last few days appears to be dependent upon prompt advance by the French to relieve the north.

COMBINED OFFENSIVE PLANNED

MADRID, Sept. 25 (AP)—The French and Spanish forces have an official statement issued by the war office today, are completing preparations for a combined offensive, which is imminent against the rebellious Moroccan tribesmen. Telephonic communication between Spanish headquarters at Tetuan and French general headquarters here has been reestablished. Primo de Rivera has in a position to Tetuan from Ceuta, to be in a position to support more closely the general situation.

Another communique announces that six Spanish officers and 70 soldiers were killed and 18 officers and 500 men wounded in the latest Spanish advance on the Albuera coast.

GRD SEASON OPENS TODAY OVER NATION

First Offensive of Annual Football Campaign Takes Place With College Games Scheduled in Many Places.

(By the Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The first offensive to the annual football campaign will get under way tomorrow with college football games scheduled in many places.

The majority of leading colleges throughout the gridiron sphere will bring their forces into action then, although there are a number of notable exceptions, including the teams of the western conference and the eastern "three" which either their first or second week tomorrow.

In the west, however, such outstanding institutions as Pennsylvania, Cornell, Dickinson, Syracuse, Pitts burgh, West Virginia, Colgate, Rutgers, Colby and Cornell open their drives.

Newly formed national championship figures in the middle west, the list of certain leaders, while California, undefeated in the regular start of the season on the Pacific coast and the south's leading teams, which are in the midst of the championship trials.

With a few exceptions, the opening battles will amount chiefly to preliminary tests against comparatively minor opponents for national honors which are focusing their main attention on later clashes with traditional or international rivals.

Outstanding among these exceptions are the games involving Notre Dame in the South, Indiana, with Baylor university, southwestern champions of last year, and University of California, the east's most promising team, against Washington and Loyd, which meet at among the best in the south last fall.

Among the upstate rivals of New York, Cornell meets Cornell College of Ithaca, against Swarthmore, which should not offer serious opposition, Syracuse opens against Hobart College, and Colgate meets Colgate of Columbia to play.

Columbia, winner of the tattering of Charles Crowley, a disciple of Houghton and Husker, will be expected to be opening contest against Harvard.

Baltimore, co-holder of the eastern football laurels will meet Pennsylvania last year, league another promising season against Norwich, while Brown, facing the most formidable schedule of her career, gives her machine an initial test against Rhode Island state.

The "Little Three," as they always have been called, will meet in action, with Williams, Bates college, meeting Hamilton, Colby, opposing Connecticut, Agassiz and Amherst, facing Bowdoin.

Pennsylvania, pushing toward a succession of difficult battles, dates with Brown, Yale, Chicago and Illinois, takes on Colgate for preliminary leading, while, in the state, Syracuse opens big game at home with Notre Dame and Michigan, Agassiz has Lebanon valley for opening opportunity.

West Virginia goes away from home to begin her campaign against Allegheny at Erie, Pa., while "Uncle Charlie" Moran's Bucknell eleven takes on Western Maryland.
